

SAVING A LIFE DRUNK, TROUBLE

City Weighmaster at Seattle Says Impeached Judge at One Time Staggered Into Gutter; Hearing Is Ended.

(Special From Seattle, Wash.)
Seattle, Wash., June 29.—I saw Judge Hanford intoxicated—he was staggering toward me as I was standing one Sunday in September or October, 1911, in front of the public library. This was about 8 o'clock in the evening. His condition was such that he was either very drunk or very ill. He staggered from one side of the street to the other. I did not follow Judge Hanford, but I observed his staggering walk for some distance; once he danced off into the gutter.

This was the testimony of John Rathurst, for five years United States commissioner at Tacoma, Alaska, and now city weighmaster at Seattle, this morning before the congressional committee investigating the Hanford impeachment charges, in answer to a series of questions propounded to him by the investigating committee. E. C. Hughes, of counsel for Hanford.

Rathurst was preceded this morning by R. E. McFarland, former clerk of the superior court in Tacoma, and A. M. Olson, an insurance agent, who was formerly in the employ of the Bureau of Investigation. McFarland's testimony concluded the inquiry into the Olson case. Olson was excused by the committee when it developed that he did not bring the notes made by him when he was shadowing Judge Hanford, and without which his recollection was hazy.

BELIEVED ERWIN GIRL WORKED 'BAGGER GAME'

"I believe my daughter is telling the truth about the murder of Raymond W. Wallace, and that she does not know where her husband is," said the father of Hazel Erwin, who is locked up in county jail for complicity in the murder committed in an Alder street rooming house.

The police, however, are positive that she has not told all, and that part of what she told is untrue. The search for William Tanner, her husband, who she says killed Wallace, has been extended all over the coast, and as far north as Alaska and as far east as Chicago. An effort is being made to secure the name under which he registered when in the army.

The police detective have learned that the woman was practically a white slave, and that Tanner was in the habit of beating his wife if she failed to earn enough money daily. The statement by the girl that her husband had threatened to kill her if she were seen with a man is known to be a falsehood, and the theory is that the girl worked the "bagger" game on Wallace, who was struck on the head when the couple started to rob and search him.

A clue as to the whereabouts of Tanner is believed to be in the possession of the police, but they will not confirm this.

PEDESTRIAN IS RUN DOWN BY AN AUTO

H. L. Paterson of 547 East Twenty-seventh street last night, while driving his auto, ran into and knocked down H. J. Lathrey of 255 East Fifty-third street, and Grand and Hawthorne avenues, just as Lathrey walked in front of the car, and as Paterson was driving around the left side of the car. The man was taken to his home. His injuries were slight.

B. Mattison of the Portland Art Glass company, while driving an auto at Grand avenue and East Morrison street ran into a motorcycle on which C. J. Ford and Miss Louise Leabitter of Twenty-ninth and Hancock streets were riding, throwing the two latter to the street. Neither was injured.

The police yesterday received a complaint from T. E. Odekrick that an auto bearing Oregon number 746 ran into his express wagon at Second and Taylor streets, injuring one of his horses.

NEWLY WEDDED WIFE ACCUSES HER HUSBAND

Mrs. Nettie Emery, a bride of less than a month, was this morning in court as a witness against her husband, George E. Emery, whom she had arrested last Sunday on a charge of assault and battery. According to her statement the troubles between the two started immediately after their marriage, when the man asked her to pay expenses. It was a case of love at first sight with the two people, who knew each other less than two months before the marriage, but the honeymoon was at once, she said, Judge Tazewell continued the case for sentence, pending the outcome of the hearing of the charges of threatening to kill made in the justice court. Mrs. Emery has been married three months. The couple lived at the Leonard apartments.

Alleged Dealer in "Hop" Arrested.
The case against Charles Hill, who was arrested yesterday by Sergeant Kienlen and Patrolman Niles, Hutchings and Saul at 108 Holladay avenue for selling morphine and cocaine without a prescription, will be heard on next Wednesday. Hill is believed to be responsible for the sale of a quantity of "hop" and the necessary instruments to use the drug, and against whom complaints have been received on many occasions. The arrest was made when an alleged victim of the man's operations was seen coming from the house with his arms bandaged up, in which was concealed a "dope" outfit. The arm was bandaged merely to conceal the goods.

Astoria Saloonman Held.
Walter Christensen, a saloonman of Astoria, was arrested last night in Astoria on a charge of carrying a concealed weapon. He was brought to Portland and lodged in jail under bonds of \$2000, which he is trying to raise. Christensen is charged with bringing Selma Edwards from Everett, Wash., to Astoria about two years ago. He is an uncle of Carl Jensen, who is held pending a retrial following a disagreement by a jury in the United States district court, several days ago. It was in investigating the Jensen case that the case of Christensen was uncovered. The Edwards woman is held as a witness.

"PIKE" DAVIS, FORMER KING BEE OF BACHELOR COLONY, IS BENEDICT

Well Known Lawyer and Suffrage Worker Keeps Wedding Secret 6 Weeks.

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The news of Mr. Davis' marriage will occasion surprise among his many friends, and especially among his bachelor associates. His action is, however, in keeping with his position on the question expressed some time since when he said that it was not his fault that he was not married and that he was "eligible."

Mr. Davis has been practicing law in Portland for about 20 years, and has been quite prominent in social and public life. He was last night re-elected president of the Missouri Society of Oregon.

His present Mrs. Davis has four children by a former husband.

WHIRLWIND CAMPAIGN TO MAKE COUNTY DRY

Vancouver, Wash., June 29.—Plans which have taken several months to formulate by the various ministers of the city, were made public this morning and comprise a whirlwind campaign to put Vancouver in the "dry" column this fall. The "storm" breaks with a rush and four members of the Anti-Saloon League of the State of Washington will hold meetings in Vancouver and surrounding towns tomorrow.

George D. Conger, state superintendent of the state league, will speak at the First Presbyterian church at 11 o'clock and in the evening a mass meeting of seven churches of the city will be held at the First Presbyterian, Mr. Conger being the principal speaker. Other meetings will be held at Minnehaha, Hazelidel, Fishers and Polka, where different churches will unite in each instance. At 11 o'clock in the morning, Rev. Walter Grafton, superintendent of the Tacoma district of the Anti-Saloon league, will speak at the First Congregational church. In the evening a mass meeting will be held at the Heights Presbyterian church, in which the members of that congregation, Adventists and others, will unite. The meeting at Fishers will also be held in the evening.

The Vancouver organization will be known as the Pacific Anti-Saloon league and its purpose will be to put Vancouver dry at the fall election. "There will be something doing all the time from now on," interested ones say.

1000 PERSONS WITNESS CHURCH DEDICATION

Vancouver, Wash., June 29.—The beautiful new First Presbyterian church edifice at Tenth and Park streets was dedicated last night, Rev. Mark A. Matthews, D. D., pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Seattle, delivering the dedicatory sermon. More than 1000 people were present, a large number from Portland including four pastors. "The Church Essential" was the topic on which Rev. Mr. Matthews spoke. He pointed out how the church is essential to the individual. He explained all phases of church work and how it does, or should, tend to uplift man.

Rev. H. S. Templeton, for four years pastor of the church and formerly of the Westminster Presbyterian church of Portland, was assisted by four Portland ministers. A triple quartet sang "Darkness and Dawn," and Dr. Thomas H. Walker, of Calvary Presbyterian church of Portland, read the scripture lesson. Rev. J. M. Canas, pastor of the First Methodist Episcopal church of Vancouver, and representing the Ministerial association of Vancouver, pronounced the invocation. Platt Homan, tenor, sang "If Ye Truly Seek Me."

W. F. Connaway, chairman of the building committee, spoke for the committee and trustees and read the church report, which showed that a debt of only \$2000 remains on the church edifice, which cost about \$28,000. A voluntary subscription of \$875 was taken up last night.

The memorial windows of the church will be unveiled tomorrow morning with appropriate ceremonies.

WILL MANAGE LAND PRODUCTS SHOW

Chief of Police Doust, second witness in the case, was the subject of a grilling cross examination by Attorney Fred Robertson, who brought out in detail police methods of investigation and the fact that Doust is interested in two laundries which demand his attention. WOODROW WILSON GAINS; CLARK LESS ON 17TH BALLOT

(Continued From Page One.)
"I appeal for the same kind of fair play you gave Bryan," shouted Giddings. "I want to change from Wilson to Clark, and I want this convention to understand why I am doing so."

Beck withdrew his objection, but it was renewed from several places. Cries of "Shame, shame; give him a chance!" came from the crowd. Giddings then James called that Giddings might talk and he took the platform.

Breaks Away From Bryan.
"My name is Giddings, from Oklahoma," he began. "From 1896 down to the present time I had followed unwaveringly the standard of the great Nebraska. On the temporary chairman I followed him. But I do not intend to sit here and hear aspirations cast on Democrats as good as the Nebraska ever will be. I do not believe there would have been a Wilson delegate here from Oklahoma without my county. But I think it's time to call a halt on personalities and stand on Democracy. I am willing to go back home with the record I make here. I am willing that my county should be known for the good of the party. My record is clear and I want no public office. I go back."

Here a yell from the gallery of "You go back, but you will never come back," interrupted Giddings and he was applauded from a section of the gallery. "I never scratched a Democratic ticket in my life," continued Giddings. "I want to state that I changed because of the dominance of this man prevails the advantage of the nomination of a pro-slavery man. This convention is not continued Giddings. 'I am as near the common people as Mr. Bryan. For a good many years I have represented as attorney the Federation of Labor. I know its needs, and I know it does not want the convention to nominate a conservative. But I want this convention to say to Mr. Bryan: You shall not press down on the brow of democracy a crown.'"

Booting and Cheers in Storm.
Wild booing and jeers greeted this rally, and the speaker was unable to proceed. Giddings stood waiting. "You shall not press down upon the brow of democracy," he yelled above the wild cheers and yells of the crowd of frenzied delegates and spectators, "a crown of anarchy; you shall not crucify her on a cross of selfishness." The jeering ended as Giddings went back to his seat, and the roll call of Oklahoma proceeded. Connecticut next changed its vote to Clark, Underwood gained 14 votes, a Clark gain of 5.

There was no change in the fifteenth ballot until Maine came. Clark gained three votes, the state dividing, Clark 4, Wilson 8.

Michigan Gives Wilson One.
In Michigan Clark lost one, to Wilson. In Montana Wilson got six of the eight votes heretofore cast solidly for Clark.

In North Carolina Clark gained 14 votes, Alaska went solid for Clark, a gain of two from the Wilson ranks. Wilson came within one-sixth of a vote of reaching the one-third mark in the delegates with his vote. His managers freely asserted would get this on the next ballot, thus placing Wilson in a position effectively to prevent Clark getting the two-thirds vote needed to nominate.

Underwood Gains One.
Underwood gained one from Clark in Connecticut on the sixteenth ballot. Idaho's vote was challenged but Governor Hawley insisted that the delegation was instructed to vote as a unit and that it could not split its vote. Chairman James ruled that the state convention instructions committed the delegation to vote for Clark as long as they had a "reasonable hope that Clark could be nominated." In Tennessee Clark lost 14 votes to Underwood, while Clark gained half a vote in North Carolina from Underwood.

Totals on Sixteenth.
The sixteenth ballot resulted: Clark 551; Wilson 3623; Underwood 1124; Harmon 29; Marshall 20; Kern 2; Bryan 1.

That New York expects the deadlock to last over next week was indicated when Secretary Smith directed all the delegates to remain rooms until further notice.

While this was going on a number of Underwood leaders, the Alabama congressman on the telephone. They were said to believe they could not hold his delegates together for him much longer and wanted him to say to whom the votes were to be swung if the break came. The sixteenth ballot being without result, the seventeenth was ordered.

Result of Seventeenth.
It resulted: Clark 545; Wilson 3623; Underwood 1124; Harmon 29; Marshall 20; Kern 4; Bryan 1; not voting 34.

On this ballot Idaho, which had been passed, demanded an individual roll call. Nine were present and seven absent.

TAMMANY DIRECTS CLARK MANAGERS TO PUT OVER PRIZE

Murphy Sees Last Chance to Name Missouri's Candidate and Calls Council of War to Plan Coup.

(Special From Seattle, Wash.)
Seattle, Wash., June 29.—Murphy, of Tammany Hall, issued his ultimatum to the Clark managers shortly after 10 o'clock today. It was "Put Clark over quick."

That the speaker's lieutenants realized the Tammany chief's edict portended a threat was evident from the instantaneous effort which was put forth to promulgate Underwood, Harmon and Wilson delegates.

Senator Hankhead, Underwood's campaign manager, was summoned to the Emmons hotel, where the Clarkites assembled in a war council to plan the strategic moves of their culminating efforts. Hankhead, Ollie James, Senator Stone, former Senators Dubois and Pettigrew attended.

"I will not deny that Underwood's friends have been conferring with us but it would spoil things to tell our plans just now," said Dubois.

From an Underwood lieutenant, however, it was learned that the Clark forces will concentrate their efforts to "put over" their candidate on the first ballot of the afternoon session.

They hope to have the aid of 113 Underwood votes, 29 Harmon Ollie James and 18 Ollie James to start the defection from the Wilson column.

Senator Stone, Clark's strategic expert, declared at noon today: "We will nominate somebody today sure—and it probably will be Clark, for we are going to stick to him."

CRAWFORD FEARS BEING DISPLACED IN TIDELAND CASE

Is Willing to Have Peck of Marshfield as Helper If at All, But Thinks No Fee Should Be Incurred.

(Special From Seattle, Wash.)
Salem, Ore., June 29.—Learning that the state board might employ special counsel to carry to the United States supreme court an appeal in the tideland case of the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad company vs. the state land board, Attorney General Crawford has addressed the following letter to the state land board:

"I am a newspaper man who you are contemplating the employment, at the state's expense, of special counsel in the matter of the appeal to the United States supreme court, of the case of the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad company vs. the state land board, and that at your request Cassius R. Peck of Marshfield has made an offer for such employment. While Mr. Peck is a good lawyer, I beg to say that his employment at the expense of the state school fund is, in my opinion, not justified in the present case."

"This office has for some time been preparing to take the case to the United States supreme court, and we beg further to inform you that sometime since, prior to Mr. Peck's recent trip east, and we believe when on his way, he called at our office and discussed the case. We explained it fully, and told him that while it was a close question, we were preparing to take the matter to the United States court. He said that the Port of Coos Bay was interested in the principle and that he thought he would be employed to assist on behalf of the Corvallis & Eastern Railroad company. He said that the state school fund is, in my opinion, not justified in the present case."

"We would be pleased to have Mr. Peck assist, but do not believe that the state should be put to any expense therefor, but if some salary or port pay, there is no objection."

VISITING BAND HERE; THREE FREE CONCERTS

The Overland band, 50 pieces strong, every member of which except the leader works in the mechanical departments in the big factories of the Overland Automobile company, arrived in Portland today on the Shasta Limited, and will give three free concerts in Portland this afternoon. The first, at 2 o'clock, was at the City Park; the second, from 6:30 until 8:30, will be at the Multnomah hotel; and the third will be at the Plaza at Fourth and Madison streets.

The band is under the leadership of Gustav Koehler and has a national reputation. It is on a vacation trip of a month through the principal cities of the west at the expense of John N. Willits, head of the Overland company.

Boy's Hand Injured

John Lauer, aged 16 years, an employee of the Modern Cigar company, is at the Good Samaritan hospital suffering from injuries to the hand sustained while working at one of the candy machines. The boy caught his fingers in the cog wheels and they were so tightly crushed that it was feared they would have to be amputated.

JUDGE WHO TRIED McNAMARAS, HERE FOR HER PARTY

Walter Bordwell Pleased With Portland's Growth—Discusses Skyscrapers.

Judge Walter Bordwell of Los Angeles, who presided at the famous trial of the McNamaras and sentenced them to life imprisonment when they confessed in Portland for a few hours today, Judge Bordwell arrived this morning from Chicago, where he went to attend the Republican convention. He will depart tonight for Roseburg for a short visit with his half brother, George March, who lives on a fruit ranch about 10 miles from the town.

Judge Bordwell is staying at the Multnomah hotel. He was the guest there at noon today at a luncheon in his honor given by Albert Ehrigert and Mrs. Ehrigert. At the McNamara trial Mrs. Ehrigert was a special writer for The Journal and thus became acquainted with the judge.

Pleased With Portland.
"I have been away from Los Angeles for about two and a half weeks on a little vacation trip," said Judge Bordwell. "I shall return as soon as I can, in a few days with my brother at Roseburg."

"This is the first time I have been in Portland for five years, and the town has grown wonderfully since. One thing that impresses me with Portland is its skyscrapers. It doesn't occupy nearly as much room for its size as Los Angeles."

McNamara Trial.
"The whole skyscraper up here, I notice, but we have done away with them in Los Angeles. Last the city council should issue special permits for skyscrapers. One good result from limiting the height of building is that it causes more structures to be built and makes a bigger business section."

Judge Bordwell said that the McNamara case wasn't the hardest from a legal standpoint that he has had to try, by any means, but he admitted that he as well as everyone else connected with it was mightily relieved when it ended as it did.

"But I have had to work much harder on smaller cases that the public would never hear anything about," said Judge Bordwell. "I have some cases right now involving literal rights and titles to property that involve much more difficult problems than the McNamara case."

Start With Brewster, Road House.
"I'm not going to stand for subterfuges. I'm going to start with the brewers and the road houses and the blind pigs direct. I'll have force enough to help me. I know that single handed I can't do everything at once, but I will do one thing at a time, and Monday, the lawbreakers will begin to know that their business has got to end. The ones I get first won't be treated easily. I am fully prepared to quarter militiamen in the breweries where the law about shipping into dry territory has been violated."

Governor West said he had been told that the main reason for delay was the sickness of the head of the Well-hard brewery, Paul Wessinger. This statement was confirmed by a call at the home of Mr. Wessinger. The brewers have asked for a meeting some time next week, which request the governor says he will grant, but that meanwhile he is going to proceed with his program. He was informed that the real reason for delaying this afternoon's meeting was the brewers' fear of publicity and declared that no such fear would influence his actions.

Woman Arrested as Shoplifter.
Mrs. Chris Tadrik, who claims she lives at 760 Milwaukee street, and is the mother of a 3-day-old baby, was arrested this afternoon in the 5, 10 and 15 cent store by Patrolman Anderson on a charge of shoplifting, and in her possession was found a quantity of goods which she had taken. Most of the goods were handed by the woman to her 3-year-old son, who concealed them in his clothes. The woman, her husband and the small son were taken to police headquarters.

WEST REFUSES TO FURNISH PARTY WITH BREWERIES

Suspicious of Motive That Actuated Request for Postponement of Meeting, He Will Start Crusade Monday.

Governor West in Portland this afternoon declared that without waiting for a meeting that he would help in the parading with roadhouse keepers, he would on Monday put into action a "crusade of law enforcement" that will put law violating brewers and roadhouses out of business.

The governor was frankly suspicious of the motive that actuated the brewers in their request that he postpone the meeting with them in the Armory at 2 o'clock this afternoon.

"There is, after all, no need for any meetings," he exclaimed hotly. "The brewers know my position and they are going to know better that I mean what I say about putting them out of business if they continue to violate the law."

"When the liquor interests combined to put over the 'home rule liquor law' they promised an example of law enforcement that would please all the state. They promised to institute model saloons to run their business entirely within the law. The people believed these promises and did not doubt the promisers."

Start "Come to Time."
"But the liquor men, the brewers especially, have not kept their word. They have not furnished an example of law enforcement, but an example of law violation. Now they've got to come to time."

"I'm not going to call upon the regular officials to help me enforce the law. They are charged with law enforcement now. If they don't help, I'll help myself. But they don't need to have me tell them that the law is being violated. They know it now. I'm not going to run to the district attorney's office and lodge complaints and have him say that if I'll furnish him the evidence he'll enforce the law."

"I know that the law is being violated. I know that liquor in unlabeled packages is being shipped to blind pigs in dry territory. I know that the brewers and the blind pig keepers have been in collusion and have knowingly violated the law. The statement of the brewers that it is no use to label packages is no excuse. They can stamp it right into the packages. The blind pigs can't wash off that kind of a label."

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PACIFIC UNIVERSITY TRUSTEES IN SESSION

An important step in the history of Pacific university is being considered this afternoon at the Y. M. C. A. where the board of trustees of the university is meeting. This is the question of whether or not the retirement of Dr. W. N. Ferrin, who has been president of the institution for the past nine years shall be asked.

For many months past there has been a feeling of dissatisfaction among the alumni, faculty and some of the trustees as to the way in which affairs at Pacific have been carried on. The sentiment has been that the university has not been progressing as rapidly as an institution of its character and with its backing should.

Since Dr. Ferrin assumed the presidency the faculty with the exception of the music department has been opposed to his methods and has failed to give him any support according to statements made by members of the alumni and faculty and it is felt that a man who cannot command support from those under his direction is not a man to be at the head of the institution.

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
