

EQUAL SUFFRAGE LUNCHEON PROVES A GREAT SUCCESS

Oregon Important State in the Fight, Declares Miss Whitney, of California, in Whose Honor Affair Was Given.

Space in the Imperial hotel banquet hall was taxed to its capacity yesterday afternoon and more than 40 who desired seats at the luncheon given in honor of Miss Anita Whitney, the California suffrage worker who is aiding the Oregon women in their campaign for votes, were unable to be accommodated. The luncheon was one of the most successful social events of the kind yet held. Most gratifying to the suffragists was the large number of interested men who attended. Miss Whitney was the speaker of the luncheon and told how the fight in California had been won. She spoke of the real enjoyment with which the women had taken part in the campaign for political freedom.

Oregon is the most important state in the fight for suffrage on the Pacific coast," said Miss Whitney. "The importance lies in the fact that with Oregon in line the Pacific coast will present a solid front of progressive states."

In California, it took months of steady work by both men and women, men who were really interested in the movement and realized that women can be relied upon when occasion calls, men especially of the country who are accustomed to look shoulder to shoulder with the women.

"It is the outlying districts in which the strength of your campaign should be centered. In the city vote is organized and those interested in keeping up vice fear woman's suffrage. They will fight it hardest and it is in the votes of the men of the country that are needed to counteract their warfare."

"Every county in this state should have an effective organization at once. The organizer should keep in touch with the work she started and should return occasionally to keep interest at the highest pitch. Already organizations of excellent character are working in four counties and seven organizations have been started in others. Keep this work up."

Miss Whitney was roundly applauded both as she rose to speak and as she took her seat at the close. A beautiful bouquet of roses was presented to her just as she started to speak. Mrs. La Reine Helen Baker on behalf of the committee in charge of the luncheon.

Organization Discussed.
Other speakers at the luncheon were Miss Emma Wolf, president of the College Equal Suffrage association; Postmaster Merrick, Mr. Eilers, Mrs. W. J. Hawkins and Mrs. Sara Hard Field Ehrig.

Following the luncheon Miss Whitney met with a large number of the women in the parlors and the question of pre-organization was discussed. Another meeting will be held at the Imperial hotel Tuesday morning at 11 o'clock to perfect this work.

The women in charge of the luncheon feel that it has accomplished a great amount of good for their cause, as in addition to the interest aroused several applications have been received for membership.

NEW YORK HARBOR EXPERT LOCAL VISITOR

YOUNG GIRL PROVES A STUBBORN WITNESS

"Go on home, and god luck to you." "Believe me, woman, I'm wise enough to handle myself."

"Take it from me, I'll never tell on Parker."

This is only a sample of what 16 year old Lillian Costello said to her mother this morning in the juvenile court.

The mother interceded for the girl, telling Judge Gatenben that Lillian was a good girl until she met a woman whom she blames for the trouble. The judge directed that she be taken to the Home of Good Shepherd and kept there until she is 21 years old.

While before the judge, the girl was impatient, refusing to answer many questions, and finally replying that she cared not a straw if they did send her to the home.

Lillian Costello was arrested Wednesday night in Vancouver with Mrs. Anna Calkins of 129 Grand avenue. A charge of disorderly conduct was placed against them. But the local police wanted the Calkins woman and secured the release of the parties, bringing them to Portland. The Calkins woman is held in the city jail. She is 22 years old.

WILDOSS OF FLIES HEALTH CAMPAIGN

North Yakima Women's Club Gives Prizes for Destruction of Household Pest, and Gets Remarkable Results.

North Yakima, Wash., June 23.—The number of flies in North Yakima has decreased more than two million in the last three weeks by children who entered the contest for 344 in prizes offered by the North club, a woman's organization of the city, which decided to aid in the anti-fly campaign which the city and county began last year. The contest ended tonight.

Direction of the contest has been by Mrs. Olive Korte, city food inspector. Members of the North club have maintained stations in six places in the city for three weeks at which the dead flies have been received and their number estimated. Each child entering the contest has been provided with quart cardboard cartons such as are used for retelling ice cream.

The number of flies brought in has surprised even the club women, who are responsible for the contest. There was no restriction as to the method in which flies might be caught. Traps, sticky paper, swatters or any other means was allowable. It has been calculated that a quart carton holds about 10,000 flies and several of the contestants have appeared at the city health office with their arms loaded with the paper palis. The prizes were divided in two sets of \$10, \$5 and \$1 each, one for children under 12 and the other for children from 12 to 18 years of age.

RUNAWAY COUPLE LOST TO OFFICERS

Roseburg Pair Disappear on Southbound Train at Grahts Pass.

Roseburg, Ore., June 23.—Although Douglas county authorities are using every effort to trace the couple, 18 year old Ethel Metcalf and her abductor have not been located. The train on which they were thought to be found at San Francisco was thoroughly searched at two California towns but the searches proved fruitless. Sheriff Quinn has wired descriptions of the couple to nearly all important Pacific coast cities in the hope that they may be found.

It is thought possible that the couple may have gotten off the train at Weed, Cal., for Mammoth Falls. The conductor of the train which carried the couple south from Oakland said the girl rode in a seat alone until the train reached Grahts Pass. Then a man came from another car and joined her and they sat together until the train reached Ashland. The conductor's train ended there and trace of the couple was lost.

It is thought possible that the couple may have doubled back and the precaution has been taken to send word to the cities north of here as well as to cities to the south.

The girl's abductor, who represented himself to be a brother of her sweetheart, is described as being about five feet nine inches high, weight about 165 pounds, aged about 25, dark complexion, dark brown hair, smooth shaven, stoop shouldered. He wore a brown suit of the right hand. He wore a brown suit and a soft brown hat. The girl is five feet five inches tall, weighs about 130 pounds, has brown hair, light complexion and a small scar on her face. She wore a suit of mixed gray and red, a light gray hat and carried a white hand bag suspended from a cord over her shoulder.

MANUAL TRAINING SCHOOL AT DAYTON

Widow of Philanthropist Will Aid in Establishing Unique Institution.

Dayton, Or., June 23.—Information has been received by the trustees of the Dayton schools that Mrs. Mary Pietryski, widow of the late Dr. M. Pietryski, while not accepting the terms of her husband's will, by which he bequeathed the bulk of his estate to the Dayton schools, is willing to make a compromise with the trustees on favorable terms.

Dr. Pietryski died about two years ago, leaving an estate, consisting largely of agricultural lands, said to be worth \$220,000. Shortly before his death the doctor made a will, leaving his widow the Dayton residence, an endowment of \$10,000 and an annuity of \$3000. The bequest to the Dayton school district was devised to provide a technical and manual training school within the district. The estate was made up entirely of community property, and some months ago Mrs. Pietryski's attorneys notified the school trustees that the widow would claim her one half interest.

Mrs. Pietryski voluntarily relinquishes to the school district the Dayton residence, one of the finest in the city, near the Central school building, the endowment of \$10,000 and also her annuity of \$3000. Enough funds will shortly be available to justify action being taken towards inaugurating both domestic science and manual training departments in the high school.

OREGON CITY ELKS PLAN TO ENTERTAIN

Oregon City, June 23.—The local lodge of Elks is making extensive preparations for the entertainment of visitors to the grand lodge at Portland, beginning July 3. It is expected that thousands of Elks will make the trip to Oregon City, and committees have been appointed for each day of the grand lodge to care for the visitors. Dr. A. L. Beattie heads the general reception committee.

Word has just been received at the Elks convention commission headquarters that James King, a member of the Topeka, Kan., lodge of Elks, has been appointed grand master, lecturing knight of the grand lodge, a place made vacant by the death of F. B. Kingsley, on June 3, of heart disease. Mr. Kingsley died at his home in Kansas City. King was appointed to the position by Grand Exalted Ruler John Sullivan.

All preparations for the special train that will carry the Idaho Elks to the grand lodge reunion are completed, according to information received here today. All the Idaho lodges, numbering eight, will wear the same kind of uniform. With the exception of Indiana, Idaho is the only state that will attend the grand lodge and participate in the drills as a unit.

It is expected that fully 800 Elks will represent Idaho. The Idaho special will leave Boise on Saturday, July 1, arrive at Portland on Sunday night. They will make their headquarters at the Hotel Portland. Governor James A. Hawley, of Idaho, who is an Elks, expects to attend the reunion here.

Reports from Baker, Or., indicate that at least 250 Elks will attend from there. They will come in a special train and more than six cars are sold out already. The Baker special will leave for Portland on the evening of July 7 and arrive the next forenoon.

Pennsylvania Governor Coming.
During the convention Governor Tener, accompanied by 10 leading citizens of Pennsylvania, who comprise the commission that will select the Pennsylvania state building site at the Panama-Pacific exposition in San Francisco, will be in Portland. They will be royally entertained by the local Elks, and those members who are on the commission will be given all privileges of Elks during their stay in Portland. Assurances to this effect were telegraphed Governor Tener by Secretary Harry McAllister, of the Elks commission, late yesterday. Governor Tener is a past grand ruler of the B. P. O. E.

Among the several state societies that are planning to open headquarters in Portland during the reunion is the Colorado society, which has engaged rooms in the Seaside building. A register will be kept of all Coloradans in Portland, whose addresses are known. Visitors from the state will experience no difficulty in finding their friends who reside here.

The "Baby Oregon," a 37-foot reproduction of the battleship Oregon, which was built by Elks at Bremerton, was put in commission last night. Felicitations of the convention commission were telegraphed the Bremerton lodge in connection with the event. The "Baby Oregon" will be entered as a float in the Elks parade during the reunion.

PERA, KAT., ELY IS APPREHENDED AS LECTURING KNIGHT OF BRBERY PLOT

Death of F. B. Kingsley Leaves Vacancy—Idaho Lodges to Be Fully Represented—200 From Baker, Or.

Marked bills are again playing an important part in a case under investigation by the grand jury, in which the city administration, through the police department, is involved. Under charges of extorting \$40 each from Max Wagmann and Sam Gross, fire protection, Sam Krasner, who has gained wide notoriety in the last year as the alleged official "administration stool pigeon," was a witness before the grand jurors.

Krasner has recently had a falling out with his former friends in the administration, and is now said to be so eager to tell many things that he says he knows. One consequence of this falling out was his arrest with a man named Charles Harris by Detective Maloney and Swennes, and the finding of the \$50 in marked bills on Harris.

Plot Is Alleged.
Krasner is said to have declared while before the grand jurors that the arrest of himself and Harris and the finding of the marked bills was part of a "plot" somewhat similar to the attempted bribery of Deputy District Attorney Collier with marked bills, for which Mayor Rushlight, Chief of Police Slover, Captain of Detectives Baty, ex-Detective Reid and Patrolman Maddux are now under indictment. The grand jury was much interested in his story.

Krasner further volunteered to bring to light evidence in several deals involving members of the police department, which bears the earmarks, it is said, of grafting. While he had no specific details, he declared that he could easily get them, and would take it upon himself to hunt up the evidence.

Because of the possibility that the marked bills in evidence against Krasner were really "planted," especially in view of the fact that they were marked, and of the sensational attempt to get Collier in the act of taking a bribe, the grand jury is inclined to go very hard in the Krasner case and to investigate thoroughly. The jury was excused for today, but will meet again Monday morning.

Mayor Rushlight, Chief Slover and their fellow indictees, will probably be formally arraigned Monday morning before Circuit Judge Kavanaugh on the charge of offering to bribe an officer. District Attorney Cameron is anxious to have the arraignment as early as possible in order that any defects in the indictment can be corrected by the present grand jury.

Mr. Cameron declared this morning that he is not worried at all by the hints of sensationalism against the district attorney's office to be brought out by the administration in the trial. "All this talk and mystery about 'shakedown' in the district attorney's office is mere talk, and contemptible talk at that," he said. "Let them try to prove their charges. That will be a different matter altogether."

EXPRESSES CONFIDENCE IN MAYOR RUSHLIGHT

Mayor Rushlight has received many letters and telephone calls from personal friends expressing their confidence in him despite the fact that he has been indicted because his plan to trap the district attorney's office by having a bribe offered to Deputy District Attorney Collier failed.

The letter reads as follows: "Having read with much interest of your indictment on a bribery charge, as ranking officer of the Salvation Army in Portland I desire to say that we believe in your administration as mayor of the city and we do not believe you are guilty of giving a bribe or taking one."

"We believe that you are filling your position as chief executive of the city to the best interest of it. Therefore, we take this opportunity of expressing our confidence in you."

WOMAN GETS DIVORCE; SAYS MATE BEAT HER

Helen M. Johnson lived with her husband, A. W. Johnson, three years at the St. Francis hotel in San Francisco without knowing the nature of his business. She does not know yet, she testified yesterday before Presiding Judge Kavanaugh in securing a divorce. Cruelty was the ground upon which she based her suit.

The Johnsons were married in August, 1907, in Portland, moving to San Francisco soon after that date. They took apartments at the St. Francis, remaining there until August, 1910. Mrs. Johnson testified her husband choked her in the lobby one evening in the presence of a large number of guests. The same evening, he beat her in their apartments, she says. For five weeks he was drunk each day, according to the testimony. The woman said he had an office down town, but he never allowed her to know his business, further than it had something to do with mining. Johnson made no appearance at the divorce hearing yesterday. The woman was allowed \$50 a month alimony, and her share in his property, whatever it may later prove to be.

Mrs. Louis Miller was granted a decree from Louis Miller on the ground of cruelty. She was also given custody of their minor child, and allowed \$10 a week support for the same. The child is 9 years old, and was a witness against its father. Testimony showed he had abused both the mother and child. Judge Gatenben heard the case.

SPEED OF AUTOS STILL ISSUE IN HOOD RIVER

Hood River, Or., June 23.—The Hood River Automobile club will send a request to the city council next Monday asking that the auto speed limit be raised from 10 to 15 miles per hour. This conclusion was reached at a meeting Wednesday by the local auto drivers. President E. O. Blanchard of the auto club tendered his resignation because he is mayor and would be called upon to act. It is stated by many citizens that if the council votes to increase the speed limit to 15 miles per hour the referendum will be held. It is argued that an auto coming down the steep city streets at 15 miles per hour is beyond control and dangerous. The club also desires an ordinance passed prohibiting reckless driving in cases where the speed is less than 10 miles per hour.

HARRIMAN ENGINEERS SEEK PASS TO SOUND

North Yakima, Wash., June 23.—Harriman surveyors are at work in the hills completing the mapping out of a route for the extension of the O.-W. R. & N. to the sound. The work was cut short by the coming of winter. Two crews were sent out from North Yakima a month ago and are working near the mouth. The route laid out followed the Naches river practically all the way to the Naches Pass. On the west side it follows the Green and White rivers until it cuts almost straight west to Sumner on the Seattle-Portland line, operated jointly by the Hill and Harriman roads.

PROPOSED FRANCHISE TO STREET COMMITTEE

The proposed franchise of the Northwestern Electrical company was referred yesterday by the city executive board to the street committee for a report as to what the committee believes would be a fair valuation of the grant. It will probably be reported back to the board by the next regular meeting and if the report is adopted, as it probably will be, the franchise can be submitted to the council for final action in the course of a month.

One, in Albany, Asks His Aid to Stop Debauchery of 4th in That Dry Town; Hard Words for Business Men.

Albany, Or., June 23.—Among the scores of letters pouring into the office of Governor West from mothers and fathers anxious to uphold his hands in his campaign to enforce the moral laws of the state are many with a gripping appeal. Most of the writers do not care to have their names made public, but the following letter was written by a mother in Albany who says one of her sons has been wrecked and ruined and she appeals to the governor to take quick action to prevent what she estimates will be several more. "There have been hundreds of cases of beer shipped in and unloaded here in the day time, as if it was a saloon town."

"Now, dear friend, I am a mother of several boys, one already wrecked and ruined, and it seems as if he is beyond hope, and another has already been under the influence several times. Now if it is useful you can use my name as I have only given you a few little sketches of the conditions of our town, were it not decorated by the dives of vice that exist here. You will understand they are preparing for the Fourth."

New York, June 23.—Edward J. Kelly, vice president and general manager of the Postal Telegraph Cable company, being sued by the state of Arkansas for combining with the Western Union Telegraph company and the Postal Telegraph company to violate the anti-trust law, said:

"The regular Postal Telegraph Cable company is not the one that has been sued by the state of Arkansas for combining with the Western Union. It is a Bell Telephone concern that has been sued, the Postal Telegraph Cable company of Texas. The words of Texas are a part of its corporate name. The name of our company in Arkansas is the Mackay Telegraph Cable company. The Bell people got our regular Postal name in Arkansas, Texas and Oklahoma many years ago and are holding on to it. They enjoy us from using our own name in Oklahoma. I hope the state of Arkansas succeeds in its suit."

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
