Liquor Sellers Fined

Two convictions were scored this morning by the police against Sunday liquor sellers, who were arrested yesterday. One of \$100 each was assessed against John Conrad, who was arrested by Patrolman Rich in his saloon at 83 Sixth street, and against May Hopkins, who was arrested in the Dewey house at Third and Burnside streets by Patrolmen Sherwood, Miller and Kellogg. Each gave notice of appeal. A. M. Sullivan, a clerk in a drug store conducted by E. E. Bogues at 723 East Morrison street, was arrested yesterday by Sergeant Lyons and Patrolmen Glace and Burston, but as he is under age his case was referred to the juvenile court. The drug store in which he was arrested is known as the Little Pharmacy and was established by H. W. Little, who dropped dead this morning.

Solicitor Arrested

R. Walton, a solicitor for the East Portland Marble Works, has been arrested by Detectives Heller and Howell on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, following an alleged practice of the man of sending in fake orders for tombstones and then collecting commissions on the fake orders. The complaining witness against Walton is N. A. Schannoy, manager of the marble works. It is claimed that Walton would send in a fake order, then after collecting the commission would send in a fake letter from the person supposed to have given the order, asking that the order be held for a short time, until a decision was reached as to where to deliver the stone. The arrest was made at 255 1/2 Grand avenue, where the man roomed.

Policemen Aid Poor Woman

The station officers at police headquarters were responsible for a lightened heart yesterday afternoon, when Patrolman Grism brought to headquarters an old woman giving the name of Mrs. Charles Colvin, who, on her arrival here from The Dalles, found herself without funds. The woman, frantic at her plight, was found at the depot, and when she told her story to the patrolman, she stated that she had a son living at Salem and that if she could get there, he would care for her. Patrolman Grism, Padrick, Coulter and Sergeant Casey raised sufficient funds to send the woman to Salem.

Stranger Dies

A man, who gave the name of Charles Ross, aged 42 years, of San Francisco, was found yesterday morning, lying in the railroad yards near the foot of Fourth street, suffering from a severe illness of the stomach. He appealed to Patrolman Fred Graves who found him, to get him medical attention, and the Red Cross ambulance was called, which conveyed him to St. Vincent's hospital. At 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon, the hospital authorities notified the police station that the man had expired. His body was removed to the morgue. Nothing is known of his relatives. Acute indigestion is believed to have been the cause of his death.

Seek Newspaper Man

The police detectives have been asked by Victoria, B. C., authorities to locate a newspaper man in Portland by the name of Hardy, for the purpose of identifying a Miss Caldwell of Paisley, Scotland, who is in a serious condition in a Victoria hospital as a result of an auto accident. The woman has been unconscious almost all the time since the accident on June 16, but in a moment of consciousness, she stated that her sister was the wife of a man named Hardy, a Portland newspaper man. Detective Hawley has been assigned to the task of locating her brother-in-law.

Chinese Kidnapped

Chong Hock, who was arrested Saturday afternoon at Fifth and Washington streets, after he had run down with his bicycle a woman carrying a small babe in her arms, causing her to drop the child, was this morning fined \$5 by Judge Fawcett for reckless riding. The arrest was made by Traffic Officer Madden, who chased the Chinaman for some distance. The woman who was struck was not found by the patrolman, but it is known that neither she nor the baby which she dropped were injured.

Somebody Milks His Cow

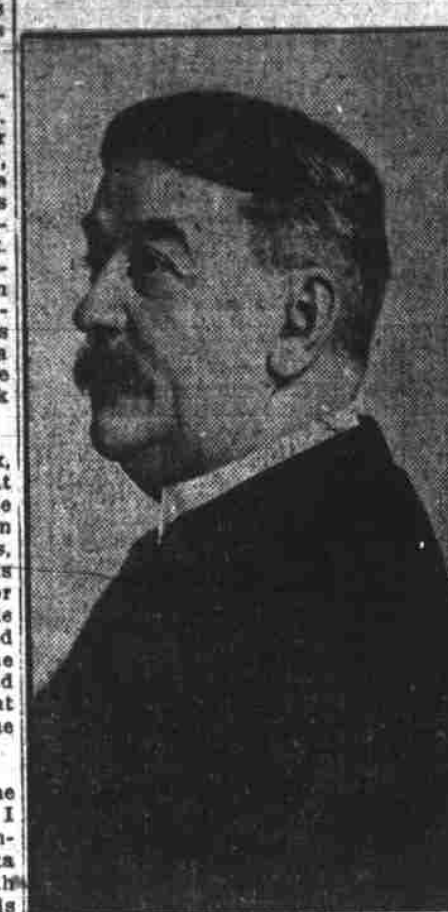

C. J. REED, A POPULAR CLUBMAN, EX-UNITED STATES MARSHAL, DEAD

Death Follows Illness of Three Weeks; Demise Shock to Host of Friends.

Ex-United States Marshal Charles J. Reed, popular clubman and for 30 years a well known and successful business man of Portland, died at his residence, 715 Everett street, at 7:30 this morning. Mr. Reed had been sick for several weeks, and while his condition was known to be serious, his death was not believed to be imminent, and the announcement this morning that he had passed away came as a distinct shock to his hosts of friends. Mr. Reed took to his bed about three weeks ago. At that time no alarm was felt over his condition, but heart weakness soon developed and his two sons who were in the east were called to his bedside. He gradually grew weaker and early last evening became unconscious. Mr. Reed was 57 years old and was a native of Auburn, N. Y. He came to Portland about 30 years ago as the Pacific coast representative of the Osborn Implement company. Later on he entered the life insurance business and at the time of his death represented

Seven years ago Mr. Reed was appointed United States marshal for the district of Oregon by President Roosevelt and served five years. His appointment was brought about through the influence of Francis J. Heney, who was his warm personal friend. Mr. Reed was at all times a loyal defender of the beleaguered California prosecutor and was an ardent admirer of ex-President Roosevelt.

In 1888 Mr. Reed was united in marriage with Miss Margaret Green, daughter of H. D. Green, a pioneer resident of Portland. He is survived by this widow and two sons, John S., employed on the New York American, and Harry G., who recently graduated from Harvard university.

Mr. Reed was a member of the Arlington club and the Waverly Golf club. He was also a member of Trinity Episcopal church. Arrangements for the funeral have not been made.

14 CORPORATIONS SEND DISSOLUTION NOTICES TO SALEM IN ONE DAY

Salem, Or., July 1.—The effect of the secretary of state's vigorous campaign to make all corporations comply with the laws by making annual reports and paying annual fees was shown when 14 notices of dissolution were received in today's mail, coming from corporations which had no further legitimate business to transact. The number received today makes a new record in the secretary of state's office.
