

TRIP TO LAKEVIEW IN AUTO TO PROVE REAL EYE OPENER

Portland Delegation May Be
250 Strong; To Attend Ore-
gon Development League
Meeting There, Aug. 17-27.

Twenty-five to fifty automobiles carrying 125 to 250 Portland citizens are expected to make the long and interesting journey to the Lakeview meeting of the Oregon Development League, August 17 to 27.

Those who took the trip to Burns last October came back so enthusiastic over the unexpected possibilities for development and the magnificent scenery that the longer excursion to Lakeview has awakened an unprecedented interest. Already preliminary announcements of the trip have been issued from the office of C. C. Chapman, development manager of the Commercial club.

The automobile trip through central Oregon will be a revelation to all who have not seen the interior of our great state," reads the announcement. "The dates selected are at an ideal time of the year for trip—the roads will be good, crops will be at their best, night will be cool and day open in automobiles will be comfortable."

Many to Take Trip.
Many volunteer advance reservations have already been received it is stated. The excursion will proceed like a great motor caravan through what was once called the desert of central Oregon. The Portland automobile train will be lengthened by fully 50 machines from interior Oregon on their way to the big Lakeview convention. The first laps of the journey will likely be similar to that of last year as the tentative route includes the exciting run to Burns, but from this point on it will be new country to nearly all.

In order that there may be no uncertainty about the road C. C. Chapman will leave for a path finding tour of two weeks along the route. He will head a party of commercial and railroad men and part of the plan is to definitely establish the route and so completely secure the cooperation of residents along the way that every mile of the road will be put into the best of condition and the possibility of misadventure eliminated. Those who are interested in the Lakeview excursion are asked to notify the Commercial club and all information relative to the country and the tour is to be sent so that things may be seen intelligently.

In the party tomorrow, besides Mr. and Mrs. Chapman, will be G. E. Beck, manager of the Portland Automobile club tour book; C. L. Smith, agriculturist of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company; Phil S. Bates, publisher of the Pacific Northwest; Dr. C. Coe, director of the Bend Commercial club; James E. Smith, secretary of the Central Oregon Development league; Mrs. Sawhill, D. E. Clark, livestock agent of the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company; I. T. Hardy from the traffic department of the Oregon Truck railway; E. Frank, road engineer and co-maker of the Portland auto club, and H. R. Glenn, Pilot of the Portland Auto club.

To Publish Guide.
One of the important results of the journey will be a guide, including maps, showing all the country to be traversed, indicating the interesting points and giving publicity to the advantages of each country.

The itinerary is subject to change dependent on roads and weather, but if followed will take the party out from the Dulles by way of Dufur and Wamto tomorrow; en route to Pendleton Tuesday; Prineville, Redmond and Burns on Wednesday; the long road through Hampton valley to Burns on Thursday; Friday and Saturday to Harney and Lake counties; Sunday is not mentioned. Monday is to be spent at Lakeview. Tuesday, July 16, will see the party en route to Klamath Falls, and Wednesday to Pelican and Fort Klamath; Thursday to Silver Lake, Summer Lake and Paisley; Friday to Crescent, La Pine and Bend; Saturday, July 20, will see the party en route to Portland and home. A more extensive automobile journey has never before been attempted in Oregon.

PORTLAND PARKWAY TO BE FORMALLY OPENED

The opening of the Portland Parkway across the Tillamook tract Tuesday, for which affair the Elks have agreed to stand sponsor, will be an interesting event, and will afford the visiting Elks as well as Portland people an opportunity to view a link of parking that is unsurpassed for scenery. To make the opening of some of the scenic surroundings have been made for parade over the parkway, and a short opening program at the south end of the route.

Leaving the Elks' building at 1:30 o'clock Tuesday, the parade will move south on Seventh street to Hall, east to First and south to Hamilton avenue and the Parkway. The party will return over the Slavin road and Corbett streets. All improvement clubs are invited to send delegates and delegations. With the completion of the parkway, Portland is given another beautiful drive, and at the same time the thoroughfare opens up a splendid route to the suburbs south of the city.

Philomath, Or., July 6.—A "Ballots for Women" song, addressed to the men of Oregon, has been written by Mrs. Winnie Hull Springer, of Philomath, who explains her enthusiasm for equal suffrage as follows:

"My grandfather and grandmother were the Reverend and Mrs. John S. Reasoner, who crossed the plains with a large family in 1852. My mother, Mrs. Ellen Reasoner Hull, was one of the children who came across with them. My grandmother and my mother were brave women. I am glad they were not the 'Fluffy Ruffles' type that thinks it womanly to faint at the sight of a mouse and to disclaim the possession of a brain."

"My grandmother believed in the enfranchisement of women as does also my mother, and I am greatly interested in it. My mother will soon be 70. I want her to see the victory before she dies."

Mrs. Springer's "Ballots for Women" song follows:

"Behind the plodding oxen
Years ago our mothers came,
To found here a sovereign state,
And here our home remained.
Patriotism to our hearts is kindred,
To public spirit our hearts beat true,
Then why should not the ballot
Be for us as well as you?"

OROZCO BEGINS SONORA INVASION

Rebel Chieftain Seeks Port
Through Which He Can
Secure Ammunition.

(United Press Special Wire.)
El Paso, Texas, July 6.—By dividing his army and sending half of it from Juarez to Sonora, General Pascual Orozco today began a bold executive of the western state and the carrying out of his plan to get a port through which ammunition can be secured. Orozco will hold Juarez as the rebel capital and as a base for his forces in western Chihuahua will attack Guaymas and Agua Prieta for bases in Sonora.

It was asserted in Juarez today but denied by rebel chiefs, that the rebels expect to get ammunition and money from Japan as soon as they get a western port, and that Japan will receive in return land concessions on the west coast.

No attack on Juarez by federalists is now anticipated, as it is believed General Huerta, the federal commander, as quickly as he can repair the railroad out of Chihuahua, will move his army to Sonora rather than come to Juarez. Governor Felipe Gutierrez, rebel executive of Chihuahua state, has established his government in the Juarez customs house. The legislature will convene Monday.

Arthur Evans, of Deming, N. M., is held a prisoner by rebels south of Columbus, N. M., and a companion is said to have been killed when rebels attacked them. Evans' brother came here today to try to secure the release of the American.

PORTLAND MAN TO GO EAST FOR G. N.

William Blonder Chosen Travel-
ing Immigration Agent;
Show Oregon Products.

William Blonder, of this city, has been appointed traveling immigration agent for the Great Northern railway in the east. The appointment was made yesterday by General Immigration Agent E. G. Leedy at St. Paul, Mr. Blonder is at present right-of-way agent for the Multnomah Central Railway company and formerly was contracting freight and passenger agent for the Mount Hood Railway & Power company, which is now a part of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company.

Mr. Blonder is a native of New York and for several years was connected with the United States immigration service at Ellis island, N. Y., in the capacity of interpreter, for which position he was particularly fitted by reason of his knowledge of central Europe. He was also for a time connected with the New York state bureau of deportation and has investigated the immigration problem in Europe.

In company with F. W. Graham, western industrial and immigration agent, and Messrs. A. M. Shaw and E. A. Wilson, agricultural experts of the Great Northern railway, who will arrive in Portland on the Great Northern Elks' special Monday, Mr. Blonder will make a trip through the Willamette valley and central Oregon over the Hill lines to familiarize himself with the oppor-

tunities and resources of the state before taking up his duties in the east. "This new appointment," said Mr. Graham, "is in line with the company's plan for a continuation and enlargement of the scope of the immigration department in the east. We will make exhibits of Oregon products again this season in the land shows and at state and county fairs and in our eastern city offices and exhibition cars."

"Exceptionally choice exhibit material will be available this year, owing to the unusually favorable weather conditions and ample moisture which has prevailed. We expect to be able to show agricultural and horticultural products in our exhibits which no other section of the country can beat."

"Taking our products back east and showing the actual goods has proven to be the most effective way of attracting desirable colonists."

"We will also put on stereopticon and motion picture lectures in connection with our exhibits before meetings and assemblages of various kinds where opportunity offers."
