

OPEN HOUSE KEPT AT SEATTLE: 2000 ELKS ENTERTAINED

Claims of Sound City for 1915 Convention Impressed on Delegates as They Pass Through to Portland.

(Special to The Journal.) Seattle, Wash., July 8.—An open house still the rule with Seattle Lodge No. 92, which has entertained more than 2000 Elks enroute to Portland. Yesterday was a gala day, 1000 registering at the lodge club. This morning hundreds resumed their journey to Portland and at noon today the Duluth delegation departed. The Brooklyn crowd, which was expected yesterday, was delayed enroute and did not arrive until 1:30 this afternoon. It is expected it will remain just between trains as it is in a hurry to reach the grand lodge. It will be rested and entertained by No. 92 as have all other visitors who have welcomed the chance to break the long journey.

Yesterday morning a score of Seattle Elks went to Victoria and returned by boat with several hundred eastern delegates, who were warmly welcomed and incidentally impressed with Seattle's claims for the 1915 grand lodge. On this boat came delegates from Connecticut, Boston, Indianapolis and several Ohio lodges. In the Connecticut delegation were 202, while 122 registered from Ohio and Indianapolis. Yesterday morning came delegations from Denver, St. Louis, St. Paul and scattering Illinois towns. Some of these continued by a late night train, but a majority proceeded this morning, including the entire Boston party, in which are L. Levi, past exalted ruler of Boston No. 10, and Frank King, grand esteemed leading knight.

The Indianapolis party included Colonel Russell Harrison, son of Benjamin Harrison, representing Indianapolis No. 12, and selected to command his division in the Portland parade, Samuel V. Parrott, secretary of the Elks' national home commission and vice president of the Indiana State association, are also in this party. Seattle Elks entertained the visitors yesterday with auto rides and open house, all being initiated into the Potlatch.

Many local members left this morning for Portland and a big delegation is to leave Wednesday night in two special trains of ten cars each. Bremerton also leaves Wednesday.

THIS IS BAD DAY FOR ONE "KAP" KUBLI

"Kap" Kubli, chairman of the Portland Elks' commission, had a fine time yesterday. But today he paid for it. Kubli was one of the 68 Elks appointed special policemen for the week of the big doings. The other 47 received common ordinary every day police stars, but Kubli, representing that he, as chairman of the Elks' commission, was entitled to more authority than his underlings, persuaded Chief Slover to grant him a sergeant's star. Having gotten this, he proceeded Saturday and Sunday to show his superiority by giving orders right and left to the unfortunate Elks who had only gotten patrolmen's stars.

He took particular pleasure in assigning George H. Kelly, the millionaire timberman, to an obscure beat in lower Albina. This made Kelly was wroth. Kelly swore to have revenge. Today he went to the office of Mayor Rushlight and reported that Kubli had been exceeding his authority and that he might, if permitted to go on his way unmolested, involve the city in a damage suit. Kelly suggested that the mayor increase the size of Kubli's bond.

The mayor thought that a fine suggestion. He ordered "Sergeant" Kubli's bond raised to \$5000. The other Elks with ordinary stars only have to pay commission on bonds of \$1000 each. Kubli says he will turn in his star before Kelly has his bond increased to such an amount that he will have to apply for a receiver.

BANDS IN PLENTY PARADE STREETS

Baker Organization Serenades Business Houses; Music Heard in Every Corner.

All dressed in their natty uniforms, wearing white straw hats with purple bands, 220 members of the Elks lodge of Baker, Or., arrived in Portland at 8:20 o'clock this morning, accompanied by the Baker band of 23 pieces. They did not wait even to register or to see that their baggage was disposed of before starting a march through the streets.

With the band in the lead playing popular airs, and the Elks singing, they fairly took the downtown district by storm, for no one expected them until late this morning. Among the first business serenades by the band was The Journal. Several numbers were given, among them being a number of Elks pieces, which made a great hit with the crowd which gathered around the company.

The band is about 11 years old, and has won a large number of prizes throughout the state. While the Elks were in Los Angeles two years ago during the reunion, the Baker band captured second prize in the band competition. W. C. Nadeau is director of the musical organization.

The band members are staying at the Occidental hotel, while the Elks members have taken up their headquarters at the Oregon hotel.

Among the other bands and musical bodies which arrived in Portland this morning was the Band of California, accompanying the Elks' delegation from Oakland, and drill team. All of the members of this team were dressed in their deep purple uniforms and made a very presentable showing as they paraded the streets. Under the leadership of B. J. Carey, the Idaho State band took possession of the veranda of the Portland hotel and played welcome pieces. Thirty-six musicians are in the organization. The band accompanied the delegates from Moscow, Idaho.

A fife and drum corp of 40 members presented a novel sight as they paraded through the streets, playing almost continually. The organization are in for winning at least one prize. They accompanied the Elks from Great Falls, Mont. Most of the members are Elks.

The Montana state band consisting of 45 members from Kallispell, Mont., expect to carry back with them one of the band contest prizes. The members are gathered from all of the Elks' lodges of Montana. They have taken up their quarters at the Portland hotel.

With the La Grande Elks is the La Grande band under the leadership of A. P. Snapp. In the organization are 24 musicians, a large percentage of them are Elks. The band has been organized but a year and a half yet by the showing made this morning one would be led to believe that they had been organized much longer.

ELK FLOAT TO BE IN THE ELECTRIC PARADE

Over the same route that it traversed in the Rose Festival, the electric parade will wind its way tomorrow night for the entertainment of visiting Elks. In addition to the 17 floats of the original production, there will be another float symbolical of the order of Elks.

Mr. Kribbs suggested that inasmuch as the Elks are a patriotic order, the representation of Columbia would be extremely fitting, and his opinion prevailed. Columbia will be selected by George L. Hutchins, manager of the Rose Festival and prominent Elk, from among the girls who rode on the floats at the festival parades.

The route of the parade tomorrow night will be: From Nineteenth street down Washington to Fifth, to Morrison, to Eleventh, to Hall, around the loop to Thirteenth, to Washington to Fifth again, and up Morrison to Nineteenth street and disband.

ARCHBALD SHOULD BE IMPEACHED, SO COMMITTEE FINDS

Thirteen Articles of Impeachment Presented to House of Representatives by the Judiciary Committee.

(United Press Special Wire.) Washington, July 8.—Formal demand that Judge W. Archbald of the United States commerce court be impeached for "misbehavior and high crimes and misdemeanors" was made to the house of representatives today by the judiciary committee. The committee declared Archbald's sense of moral responsibility has become "deadened," and that he "has prostituted his high office for personal profits."

Thirteen articles of impeachment were presented in the resolution. The judiciary committee's report on the investigation of the commerce court judge filed supplementary to these formal demands, bristled with denunciation of Archbald.

"The testimony in the whole case," the report says, "tends to support the general specification of general misbehavior."

PENNSYLVANIA LODGES ARRIVED THIS MORNING

"The Elks Special" running under the auspices of Pittsburgh lodge, No. 11, B. P. O. E., Pittsburgh, Pa., arrived this morning bringing 68 visitors from western Pennsylvania lodges. ALL TRANSPORTATION RECORDS BROKEN BY GREAT ELK INFLUX

All Portland transportation records have been completely smashed by number of special trains and the amount of equipment used to bring the Elks of the nation to the Rose City. Traffic managers are wondering today how in the world the systems were able to recruit enough train crews and equipment to handle all the crowds that have been coming from every direction.

The share of the O. W. R. & N. company in bringing the Elks to Portland was 27 special trains. Fourteen special trains come in over the O. W. R. & N. lines in three days.

The Southern Pacific is next in the list with an approximate of 25 special trains. The California contribution to the Elks' convention was 3000. Albany will send 800 Wednesday or Thursday, seeking to win the prize for the largest attendance from any one town.

Eugene sent 400. The Great Northern railroad reported this morning 11 special trains and five special parties, a total of 16 specially equipped trains. The S. P. & S. road handled four specials. No definite report was given by the Northern Pacific but the estimate is of 14 special trains over this line.

In addition to the special equipment the regular service on all lines has been greatly burdened and some of the trains have been traveling in four and five sections.

DETECTIVES TO WORK 14 HOURS EACH DAY

Portland detectives will work 14 hours a day beginning this morning, according to an order issued by Captain of Detectives Burt this morning and more time will be put in if necessary. Very little attention will be paid to minor cases reported this week, and a warning against promiscuous cashing of checks for strangers has been issued for no effort can be made by the police detectives to handle these cases this week. Pickpockets and bunco men are to be watched for by all the members of the detective department. People are warned not to leave their money in easy pockets to reach, the men being urged to use an inside vest pocket and the women, to avoid the swinging handbags.

The Portland police band will lead the big electric parade tomorrow night and will give several concerts during the week.

The police have been asked to keep the Court of Honor cleared of all "dead" vehicles during the day and at night between the hours of 8 and 12, to exclude all traffic except hotel busses. These requests will be complied with as nearly as possible.

MURDER OF TEMOT LAID AT DOOR OF COLUMBIA GEORGE

Indian Who Helped Murder Anna Edna Twelve Years Ago Suspected of Killing Another Squaw.

(Special to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., July 8.—Charged with the atrocious murder of Temot, an aged squaw, Columbia George, the Umatilla Indian pardoned two years ago, after having served ten years of a life sentence for murder of Anna Edna, a medicine woman, is today in the local jail, having been arrested last night by Agent Swartzlander after investigation had turned suspicion in his direction.

The body of the squaw was found yesterday morning by a fisherman lying in a pool in the Umatilla river, two miles above this city. Her skull had been crushed by a blow from a large rock and she had been stabbed in the throat and face 15 times.

Investigation disclosed that Columbia George and William Switzer, another Indian, had been the last persons seen with Temot. The two had eaten supper Friday evening at the Sam Bittner ranch near the scene and while eating the squaw had finished up the brush skirting the camp and furtively watched the officers, who were as furtively watching him.

It was about 12 years ago that Columbia George and Toy-Toy murdered Anna Edna on the local reservation, by giving her whiskey which contained strychnine. Anna Edna was a medicine woman and was called to attend Toy-Toy's little daughter during illness. The child died and its death sealed the fate of the medicine woman, too.

This is the second tragedy in the family of Temot in the past month, her only son, John Walatsti, the famous Carlisle athlete, having committed suicide in this city about six weeks ago.
