

## OLD BLACK MARE ARRIVES TO TAKE WEST TO IDAHO

If She Isn't Too Lame, Oregon Governor Will Ride Her to Boise, Setting Out July 13 on Novel Vacation.

Salem, Or., July 10.—Governor West will start next Saturday on his horseback ride across the state and over the border to Boise, Idaho, where he will attend the conference of governors to be held early in August.

"My old black mare has been brought in from the ranch," said the governor today, and his eyes twinkled with anticipated pleasure. "She is a regular iron horse, one of the best I ever rode, but I noticed she is a little lame and I may have to get another horse yet."

The black mare has been doing duty in the hop fields and the governor has not yet found out how serious is her lameness, but he is hoping she will be all right for the trip as he is planning riding her the entire distance, instead of having relays.

Just before the governor leaves he will ride in a parade at the Cherry Festival here, garbed in his cowboy accoutrements.

"A man asked me yesterday how I was going to get the horse back," said the governor, smiling. "I told him I wasn't worrying about how the horse was going to get back as I had troubles enough in seeing how the horse was going to get there."

The governor expects to make the trip his vacation and is expecting a great deal of pleasure from it. He will deliver a number of addresses en route on good roads.

## 6 NOTORIOUS "YEGGS" ARE UNDER ARREST

Six notorious "yegg" men, one of whom is wanted for murder, have been arrested by Detectives Coleman and Snow in the past 36 hours, and are being held now until other police authorities can be communicated with to learn if they are wanted.

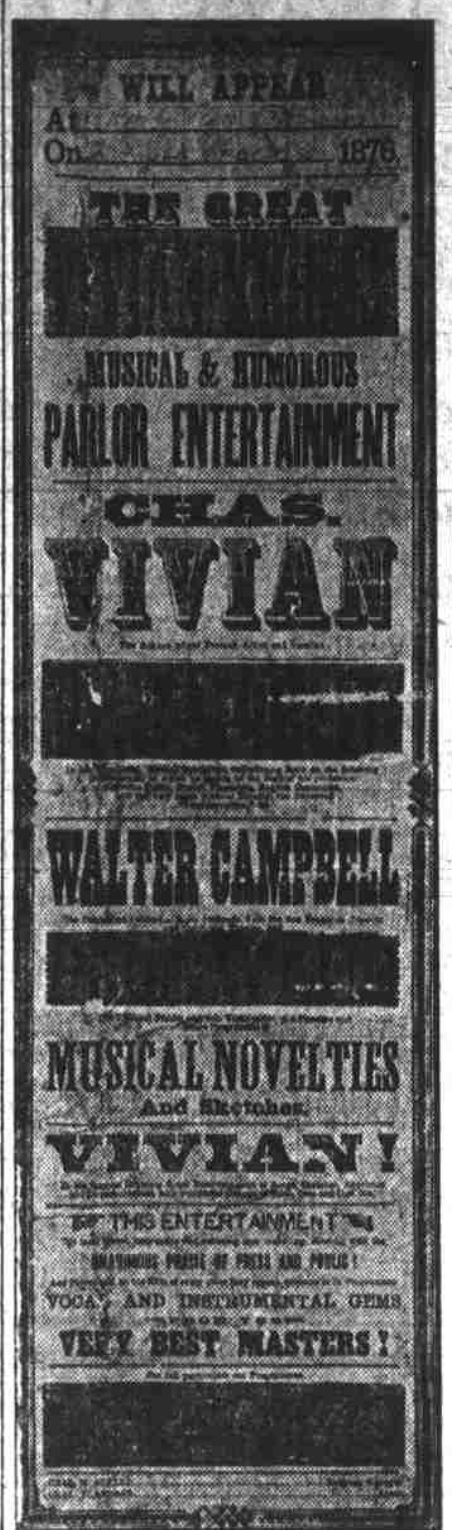
The suspected murderer is James Brown, alias "Shy" Brownie, who in 1909, it is alleged, with a gang, held up a train near Galesburg, Ill., in which one of the robbers was injured, and then was shot to death by Brown to keep him from talking. It is for this alleged murder that he is said to be wanted.

The others under arrest are T. Kavanaugh, known as "Baton Jimmy," who has served terms at Auburn, N. Y., and Jackson, Mich., for "yegg jobs"; Ed Burns, alias "Skippy" Eubanks, alias New York Eddy, who is wanted for breaking his parole from the Michigan City, Ind., penitentiary, and who has served time at Columbus, Ohio, and Jackson, Mich.; Eugene Farrell, a hold-up man; John White, who is wanted here for a series of robberies during the Rose Festival, and Ben Hogan, alias "Pap Ryan," who has just been released from the penitentiary at New Westminster, B. C., and who was arrested here on May 29, 1903, by Detectives Kerrigan and Snow as a pick-pocket.

## HISTORY RECALLED BY FADED POSTER

Relic Brings to Mind the Early Days of the Elks' Lodge.



This is way the banner was floated way back in 1876—it is a different banner now.

Salem, Or., July 10.—One of the prized possessions of the Salem lodge of Elks is an old, somewhat faded poster, which is neatly framed and hangs in a place of honor on the walls of the lodge room. This poster announced the coming of Charles Vivian, founder of the great fraternal organization which is holding its annual reunion in Portland this week, and his troupe of entertainers, who gave a performance in the old Reeds opera house, March 21 and 22, 1876.

Eight or nine years ago the march of progress swept before it an old one-story frame building, almost in the center of one of the principal business blocks facing on Commercial street, and when the workmen were razing the structure Dr. H. H. Olinger discovered this old poster posted on a side wall, which had been hidden by the adjacent building. He carefully removed and preserved the relic of the days when the versatile Vivian entertained enthusiastic audiences. A little later Thomas R. Wilson, Bertillon expert and book-keeper at the state penitentiary, framed the poster and presented it to the local lodge.

This poster recalled, as scarcely any other relic could have, the founding of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, which grew out of that jolly club of "Jolly Corks" away back in the '60s. Vivian, the son of an English minister, was an actor of the first rank, and he drew about him in New York a crowd of fellow actors and organized a club called the "Jolly Corks." It became a popular and membership so much sought that Vivian saw the possibilities of a great fraternal organization—and the Elks lodge resulted.

The poster tells of "The great Vivian-Kohler musical and humorous parlor entertainment. Charles Vivian, the acknowledged protean and vocalist. Vivian, in his famous drawing room entertainment of songs, sketches, anecdotes and impersonations, with wonderful change of voice, face and costume."

## PORTLAND FIRM WINS FREIGHT RATE ACTION

Washington, D. C., July 10.—The interstate commerce commission in the case of the Pacific Stationery & Printing company of Portland, against the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company, decides the rates on writer presses, addressing machines, etc., from Al. Crosse and Chicago to Portland, are unreasonable to the extent that they exceed \$4.50 per cwt.

The sub committee of the committee on appropriations assures Senator Bourne that it will recommend \$100,000 for Crater Lake improvements. It is expected the whole committee will approve.

**Governor Opens Exposition.**  
Winnipeg, Man., July 10.—The Canadian Industrial Exhibition, for which Winnipeg and a large section of western Canada have been preparing for nearly a year, was formally opened this afternoon by his royal highness the Duke of Connaught.

The exhibition is the largest and most notable affair of its kind ever held west of Toronto. A daily pageant will be given illustrating the founding of the first settlements on the Red river by the hardy Scotch pioneers sent out by Lord Selkirk in 1812.

Wonderful Scotch Collie to Do Mathematical Act—Lecture Tonight by Chicagoan—Speaker Lauds Wilson.

At Gladstone park it is high carnival for the children today, and the attraction is the wonderful Scotch collie, "Bronte," said to be the best known dog in the world. It is claimed that her work is absolutely genuine, and her mathematical feats and mind reading are purely mental work, and to the children it will matter little, for "Bronte" will afford them a great deal of fun and amusement for the present and a lesson to store away for some future use. As a result of a reduction in admission for children under 15 years of age today, the park is swarming with youngsters.

The Chapman orchestra will give two concerts during the day, one at the opening of the afternoon meeting and one at 7:15 this evening.

**Chicagoan to Speak.**  
"The Criminal in the Making" will be the subject tonight of the lecture by Judge Frank P. Sadler. Later Judge Sadler will speak on "The Criminal in the Making." Mrs. Ella Flagg Young, superintendent of public schools of Chicago, has said: "The speaker of these lectures are an indication of the trend of his thought in trying to prevent the lowering of the standard of morals among young people," and an eminent jurist of Chicago, in giving him high praise, said: "Judge Sadler's ability as an orator is unquestioned." Previous to this lecture, Professor Lee Emerson Bassett will give his first reading. Professor Bassett is in charge of the Shakespeare class. Incidentally, this will be a Shakespeare year at Chautauqua. The Shakespeare Study club of Portland has installed one of the coziest and most pleasant headquarters on the grounds. It is on the main walk midway between the auditorium and the headquarters of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs. With them have joined the Shakespeare department of the Oregon City club, the Shakespeare study class of the White Temple, and the Rose City Shakespeare club. A round table will be conducted informally each day and an interesting discussion will be carried on over the tea-cups, for it is intended to emphasize the social side of club life.

**Classes Open.**  
Just as though the work of last year had just been laid aside for a little rest, many of the departments resumed this morning with apparently little interruption, though many of the instructors are new and some untried studies will be taken up.

Mrs. Ellen Miller, instructor of domestic science at Jefferson high school, will be the instructor of this class. Quite a modern kitchen has been equipped.

Perhaps the airiest, the most comfortable and the "homeliest" place on the grounds is the spacious tent of the Oregon Federation of Women's clubs. It is in charge of Mrs. M. A. Dalton, who for many years has represented the federation at Chautauqua, and been hostess at the headquarters.

Near by is the tent of the Portland Woman's club. It is gay with banners, streamers and "Votes for women" pennants. It, too, is cozy and comfortable, and in charge of Mrs. Dalton.

The W. C. T. U. cottage is a busy place. Its comfortable living room is a convenient place to meet friends or make new ones, or rest and chat a while. Mrs. Eva C. Wheeler, state superintendent of the temperance work among young people, is in charge.

**Elks Change Program.**  
The "Hello Bills" passed one on the Byron Troubadours when they prevented the musicians from appearing on the program yesterday afternoon. Not intentionally, of course, but because the herd was driving into Portland in such numbers that the railroads gave them the right of way and brought all other trains into Portland hours late, and on one of them were the members of this musical company.

Dr. William Spurgeon of London, a son of the great divine of that name, made a masterly address, in the course of which he referred once or twice to "your next president, Woodrow Wilson," which was greeted with enthusiastic applause. He took occasion also to laud New Jersey's governor for the forceful and definite way he handled the moral questions of the state. Dr. Spurgeon will have charge of the Bible study class, and he will again be heard from on the platform of the forum on July 17, and on the afternoon of July 19.

The solo work of Miss Leah Slusser at yesterday afternoon's program delighted everyone present.

Thursday night will be one of the great Chautauqua events, for it is rarely that a woman so much in demand as Mrs. Frances Squire Potter can be induced to come to the coast, and it is only now because she is en route home from the great convention of club women recently held at San Francisco. Mrs. Potter's subject will be "When Women Go Out to Work." A special car has been chartered, and it is now probable another will have to be secured, to take a delegation of women up to hear her.

The cars will leave First and Alder streets at 8 p. m. sharp on Thursday, July 11. With Mrs. Potter is a suffragist, she is before all else an educator and student of social and industrial conditions, and her talk will deal more with these things than with suffrage.
