Prominent Speakers on Both Sides of Question to Be Heard This Afternoon; Woman's Day; Big Crowds.

MAZAMAS BEGIN ASCENT OF HOOD

Special Train Carries Sixty Climbers to Camp Above Parkdale.

Hood River, Or., July 16.—Under the leadership of Francis Benefiel, chairman of the Mazamas of Portland, 60 mountain climbers arrived in Hood River yesterday and took a special train over the Mt. Hood railroad to Parkdale, from where they will walk 11 miles to camp near Mt. Hood. This outing is the nineteenth anniversary of the Mazama club, which was organized on the summit of Mt. Hood.

The climb will be made from the north side of the mountain, where cables have been lowered from the top of the mountain to aid in the ascent. The party will be in camp 14 days. Elliot, Ladd, Newton Clark, Zigzag, White River and Coe glaciers will be visited by the climbers before their return home. It is planned to illuminate the summit of Hood on Friday night by burning several hundred pounds of red fire.

FEDERAL PATROL NOT YET IN WOODS

State Forester Impatiently Awaits Authority to Send It Out.

Salem, Or., July 16.—The work of putting the federal forest patrol force into the field is being delayed because the secretary of agriculture has failed to notify State Forester Elliott whether the department approves his plan of placing and using the men to be employed out of the funds appropriated to Oregon by the national government. "I have the men, with the exception of one or two, all ready and intend to put them out today," said Mr. Elliott, "but I can't proceed until I hear from the department. These warm days are drying up the forests rapidly and the men are needed out in the timber now. This is particularly so of southern Oregon."

The government appropriated \$10,000 for use in Oregon in assisting to patrol the national forests this season, and some time ago the forestry department requested maps and details of the state forester's plans showing how and where he intended using the federal patrolmen, the state patrolmen and where men employed by private capital would patrol. This information was furnished, but so far the government officials have made no reply. Considerable telegraphing has been done to the department at Washington, D. C., in an effort to find out the status of affairs.

AUMSVILLE STATE BANK IS GRANTED CERTIFICATE

Hatchery Men to Work 8 Hours.

Salem, Or., July 16.—Complying with a request from State Labor Commissioner O. P. Hoff, R. E. Clanton, master fish warden, has issued an order to the superintendents of the state fish hatcheries to see that the employees work only eight hours a day. Some time ago complaint was made to Mr. Hoff that at one of the hatcheries the men were being employed 10 hours.

ROOSEVELT ELECTORS BUT NO COUNTY THIRD PARTY IN WASHINGTON

Seattle, Wash., July 16.—With representatives from 22 counties in the conference, the insurgents in this state agreed to put Roosevelt electors in the field, but turned down a motion to put up a third party ticket on county and state offices. An overwhelming majority in the conference was of the opinion that the progressives can win so far as the state ticket is concerned in the regular primaries. Fourteen delegates to the third party convention at Chicago were selected.

WHAT THE GOVERNOR OF WISCONSIN HAS TO SAY

Governor McGovern of Wisconsin in a recent speech upon the Public Utility Commission law of Wisconsin, presented the following statement of facts:

"The basic legal principles underlying governmental regulation of public utilities are founded upon the very elementary distinction between a public and a private calling."

"One is clothed with a public use and interest, while the other is not; and the public interest has always, in the eye of the law, justified regulation in behalf of the people as a whole."

"The nature and character of the business of utilities is such that competition is inoperative in determining service or rates, and the only choice left to the public is between regulated and unregulated monopoly. It goes without saying that the right of the state to supervise monopolies is as ancient as it is obvious."

Oregon's new public utility law goes into effect in November. It gives the Commission power to fix the price to be charged for light and power as well as determine the character of the service.

Under such conditions Governor McGovern holds in effect that Portland would make a mistake in having two electric light companies.

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
