Mrs. Louis James Appears in
"Holding a Husband" at
Orpheum; Other Acts.

Mrs. Louis James is assigned headline position on the new Orpheum bill and makes good in her bright triangular comedy, "Holding a Husband." The chief merit of the skit lies more in the lines than in situations, and the farce element is a strong factor in its success.

Dainty and fascinating little Marguerite Haney, supported by Ralph Lynn, is back again in B. A. Rolfe's hilariously good musical comedy, "The Leading Lady." Miss Haney has lost none of her charm through repetition, and Mr. Lynn is just as refreshingly funny. They are a splendid dancing pair. The set is swaggy and the chorus girls appear in a series of smart costumes. Basil Lynn gives a pleasing bit as William, the earl's man. The act is one of the very best of its sort and met with high approval. The Empire comedy four were heartily welcomed and forced to respond to numerous encores. Their act is little changed but they are one of the standard comedy quartets and can always be depended upon to give full satisfaction with their fun and singing.

GRAND LODGE OF THE A. O. U. W. CONVENES

With delegates from 86 subordinate lodges in attendance, the biennial convention of the Oregon grand lodge of the Ancient Order of United Workmen convened for business at the Multnomah hotel this afternoon.

Judge George T. Baldwin, grand master, presided. The morning session was devoted to the reports of the credentials committee, and the reports of officers and recommendations of committees.

According to the grand master, the lodge's revenue is now \$215,000, the total cash assets \$246,000, and the membership approximately 3500.

The lodge is a state organization, having broken away from the national body several years ago. It terminated its affiliation with the national lodge owing to dissatisfaction over the handling of finances.

Elections will be held either this afternoon or tomorrow. It is generally understood that P. H. D'Arcy of Salem, now grand foreman, will be elected to succeed Judge Baldwin as grand master.

Officers of the lodge are: Philip Gevurtz, Portland, past grand master; Judge George Baldwin, Klamath Falls, grand master; P. H. D'Arcy, Salem, grand foreman; C. H. Dye, Oregon City, grand overseer; J. M. Dixon, Portland, grand recorder; R. L. Durham, Portland, grand receiver.

Prominent among visitors present at the meeting of the grand lodge today were J. H. Borge of Vancouver, Wash., grand master of the Washington organization; L. F. Hart of Tacoma, chairman of the law committee, and J. H. Helmer of Seattle, the grand recorder.

PRaises OREGON'S CHEESE INDUSTRY

Resources Ample to Support
Many More Farmers, De-
clares U. S. Expert.

"I am very much interested in the reports of the manner in which the cheese industry is handled at Tillamook," said B. H. Rawl, chief of the dairy division, bureau of animal industry, department of agriculture, who is visiting the Pacific coast on a trip of general inspection. "I intend to take a trip to that section, leaving tomorrow."

"Western Oregon has splendid resources for the dairy industry and it should receive the support of both residents of the country and of the cities. This country should support many more dairy farmers than it does at present. Climate, markets, food supplies, water and all conditions are above the average."

"The climatic conditions are excellent as the cows can be fed grass the year round and need little dry food. Alfalfa can be grown in such quantities that comparatively little ground is needed to care for a herd of dairy cows. Alfalfa I believe to be the best food obtainable for milk cows."

"The market takes care of itself and does not need to be sought. The present high prices for dairy products, I believe, are due to the fact that the demand is greater than the supply. The western markets are good, and when they are full there are always the eastern markets to fall back on. The demand for dairy products is on the increase everywhere and the supply is not keeping pace by a great deal. There is no reason why Oregon farms should not produce enough to supply the local market and to ship quantities away."

"My trip through the Pacific coast here merely to get a general idea of conditions and to confer with men in touch with conditions in the various localities."

"The present efforts of the department of agriculture along the lines of dairying are directed toward the utilization of the by-products of butter and

cheese manufacture. Skimmed milk and whey contain rich food values that are present are largely lost and it is to discover means by which these can be made to yield a profit that the experiments are being pursued."

FREIGHT SERVICE TO ALBANY ESTABLISHED

Wilbur B. Coman, general freight and passenger agent of the Hill lines in Oregon, announces that on July 18, freight service, through and local, will be established on the new extension of the Oregon Electric between Salem and Albany. Through merchandise service will be instituted between Portland and Albany, shipments leaving here in the evening being received in Albany the next day, and, conversely, evening shipments from Albany being received here the next day. At all stations between Salem and Albany local merchandise service will be handled only in carload lots, this because freight stations at way stations have not been completed and probably will not be for 30 days. A very commodious and centrally located freight station with team tracks has been built at Albany.

SOUTHERN PACIFIC HEAD PINS FAITH IN PORTLAND

The immense expenditure in Oregon proposed by the Southern Pacific is due to the confidence in Portland held by the heads of the system, said President Sproule of the Southern Pacific in an informal address at the Commercial club yesterday afternoon.

The president of the Espee system discussed further the need for mutual consideration of interest between people and railroad in developing the comparatively new Oregon country, adding that development and expenditure proposed would be carried on as rapidly as possible. D. W. Campbell, W. D. Fenton, T. B. Wilcox and Robert Strahorn also spoke briefly. Edgar B. Piper, president of the Commercial club, presided and expressed the pleasure of the board of governors of the club because of President Sproule's presence in the city.

BUSINESS IMPROVING IN CENTRAL OREGON

There is unprecedented development activity in eastern Oregon, especially in the vicinity of Vale and Ontario, says C. T. Prall, president of the Oregon Association for Highway Improvement, who has just returned from several days spent in the eastern part of the state.

"Twelve hundred men are building the grade for the new Harriman line through interior Oregon," said Mr. Prall. "All the business men of Ontario tell me that through traffic to Portland now routed by way of La Grande, Pendleton and the Columbia river, will be routed via Harney county and the Natron cut-off to Portland. In this way an easier, really shorter grade is provided where now, with the assistance of 40 miles an hour, a speed of only 8 to 10 miles an hour is secured."

"At Ontario report has it that Odell will be the junction point for the new line and Natron cut-off, also that business consigned to San Francisco will all be handled in this way."

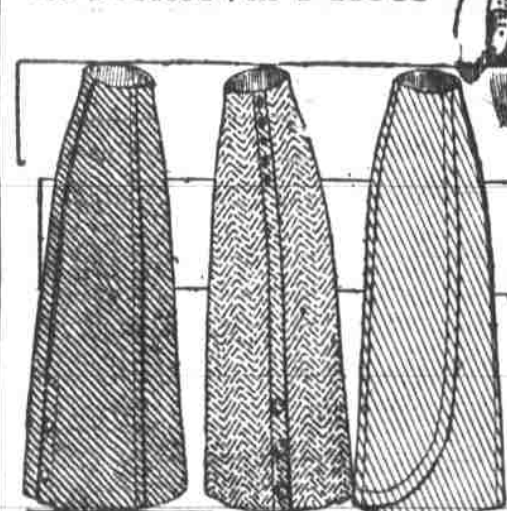
