To Have Uniform Rank.—At the last weekly meeting of Home Court No. 1, Knights of the Rose, it was decided to proceed with the organization of a uniform rank. Application has been made to the management of the Rose Carnival to give the uniform rank the privilege of acting as the official escort of Rex Oregonus at the next and succeeding Rose Carnivals. The Knights of the Rose was organized in Portland three years ago. It is a secret beneficial and social society and has pledged itself to work for the success of the annual Rose Fiesta in Portland. The suggestion has often been made that instead of King Oregonus making his initial appearance in the electric parade that he should first appear in one of the other parades. The argument has been advanced that in this way the different parades would be equalized in point of interest.

Woman Attacks Policeman.—The Gilbert rooming house at Third and Taylor streets, was visited by Patrolman Stewart last night, and Mrs. Butrick, an aged woman, had been held under \$200 bail for conducting a disorderly house. The arrest was made after a man whose name is said to be Parker, but who gave the name of Ryder at police headquarters, had been trailed from the Plaza blocks near the city hall. With Parker was a woman who gave the name of Mary Prevonia, who, when placed under arrest, assaulted Stewart with a beer bottle, a water pitcher and then threw a glass of beer in his face. She was sentenced to 30 days in jail this morning. Elsie Malvin, an inmate of the house, and two men, were held as witnesses.

Joint Suits May Be Filed.—Judge Bean of the United States District court has just decided that joint suits for damages could be filed against a boat and the owner of another boat. The original complaint was filed by the steamer Henderson against the tug Samson for damages received in a collision on the Columbia river. Later an amended complaint was filed in which Barge 98 owned by the Standard Oil company and which was in tow of the Henderson, alleging that it was also responsible for the collision. The decision that the Standard Oil company can be made a party of the action was handed down by Judge Bean yesterday morning.

Many Held for Trial.—Ralph McBean, indicted by the June federal grand jury for stealing horses from an Indian on the Umatilla Indian reservation pleaded not guilty before United States District Judge Bean yesterday and was held for trial. Wallace Simons, who was indicted for selling liquor in Lane county without a federal license pleaded guilty and sentence was withheld for six weeks. Frank Jack was held for trial on his plea of not guilty of selling liquor to an Indian on the Klamath reservation.

Denies He Attempted Suicide.—H. Harris, of 193 St. Clair street, is said by St. Vincent's hospital to be a man who the police declare to be poisoning, following his attempt to commit suicide Sunday night after a quarrel with his wife. The circumstances surrounding the case are mysterious. The man refuses to talk except to deny that he attempted to end his life. He asserted that he had been drinking rather heavily. The Red Cross ambulance was called at 11 o'clock Sunday night to take him to St. Vincent's.

White Slave Suspect.—Paul Beattie, who was arrested Saturday night by Sergeant Harris at 271 Third street, on a white slavery charge, and May Allen, the woman with whom he is said to be involved, were yesterday turned over to the federal authorities and will be prosecuted in the United States court. It is believed that a complete case has been made against the man as he is said to have traveled from Chicago to Portland, stopping at many cities on the way, with the woman.

Must Pay Damages.—For failure to load the steamer Washington within the time specified by contract on two voyages the Rainier Mill & Lumber company was ordered by United States District Judge Bean yesterday to pay damages to the extent of \$800 to the Washington Marine company. The suit was for \$1400 and included delays on two other voyages but these were denied on the grounds that they were not the fault of the loading company.

"Peeping Tom" Suspects.—Mike Hyle and Gus Huntman, two "peeping Toms," were arrested at midnight last night at Sixth and Jefferson streets, by Patrolman Hutchings, on a disorderly conduct charge while they were seen peering through the windows of an apartment house. Both men entered a plea of not guilty today, but their cases were set over for trial.

Charter Board to Meet.—A meeting of the official commission plan charter board has been called for next Monday

evening at 8 o'clock in the mayor's committee room. This meeting will be for the purpose of considering the revised draft of the commission plan charter over which members of the board have been studying for nearly four weeks.

Burgars Reported.—Charges of boys committed several depredations last night according to reports received by the police detectives this morning. The Rose Hardware store at 8 Grand avenue was broken into, 34 pocket knives, a baseball mask and a box of fishhooks were taken. Entrance was gained by hurrying a large rock through a plate-glass window. Boys are believed to have cut the wires at the St. Louis Market, at 1045 Hawthorne avenue, last night and to have searched the cash register. Nothing was secured. This is the second attempted robbery recently. M. Clark, of 608 Northwick street, reported that his house had been entered, an alarm clock, a razor and an ice cream freezer taken.

Forged Prescription.—A cocaine fiend yesterday morning presented a forged prescription alleged to have been written by Dr. Daniel Grant for a quantity of cocaine to W. H. Finn, a druggist at 320 Williams avenue. When the name of the physician was found to be a forgery, the "dope" was refused. The man was told to return an hour later, when the druggist would have it. In the meantime Patrolman Bales was summoned. The customer did not return. The suspect is described as being about 25 years of age, five feet ten inches tall and weighing 185 pounds. The police are now searching for him.

Stage Manager Recovering.—Continued improvement is being made in the condition of Hyman P. Emery, the stage manager of the Pantages theater, who was shot on Wednesday by a man who attempted to gain admission to the stage to see one of the actresses with whom he was enamored. It is believed that the crisis has passed now and that his recovery is assured.

Wants \$24000 Damages.—For injuries received in an elevator accident in the building occupied by the Pacific Paper company at Fourth and Ankeny streets, Abraham Selig has started suit in the circuit court for \$24,000. The plaintiff alleges that 5 of his teeth were knocked out and that he suffered a fractured skull. The action was filed in the circuit court.

Man Drow Dead.—Peter Swanson, aged 43 years, an employee of the P. R. L. & P. company, dropped dead yesterday afternoon at the Rheinpfalz hotel, from heart failure, superinduced by the excessive heat of yesterday. Little known to the man, as he has no relatives here, the coroner has charge of the case.

Moves Law Office.—Charles A. Johns, formerly of Baker, Or., who recently moved to Portland, has opened law offices at 800-1 and 2 in the Yeon building, has moved his offices to rooms 1209-10-11 and 12 in the same building, where he and his son, Claude M. Johns, will be found in the future.

Will Tell About Portland.—Portland is to have leading place in the Great Northern business directory now in process of compilation. The advantages, beauty and resources of the Rose City will be told in 1800 words, the information to be furnished by the chamber of commerce.

W. F. Stevens Leaves \$37,000.—Mrs. Mary Stevens, widow of W. F. Stevens, has been appointed administratrix of the deceased estate. She is made sole heir under the will. The property left amounts to \$37,000.

Mrs. Walter Mann was matron of honor, and the bridesmaids were Misses Harriet Alexander, Janetia Alexander, Julia Langhorne and Marjorie Josselyn. New York is Best Man.

Harold Fitzgerald, of New York, was best man and the ushers were Oscar Cooper, D. C. Wester, C. M. Sheer, Jr. and Frank Crocker, a cousin of the bride.

Among the wedding presents were a tiara of diamonds from Mrs. Whitelaw Reid, a watch from Mr. and Mrs. John West and a sapphire ring from the daughter of Mrs. Francis Burton Harrison, Miss Crocker's niece.

The wedding celebration, for which an army of florists, artists, landscape gardeners, sculptors, architects and carpenters had been preparing the extensive Crocker estates at Hillsboro, for weeks, rivaled the most famous nuptial displays of New York's Fifth avenue set. Following the church ceremony, which was a simple feature of the day's festivities, the guests wearing an aggregate of \$1,500,000 worth of jewels, were entertained with a wedding breakfast in temporary pavilion erected at a cost of \$15,000. It will be torn down tomorrow.

Flowers Form Significant Spectacle. In this pavilion the guests watched themselves amid a floral spectacle of unrivaled beauty. Orchids predomi-

nated, \$5000 having been spent on this flower alone in providing the display. Hundreds of thousands of roses, for which California's gardens are world famous, as well as many other specimens of nature's and the florists' art adorned the banquet boards or surrounded the fountains on walls and ceilings. In and out bright colored fountains sparkled and white statues glistened.

During the feast 300 automobiles which had brought the elite of San Francisco and other California cities to the scene were parked along the Crocker estate. Other guests arrived from various parts of the Pacific coast and many from the east by train.

King Ceremony Performed. The wedding was preceded by a procession of limousines from the Crocker estate to the church. Here the ceremony of the ring was performed beneath a bower of roses, and the guests hastened back to begin the real durbur festivities.

Throughout the afternoon a picked guard of 50 police including many of the best detectives and plain clothes men of the coast, loitered about the grounds, through the breakfast pavilion or in the Crocker mansion, as a protection for the millions of dollars in jewelry with which the women guests were bedecked.

The one prosaic feature was the presence of the motion picture men. As at the real durbur in India, every little incident of the day was pictured by the busy cameras stationed at points of vantage about the grounds. When the films are ready, Mrs. Whitman will present sets of them to a number of chosen friends.

After the reception Whitman and his bride left for Castle Craig, near Mount Shasta, to remain until July 26, when they will leave with Mr. and Mrs. Charles Templeton Crocker, for a month's honeymoon in the south seas.

He made of \$50,000. He was repaid \$42,000 of the loan, and considered the remaining \$8000 a personal contribution to the campaign fund.

Havemeyer Sent \$10,000 Check. "It was so long ago I cannot recollect," said Belmont. "I do remember one contribution of \$10,000 from Henry Havemeyer, that may have been made in behalf of a corporation."

Havemeyer was the creator of the sugar trust. Belmont said that the check was returned to Havemeyer because Chairman Taggart said the contribution was undesirable. Belmont declared in answer to questions by Clapp that he could not remember any contributors who gave \$5000 or more to the campaign fund.

TORN BY HER CRIES, HE CONFESSES SON KILLED DAUGHTER

worked on the case, all the members of the Swarts family and Mrs. Connors, mother of the dead girl. It was explained by the police that unless an indictment was in existence against Swarts it would be hard to extradite him if he were arrested in another state.

The elder Swarts' dramatic statement followed a scene unparalleled in the criminal courts building. He and members of the family were sitting in the ante-room of the grand jury room when Mrs. Connors, mother of the murdered child, was brought in. She was garbed in the deepest black and plainly was on the verge of collapse. As she was taken into the grand jury room and the box containing the blood-stained garments that had been torn from the body of her outraged child was displayed, the mother became hysterical and her cries could be heard all through the building.

Gives Way Before Cries. In the meantime Swarts sat in his chair as if rooted to the spot. His face became pale. Finally the tears began to flow down his cheeks, and when the heart-broken mother was led from the room he called to Assistant District At-

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torney Noll, who was presenting the case to the grand jury, admitted that his son, who had served a prison sentence for assault on another child, and was still on parole for that crime, had confessed to him that he had committed the crime.

"He told me what he had done," said the old man, "and I told him there was nothing for him to do but to kill himself. I told him that he did not deserve to live and that he should keep further distance from all of us by killing himself. I believe he did so. I certainly hope that he did."

Old Man Repeats Confession. Members of the family were then called to tell their stories to the grand jury, the old man repeating the confession of the boy murderer as it was given to him by the conscience-stricken youth.

The nude and mutilated body of 12-year-old Julia Connors was found in a vacant lot in East 173rd street between Third and Fulton avenues, in the Bronx, on Sunday, July 1. The child had been missing since a night before. There were 41 stab wounds in the body, 11 of which were in her back. In spite of the terrible nature of her injuries, the child had lived for hours. She was still alive when found but could only whisper, "A man did it." She died soon after she had been removed to Fordham hospital.

Later the old father told his story to the grand jury. It was corroborated by his son Jacob, brother of the missing Nathan, who said his father had told him of what Nathan said soon after the confession.

Both father and son expressed the belief that Nathan Swarts had drowned himself, although they admitted they had nothing tangible on which to base that belief.

As soon as word of the actual confession reached the police, another general request for Nathan Swarts' apprehension was sent broadcast throughout the country.
