Becomes Assistant Pastor—E. W. Pettibone, chairman of the religious work committee of the Portland Young Men's Christian Association, has accepted a position as assistant pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Spokane, Idaho, his old home, where he will spend a month before going to Spokane to take up his new work. Dr. S. W. McFadden is pastor of the Spokane church. Mr. Pettibone in becoming assistant pastor will take charge of the young people's work and will act as financial secretary of the trustees. His connection with the religious work of the Portland Y. M. C. A. has been such as to help in fitting him for his new duties.

Streets Company Blamed—The jury which yesterday held an investigation of the death of 4-year-old Maxine Melba Randolph, daughter of Postman M. M. Randolph, who was run over and killed by a Pullman car Tuesday night, in front of the home of the parents at 132 Nebraska street, last night decided that the streets company was responsible for the death on account of the improper fender with which the car was equipped. The verdict was to the effect that if the car had a proper fender and was controlled by a competent motorman, the fatal accident could have been avoided. The funeral was held this morning.

Wife Names House Maid—Too much attention to the house maid, Edith Sanderson, is the chief complaint Helen A. Ford makes in her suit for divorce from John S. Ford, filed in the circuit court. The wife alleges her husband finally sent the maid to Los Angeles, where he later joined her. The name of a woman known as Baker, said to be a maid, is also mentioned in the complaint as having gained the attentions of the defendant husband. Mrs. Ford asks for \$500 a month alimony during the pendency of the suit, and a final decree awarding her \$10,000 permanent alimony. Ford is a contractor.

Opposed to Capital Punishment—The International Ethical Educational Society went on record as being opposed to capital punishment at a meeting held Tuesday evening at the home of Mrs. Lucy Mallory, 311 Vermont street. The society adopted a resolution deprecating all forms of capital punishment, provided the criminal in lieu thereof be incarcerated during the whole term of his natural life, without parole, except in cases where the innocence of the condemned one is established to a certainty. The society also endorsed the prison reform policies of Governor West.

Aid for Eugene's Exhibit—An appropriation of \$500 by the state fair board to meet the expense of transporting the Eugene exhibit in connection with the state fair was announced yesterday by O. M. Plummer, superintendent of the exhibit. By publicity secured throughout the state contestants will be encouraged to exhibit. The exhibit is a competent jury of physicians and will be of value. In this way the science of Eugenics—being well born—is expected to be promoted in Oregon.

Chinese President Invited—Rev. Mr. Henry Collins Minton, president of the National Reform association, and N. Poon Chew, a Chinese leader of San Francisco, have sent a special invitation to Sun Yat Sen, president of the new Chinese republic, asking him to attend the second world Christian citizenship conference to be held in Portland June 23 to July 6, 1913. Mr. Minton is now on his way west to arrange some important details of the conference.

Will Fight Saloons—Honorable H. L. Sheldon of Illinois has been elected as state superintendent and attorney of the Oregon Anti-Saloon league, to succeed J. E. Burke, resigned. Mr. Sheldon was formerly a member of the Illinois legislature, and is the author of the local option law of that state known as the Sheldon-Berry law. Mr. Sheldon was later attorney for the Anti-Saloon league in Illinois, and still more recently he has been a worker in the Anti-Saloon league in Oklahoma.

County Expenses for Half Year, \$711,943.62

County Auditor Martin today completed his semi-annual report of receipts and disbursements of Multnomah county for the half year ending June 30. The total receipts are \$2,531,535.53, the disbursements amount to \$1,732,494.87, leaving a balance on hand of \$799,040.66. The amount of \$1,026,731.21 was turned over to the state treasurer, leaving the county's expenditures at \$1,711,943.62.

Comparing the expenses of the county for the last 18 months, during which the semi-annual reports were prepared by the auditor, it is noted the expenses for the half year ending June 30, 1911, were \$1,912,212.71; for half year ending June 30, 1912, were \$2,531,535.53, and for the half year ending June 30, 1913, \$1,711,943.62.

One among the heaviest items of disbursement is that for roads and bridges.

While working on the west tower of the new steel bridge across the Willamette river at S. W. Clark's morning R. W. Craig, a structural steel worker, who lives at 1044 Congress street, fell from the top and struck on the lower deck of the bridge, and the body terribly bruised. The man is now in a critical condition at the St. Vincent's hospital, where he was taken in the Red Cross ambulance.

Craig, who is married, had climbed to the top of the tower to do some adjusting work when he fell. He shot through the steel webbing of the upper deck and landed on the deck below. He fell over a distance of 200 feet.

The accident this morning is the only serious one that has occurred on the new structure, according to Chief Engineer Boschke.

Named Assistant Traffic Manager

Traffic Manager R. B. Miller of the O. W. R. & N. announced yesterday afternoon the appointment of W. D. Skinner to the post of assistant traffic manager. Mr. Skinner has been serving as general freight agent and his place will be taken by Harvey E. Lounsbury, who has been general freight agent of the Southern Pacific in Oregon.

The position of assistant traffic manager has been created due to a reorganization of the department by Mr. Miller. He has assigned the position to Mr. Skinner as one of the best informed and most competent railroad men in the northwest. The appointment of Mr. Lounsbury to succeed Mr. Skinner is a similar recognition of long and effective service.

The reason for the new position, says Mr. Miller, is to promote the efficiency of the department and to relieve him of duties which another man can attend to.

Mr. Skinner began in the railroad business more than 20 years ago with the Iowa Central. His first service in the northwest was with the O. R. & N. He has been successfully promoted to positions of trust because of his thoroughness in mastering essential details of the traffic business. He will assist Mr. Miller in both freight and passenger business.

Mr. Lounsbury has a record of 25 years steady service in Portland. When the Harriman lines in Oregon were

under one head he served as assistant freight and passenger agent. He became general freight agent of the Southern Pacific in Oregon when the division was made some time ago.

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RAILROAD MEN TO PAY VISIT TO LAKEVIEW
