Slabs Man Who Attacked Him—W. F. Reynolds of 111 Tenth street was stabbed in the side yesterday afternoon at Seventh and East Morrison, by 21-year-old Sol Salm, following an attack by Reynolds on the youth with a beer bucket, with which he struck Salm over the head. Reynolds is now at St. Vincent's hospital under the care of a physician, who was summoned by the boy's mother, Mrs. J. Salm, of 429 East Morrison street. Reynolds is not badly injured, and takes all the blame for the affair on himself, saying that he attacked the boy without cause. Following the stabbing, the youth fled to his father's store and hid in the basement, where Detective Litherland and Patrolman Schirmer found him. He was arrested on a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon, but it is likely that Reynolds will not prosecute the boy.

Desertor Steals Auto and Jewelry—Philip Webster, aged 37, a coal heater of the United States cruiser Marblehead, which he deserted when in Portland, was arrested at 6 o'clock this morning at Thirty-ninth and Belmont streets by Patrolman Chris Johnson, charged with the theft of an automobile from in front of the Army last night, owned by H. N. Tinker, of 581 Knott street. When the patrolman saw the number on the auto, which had been reported to the police, he stopped the auto and Webster confessed to the theft. This morning, in the line up of prisoners, Detective Tichenor recognized the boy as one he had seen in a pawn shop where he had pawned a ring and a watch. The boy confessed to having stolen these from a home at Thirty-fifth and Alberta streets. A large charge will be made against him and the navy officials will be notified.

Lebo Some Plights—When Archie Lebo of 322 Jefferson street attempted to strike Police Captain Riley last night, after the captain and Patrolman Warde had been called to the house to stop Lebo from beating his wife, he ran full against a blow from the captain's fist and fell with a badly bruised nose on a couch beside his wife, whom he had a few moments before knocked down. Another effort to attack the captain resulted in him being manacled and taken to police station on a disorderly conduct charge. This morning Judge Tazewell sentenced him to 90 days on the rockpile and then suspended sentence, assuring the man that another conviction would result in a similar sentence, both of which would have to be served. The woman was painfully bruised by her husband.

Accident Victim Dies—Robert Craig, 42 years old, a riverer, who fell from the tower of the new O.W. R. & N. bridge to the lower deck of the bridge, at 8 o'clock yesterday morning, died at the St. Vincent's hospital yesterday afternoon, from injuries sustained. Craig, who had a wife and three children, formerly lived at Drain, Or. In this he made his home at 1044 Congress street. If he had not fallen yesterday, today would have been his last day's work on the bridge structure. The coroner will hold an inquest this afternoon.

To Tell of Park Plan—Mayor Rushlight has accepted an invitation of the Mount Scott Improvement club to speak before it next Monday night on the Ross Island park plan. At a previous meeting the subject was briefly discussed and hostile sentiment developed, but it was voted to ask the mayor to present the argument in its favor before action was taken. The meeting will be held in Cunningham hall, Myrtle Park station.

Saloon Robbed—The Foster bar, at Second and Davis streets, was broken into some time this morning, the thieves cutting out a screen at the rear door. A file was used to pry open the cash register, but nothing was taken except some liquor and a soft hat.

Dog Kills Rabbits—Mrs. L. H. Huntley of 73 East Seventy-fourth street,

who is caring for a number of rabbits which are being experimented on by the state board of health, has reported to the police that a cocker spaniel dog bearing license the 1890, has broken into the cage and killed several of the rabbits. She asked that the police determine the name of the owner and warn the party to keep the dog away from the pen.

He Carried Ten Shells—Frank Atkinson, who was arrested several days ago in an alleged opium den at 104 Fourteenth street, was seen at the same place again last night by Patrolman Martin, and when the man attempted to escape was chased by the patrolman, who finally captured him. When arrested Atkinson had ten shells in his possession. He was this morning sentenced to 10 days.

Nordino of 90 North Sixth street fell from the seat of an express wagon that was standing in front of 51 Front street yesterday afternoon, and sustained several severe cuts and bruises. The police patrol brought him to police headquarters, where Jailer Webster dressed the wounds and sent the man to his home in care of his nephew, L. Rosellini. The express wagon is owned by Ernest Hatter.

Neighborhood Quarrel to Be Aired—A neighborhood quarrel has resulted in the arrest of Mrs. Anna Zimmerman on complaint of Mrs. Hanna Eccles and the arrest of Mrs. Eccles on complaint of Mrs. Zimmerman, both on assault and battery charges and tomorrow morning in municipal court the affair will be thrashed out. Mrs. Zimmerman lives at 565 Albina avenue and Mrs. Eccles is a neighbor.

Cooperative Store—The formal opening of the first cooperative grocery store in this city will take place tomorrow afternoon. The store is located at Shaver street and Albina avenue and is under the management of Rudolph Voelker. So far everything has been successful and the members of the First Mutualistic association are more than pleased.

The estate is valued at \$12,000. Under the will they were named to act in this capacity. Attorney N. D. Simon is counsel for the estate.

TO RESTRAIN BREACH OF PROMISE ACTION

Suit in equity for the purpose of forcing Mary E. Cronen to complete the bargain by which Walter Baker Moore was to be freed from a \$100,000 breach of promise suit instituted in the United States district court by Miss Cronen, was filed yesterday by A. F. Clark, attorney for Moore, against Miss Cronen and the Security Savings & Trust company. Moore asks that Miss Cronen be perpetually enjoined from prosecuting her suit and that the Security Savings & Trust company be ordered to turn over to Moore's attorneys the agreement by which the suit was to be dropped and to pay Miss Cronen's attorneys \$3000, the remainder of the amount of settlement.

The agreement by which the breach of promise suit was to have been dropped stipulated that on February 24 Moore was to pay to Miss Cronen's attorneys the sum of \$3000 and that the release of Moore was to be placed in escrow with the Security Savings & Trust company. Ninety days after \$3000 more was to be paid by Moore and on payment of this remainder the bank was given instructions to turn the papers over to Moore.

Moore paid the first installment to Logan & Stevenson, Miss Cronen's attorneys, on February 24, and the papers were placed in the keeping of the bank.

April 4 Miss Cronen had a change of heart and wrote the bank that the agreement had been procured by fraudulent and deceitful methods and that it would be held responsible for \$100,000 damages if the papers were surrendered to Moore, as the effect would be to end the breach of promise suit.

May 5, according to the petition, Moore offered the Security Savings & Trust company the last \$3000 of the settlement but was refused the papers. The bank also refused to allow Moore to secure certified copies of the papers in its hands.

Walter Baker Moore is a son of ex-Governor Miles C. Moore of Washington. His family, one of the most prominent socially and financially in Washington, lives at Walla Walla. A short time ago he married a prominent Tillamook girl and the couple are at present making their home in San Francisco.
