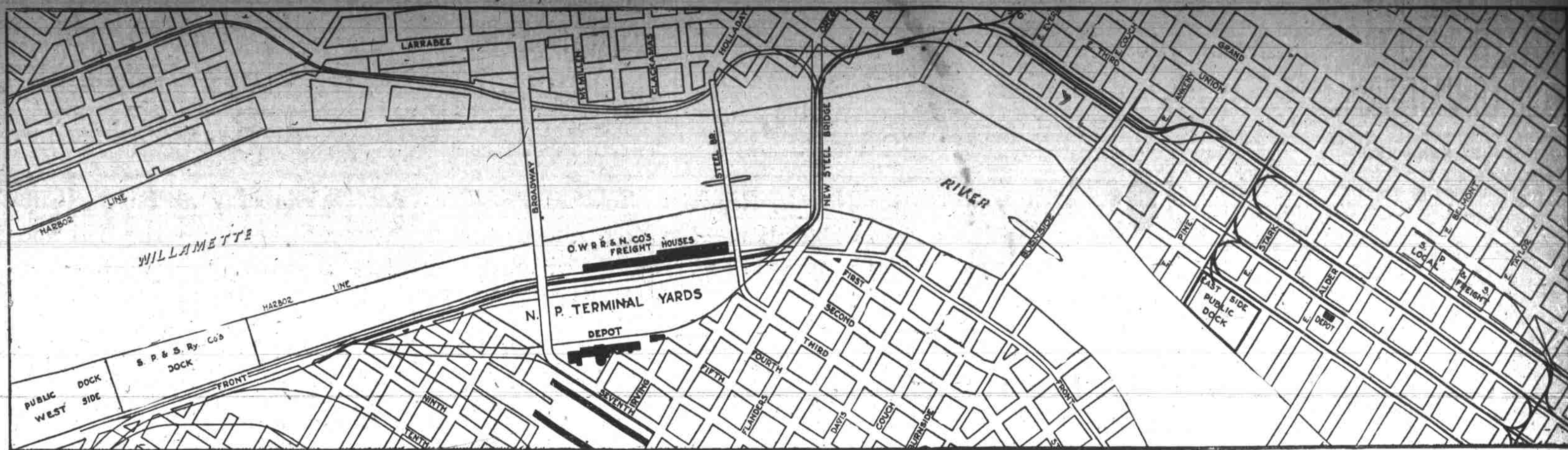

COMMISSION FORM
CHARTER ADOPTED;
SPECIAL ELECTION

Mayor's Commission Passes
Resolution Asking Council to
Enact Ordinance to Put the
Measure to Vote in October.

The special charter commission appointed by Mayor Rushlight last year finally concluded its labors last night, when it adopted the report of the revision committee and declared the proposed commission government charter ready for submission to the people. The commission adopted a resolution requesting the city council to enact an ordinance calling for a special election to be held some time in October for the purpose of putting the proposed charter

and any other amendments that may be suggested on the ballot.

It is the desire of the commission that the special election be held about a week before the national election in November. It is pointed out that a good deal of expense can be saved in this manner, as the voting booths will have already been set up for the regular election.

President Baker of the city council, who acted as chairman of the charter commission last night in the absence of Mayor Rushlight, said he would prepare the ordinance calling for the special election and submit it to the council tomorrow. The ordinance can be read twice tomorrow and referred. It will then be in shape to pass at the first meeting of the council in August. This will take place August 14.

At tomorrow's meeting of the council that body will be asked to have the proposed charter printed in the city official newspaper. This will give voters an opportunity to read it and to offer any amendments they desire to. The charter commission will hold a special meeting the evening of August 5, to consider any amendments that may be offered, but all such amendments must be submitted in writing. The commission will take action on all amendments submitted, and will then report to the council August 14, so that that body may order the special election without further delay.

"We have done our work the best we

know how," declared W. F. Woodward, one of the commissioners, "and it is now up to the city council to submit the proposed charter to the people. While this commission has taken many months to draft the amendments we have at last agreed upon, there has been no unnecessary delay. We have carefully considered all phases of the situation and have gone over the various charter amendments that have been drafted in the past decade. We believe we have evolved a workable and efficient charter and hope that it will be adopted."

All amendments filed for submission at a special election must remain in the city auditor's office for a period of at least 60 days. Therefore, if the council acts the date for the election, it will have to be 60 days or more after August 14.

Before the commission finished the charter draft last night it incorporated two new amendments. One of these provides that the Ziegler ordinance be modified to such an extent as to permit the city to vacate any street where the property bordering the street belongs to the city, even though it be within the 2000 foot limit made by the Ziegler law. The object of this is to enable the construction of a public auditorium on the market block. If the auditorium commission should decide to erect the building there.

The other amendment provides that all proceedings for the extension or widening of streets, including changes

of grade therefor, shall be started by the city engineer, instead of by a set of viewers.

HILL ROADS GAIN
COMMON USER ON
EAST SIDE STREETS

In submitting this amendment, said it was not the intention to substitute it for the previously announced plan of a ferry system connecting the two sides of the river, but simply to supplement the ferry system.

The amendment, if finally approved by the city council, will effectively open up the east side shipping district to competition and will connect the proposed municipal docks on either side of the river. The plan has been endorsed by the public dock commission.

In case the city should in future decide to operate a belt line railway

around the water front for commercial purposes the Hill lines have agreed to give the city the use of any private property that may be acquired for the Hill tracks in order to make a municipal belt line possible.

Hill Interest Wins.

From all indications the Hill interests have won their franchise fight in so far as the council may be concerned, as it is believed the action of the street committee taken yesterday will be followed by the council. The Harriman roads, unless an agreement is reached between them and the Hill companies, will probably resort to the courts in

an effort to delay the day when the Hill lines can come into the east side on an equal footing with the older railroad. A legal fight will probably center on the part of the Hill franchise granting the Hill lines access over the new Harriman bridge, there being a difference of opinion as to whether the common user applies to the connecting lines between the east approach to the bridge and the East Third street track.

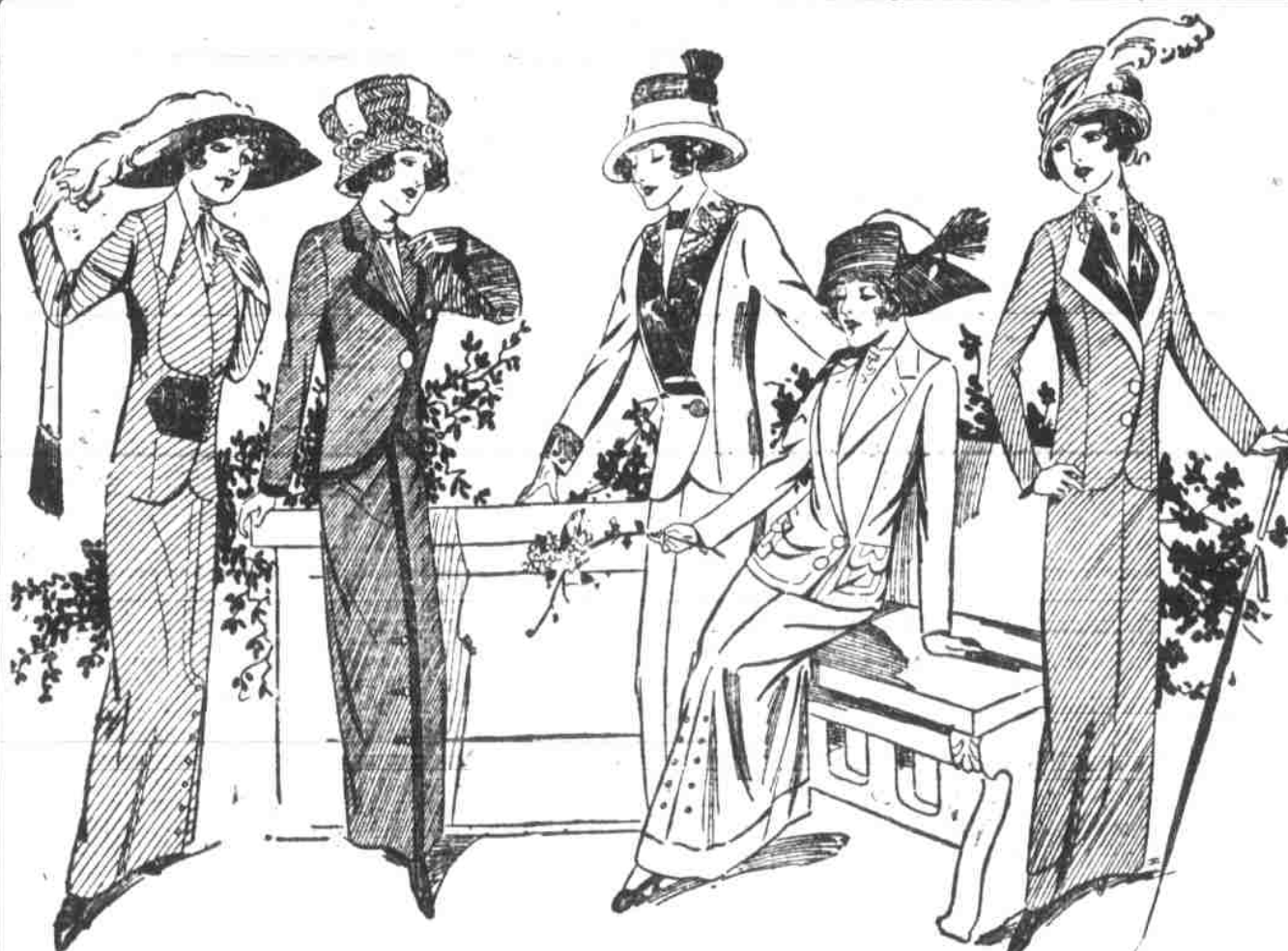
