

PRINTER DUNIWAY BITTER IN ANSWER TO FLAT SALARY

To Pass This Act Would Be Virtual Recall, He Writes, Throwing State Printing Into Closed Shop Hands.

(Salem Bureau of the Journal.)
Salem, Or., July 25.—One of the most caustic and denunciatory arguments that will be printed in the initiative pamphlet this year was filed by Willis S. Duniway, state printer, in opposition to the measure making the flat salary bill apply to his office in December, instead of two years hence.

He says the initiative bill "proves on examination to be a triumph of deceit, duplicity and dishonesty, promoted and financed by Socialists in the Salem printers' union."

Duniway's Strong Denunciation.
He also says that the "main purpose of the act, as now openly boasted in Salem, is: One—To work a practical recall of the present Republican state printer by stripping him of all authority in his office and forcing him to resign before half his term is served. Two—To take control of Oregon's printing away from the state of Oregon, and by 'closed shop' contract put the printing in the control of the Socialists who dominate the Salem union, 'as agents of the International Typographical union.' Three—To bind the state of Oregon to agree to comply with any tyrannical or extortionate law that may be hereafter adopted without the knowledge of the voters of Oregon."

In another portion of the argument he compares the efforts behind the initiative bill to the explosion of the Los Angeles Times building.

Regarding the argument, and that made by State Senator Nottingham, State Printing Expert R. A. Harris, who was active in putting the initiative measure on the ballot, gave out the following statement:

"I have read the entire argument of Mr. Duniway against the initiative printing measure. From beginning to end it is the most prejudiced and misleading document I ever read. It will be a shame if political relations present a thorough examination of the facts for the express benefit of all who might otherwise be misled. The publication of this argument to maintain the old printing system will cost the state printer twice the sum that has been expended in behalf of the initiative bill."

"Mr. Nottingham's argument is much more convincing and logical. It is probably as good as could be put up for the old system and in behalf of a political and personal friend."

"No argument was made in behalf of the measure in the pamphlet because it was deemed the people were sufficiently conversant with the subject from the long struggle against the printing graft during the past ten or more years."

It's Up to the People.
"Now that the measure is on the ballot which will give a trial to a new system, if the people are convinced by the argument of the state printer in his own behalf, and Senator Nottingham, that no change should be made, little censurability will be coming to anybody. Those opposed to the old system have provided an opportunity at last to change it. If the opportunity is rejected the voters alone will be to blame."

LOS ANGELES WOMAN DRUGGED AND ROBBED

ACTOR MAKES MONEY IN PORTLAND REALTY

Chick Sale, rapid change artist at the Orpheum, has made \$1 a week for the past year on a lot he purchased in the outskirts of Portland in his visit here last season. Sale received word yesterday that his property's value had increased \$52 and an offer at the advanced rate was made the actor, but he refused to sell. Sale was a student of the University of Illinois but did not graduate. His "Country School Entertainment," which was originated by him when at college, prompting him to take a vaudeville contract instead of a sheepskin. Sale says he never yet has visited a city on the Orpheum circuit where he did not meet old schoolmates from Illinois. The several characters he portrays in his vaudeville act are taken from life. Sale making a study of types in his home town, Woodbridge, Ill. Sale's father is a dentist in Urbana, Ill.; his mother has achieved great success as a writer of short stories and his sister, Edna Marie Sale, is on the Chautauqua platform as a reader. His mother, father and sister accompanied him as far as Seattle on his vaudeville tour this year. Sale is on his honeymoon, having married a girl from his home town just before rejoining the Orpheum circuit.

OREGON-SOUTHERN GETS A NEW HEAD

Company Which J. Arnold Doyle Could Not Make Go Has Been Reorganized.

Roseburg, Or., July 25.—Information has been given out here that W. E. Pierce of Boise, Idaho, has accepted the presidency of the reorganized Oregon & Southern Railway company, with headquarters in Roseburg, and will come here in about 10 days personally to take up matters in connection therewith. This company, which proposes to build a line to the coast, was formerly known as the Oregon & Southern railway. About 30 miles of the line has been surveyed and rights of way obtained.

Mr. Pierce is at the head of the firm of W. E. Pierce & Co.

His company built the Boise & Caldwell interurban lines of railway, some 20 or 40 miles in length, and has also been a factor in other developments in that state.

The old company had J. Arnold Doyle as its president, but he failed to meet the necessary requirements and retired from the presidency. Now the movement is being reorganized by the formation of a new company incorporated under the laws of Washington.

H. M. Farren, a prominent member of the old company, who will be a vice president and member of the board of directors of the new company, is a large stockholder in the company, and a personal friend of Mr. Pierce. George Godfrey will be treasurer and W. H. Jeffrey secretary of the new company.

AITCHISON IS FOR TICKET FROM TOP TO BOTTOM

Salem, Or., July 25.—In reply to the query sent out by the Republican state central committee to all candidates of the party, Clyde R. Aitchison, nominee for reelection as railroad commissioner for the first district, today informed the committee that he would support the ticket from Tart down.

"I told the committee just what I have told it before," said Mr. Aitchison, "and that is that I intended to support the full Republican ticket, and that if at any time I should change my mind I would notify it."

SWEPT BY FLOOD OHIO VALLEY LOSS TO BE VERY HEAVY

Hundreds of Families Homeless and Damage to Property Has Spread Over Large Area of Rich Country.

Pittsburg, Pa., July 25.—Hundreds of families are homeless and thousands of acres of rich farmland are under water today as a result of yesterday's cloudburst and flood in western Pennsylvania and West Virginia. Thousands of acres of tillable soil are under water, and the loss to farmers will be heavy.

Evans Station, three miles north of Uniontown, was the most severe sufferer. It was here that 13 miners met death in the manway of Superba mine No. 2, when the water flooded the workings. The 37 men who escaped, were forced to half swim and walk to the pit mouth through water ranging in depth from their waists to their necks. The streets of Dunbar are under six feet of water. The trolley road beds in the flooded districts are destroyed, and all suburban traffic is completely demoralized. In the Redstone valley, near Uniontown, 600 families were forced to flee to the hills for safety.

The rainfall during July has marked a new record for the month. At McKeenport rain fell continuously for 12 hours. Two hundred houses are partly submerged. At Dunbar a number of buildings were completely wrecked and hundreds of others damaged.

A number of miners are reported missing near Smock, and it is feared they perished in the cloudburst. They were at work near the junction of the Youghiogheny river and Redstone creek. The Allegheny river at Pittsburg is rising rapidly, and it is expected that an 18 foot stage will be reached.

NEW CHARGES AGAINST THE HEAD METERMAN

At a meeting of the city water board yesterday it was decided by Mayor Rushlight and members of the board to file new charges against head meterman Cornelius G. Murphy, who was recently reinstated by the civil service commission after he had been dismissed for the good of the service.

The mayor had investigated the water department and he found that Murphy had on several different occasions sold lead and other material to a junk dealer instead of charging Murphy with theft of the board, feeling a desire to show him leniency, simply made the dismissal "for the good of the service." The civil service commission to which Murphy appealed, held that this charge was insufficient.

"The new charges that I will file against Murphy will, I believe, be sufficient and specific enough for anybody," said the mayor yesterday.

There will be no arbitration of the claims made by the Shaw-Batchelor company for extras on the new pipe line. The water board refused to order such action, which was requested by the company. The contractors will now have recourse only in the courts.

MILLIONAIRE'S COIN FOR DEPUTY SHERIFF

Cleveland, Ohio, July 25.—The persistence of Deputy Sheriff Morris in remaining on the county estate of Patrick Calhoun, millionaire traction magnate, a settlement of a \$5000 mechanic's lien in favor of John Gray, in embarrassing Miss Martha Calhoun. To relieve the situation, attorneys for Calhoun today asked the court to stop Morris from looting about the mansion.

When asked today how long he intends remaining at the place, Morris shrugged his shoulders and grinned. "I like it here," he said, and walked away. Morris spent last night on the Calhoun estate and the night before. He served the papers in the mechanics' lien case on Miss Calhoun. She is entertaining a house party, and Morris spends the day retrieving golf balls for her guests. He eats his meals with the stablemen.

Calhoun is in San Francisco and it is not known here when he will return to Cleveland or what action he will take.

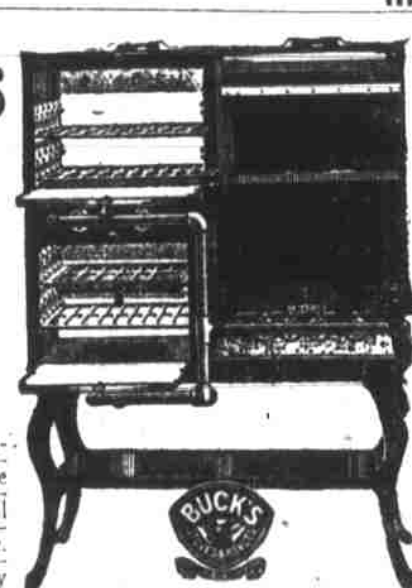
