

MULTNOMAH HAV HAVE THIRD PARTY TICKET AT ONCE

**Movement May Soon Be
Launched in County to
Place Ticket in Field With-
out Advice of Committee.**

Talk of a third party ticket in Oregon and Multnomah county will not down. Despite the refusal of the state convention to declare for a full ticket it was reported yesterday that a movement will soon be launched for a meeting in Multnomah county to place a ticket in the field, without waiting for advice from the state committee of the new party, now in process of formation.

The disposition of the leaders is to wait until after the Chicago convention on August 6. Roosevelt will be in Chicago then, and the delegates from Oregon will have an opportunity to discuss the Oregon situation intimately with their leader.

Among these delegates will be Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, who advocates the full ticket idea, and Bruce Dennis, who is opposed to the nomination of any candidate by the third party in Oregon. Still another plan, by which the ticket in this state would be confined to United States senator and members of congress, is favored by the friends of Fred W. Mulkey, candidate for senate. He is feared by some that local tickets would force county candidates throughout the state into a hostile attitude toward Roosevelt and Mulkey as well, while if the local candidates are left alone, it is argued, part of them will be friendly to the new party candidates.

Matter of Principle.
Top-to-bottom third party advocates say it is a matter of principle with them. They are in a new party, they say, and the only logical position for a new party is to name its ticket and trail behind it. The argument of the anti's, who are afraid that a battle all along the line will imperil the movement.

Some criticism is being directed at Bruce Dennis, late chairman of the Republican state convention, because he says he is still a Republican and opposes any nomination except for president and vice president. His critics think he should cut loose from the Republican party, and they are not pleased by his statement that he intends to support Ben Selling, instead of Mulkey, for United States senator.

Dennis took an active part in the primary campaign in favor of Selling. In fact, he had charge of the news bureau, directing the literature sent out to country newspapers from Selling's headquarters.

For his services to Selling the Selling expense account filed at Salem by Max Michel shows Dennis was paid \$250 on March 2, \$275 on March 15 and \$255 on April 20, a total of \$780. His continued devotion to Selling while acting as a leader of the new party is one of the interesting side-tangles of the progressive movement.

Rodgers to Organize Counties.

George F. Rodgers of Salem, who was chairman of the mass convention, is charged with the duty of getting each county organized, so that a state committee may be formed. With this committee in existence, it will be called to formulate plans for a campaign and it may also consider the third ticket plan.

Encouragement for the full ticket is found in the attitude taken by Roosevelt as to the fight in other states. Some of them believe that Roosevelt himself will advise a new ticket in Oregon.

Colonel Roosevelt and his manager, Senator Dixon, a few days ago told the third party adherents in Illinois they should nominate a new ticket, and the reasons why. The comment of Roosevelt and his manager is interesting in Oregon, as the situation there is largely identical with the situation in this state.

Roosevelt carried Illinois in the preference primary vote by 100,000, and at the same time a state ticket and local tickets were nominated. Governor Deeney, who fought for Roosevelt in the convention, has since declined to declare for Roosevelt, at the same time avoiding any direct statement. Colonel Roosevelt said:

"Governor Deeney has been proposing not to declare himself for either Roosevelt or Taft. I sent word out to him that this was not satisfactory to me. If he was either for me or against Taft we were for him and willing to support him. Otherwise not."

Dixon's Comment.

This was Senator Dixon's comment: "Colonel Roosevelt is no longer a Republican. He is a progressive. He has resigned from the Republican club of New York. This is not a Roosevelt party, however. The progressive party is not a Roosevelt party. It is a party that has that idea in its mind, let him get it out. Colonel Roosevelt has merely been drafted as a temporary leader."

"This is not a question of Roosevelt or Taft, but a question of whether there will be a new party, the old party, or of course there will be a third state ticket in this state, for this is a third party. We are done with the Republican party and have so announced. Complete state tickets will be put up by the progressives in every state where the Republican organization and candidates do not come over in a body to the progressive party."

Many to Have Third Ticket.

"California, South Dakota, West Virginia and North Dakota are some of the states that have eliminated the Republican organization altogether in favor of the new party. Kansas is one of those states that will try to settle the question in a primary next month. Illinois, Michigan, Indiana, New York and the entire eastern chain of states will have third party state tickets in the field."

Governor Duggan, on the other hand, is making the same argument that is being advanced in this state against the nomination of a new ticket to oppose all who fail to declare for Roosevelt. He said:

"Having sought the support of Republicans and having been chosen as their candidate for governor in this state, there is no opportunity afforded the Republican electors to change their minds in reference to my nomination as governor and to nominate another in my stead, and I have no moral right to change my status as their trustee or in any way to alter the terms of the position I hold in trust as their representative."

Eugene W. Chasfin, who has been chosen as standard bearer of the Progressive party in the coming campaign, is an old campaigner and was the nominee of the party for president in 1908. At that time his home was in Chicago, but now he claims both Arizona and Illinois as places of residence. Mr. Chasfin was born in Wisconsin and will be 60 years old next November. He is a lawyer by profession.

MARTIAL LAW AT COAL MINES STOPS GUERRILLA WARFARE

**Two Guards Killed and One In-
jured Known Result of Yes-
terday's Rioting; Quiet.**

Charleston, W. Va., July 27.—With the arrival at Mucklow of a battalion of state militia, martial law superseded the guerrilla warfare which broke out fiercely Friday in a pitched battle between striking coal miners and private detectives guarding mine property, costing probably a dozen lives. No fresh outbreaks were reported today.

Not until tonight was the true story of Friday's engagement learned. Two armed guards are known to have been killed and one injured. The miners carried their dead and injured, if any, back with them into the hills.

The militia at once repaired telephone and telegraph lines along Paint Creek and communication with Mucklow was normal tonight. The troops under Major James Pratt pitched camp in Mucklow, and the businesslike way in which they posted picket and patrolled the mining camp overawed the strikers. The mineowners say the fighting is over, but armed strikers are known to be in the hills.

The private detectives who started from Mucklow to reconnoiter were ambushed. One of the pair, P. F. Stringer, was killed. The other, W. W. Phaup, was badly wounded but managed to escape and later rejoined another party of guards.

The mineowners demanded protection by state troops. The national guardsmen were then in camp at Mount Gretna, Pa. A battalion was ordered to Mucklow.

BASEBALL GAME WILL BE ON SQUARE—HONEST

Reports to the contrary, the baseball game to be played between members of the Portland Press club and Ad club at Bonneville Sunday, August 4, will be absolutely on the square. A rumor has gained headway in some quarters that an attempt was being made to "fix" the game so that the newspaper boys could win. "I can knock that rumor into a cocked hat," declared President Vincent of the Press club. "In the first place, the umpire has not been picked yet. In the second place that official could not be 'fixed' anyway; and in the third place the knights of the quill have a good opinion of their own when it comes to work on the diamond. They think they can show the Ad men how the great national game is played. There will be no need to 'square' anything. We are out for the bacon."

Prospective contestants in the various races are looking up on the horizon as the day for the picnic draws near. A number of fat men have already signified their willingness to enter for the sprints. Some of them are in training for the crucial tests.

Indications are that there will be a record-breaking crowd. The tickets for the railroad excursion are now being sent out to members. Tickets will also be sold at the Press club rooms, second floor of the Elk's building, Seventh and Clark streets, and at the Union depot. The general public is invited to go on this excursion. There will be fun for everybody and a number of top line attractions will be kept secret until the guests at the picnic grounds.

BATTLE WILL END TODAY; INVADERS PROBABLE VICTORS

Black river, the Oregon men were first to start in pursuit of the Blues. One battalion under Major Scott engaged and defeated a detachment of the enemy, the guardsmen riding the stream up to their armpits and forming for attack on the east bank before the surprised Blues could open fire. Captain George White, an Oregon officer, was captured in the course of the fight and sent to the rear.

Fighting Will End Today.

The last fighting of the war will take place tomorrow morning, when the Reds will endeavor to take Gate City and drive the Blues back into Rochester. In view of the Reds' success yesterday and today there appears to be little doubt but what the Blues will surrender tomorrow, and the Reds be given a clear march to Olympia, Tacoma and Seattle. After tomorrow's fighting is decided the troops of both armies will hold a grand review, after which they will prepare to entrain for their homes. The Twenty-first Infantry is expected to arrive in Centralia tomorrow night, where the headquarters of its hospital corps have been maintained during the fight. The regiment will camp at the fair grounds tomorrow night and leave for Vancouver tomorrow Monday. The officers of the regiment, headed by Colonel Young, will be repaired to make a 90 mile test endurance ride before returning to Vancouver. Oregon, Idaho and Washington guardsmen will entrain for their homes at Gate City Monday.

on the east side of the Willamette river in Portland, Oregon, an ordinance granting such franchise, right and privilege is now pending before the city council.

Therefore the city of Portland does ordain as follows: "Section 1.—That until the said ordinance is finally disposed of by the council and the mayor of the city of Portland it shall be unlawful for any person or corporation to lay down or construct any railway track, or to move or change any existing railway track in East Second street between East Market street and the main line tracks of the approach to the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company's Willamette river bridge, or in East First street between Hawthorne avenue and East Oak street in the city of Portland."

"Section 2.—That in view of the necessity of avoiding controversy and disturbance of the public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its approval by the mayor."
