Dangerous Curves Removed.—By the completion of the removal of 500,000 yards of earth from the Center street bluff, the Portland Railway, Light & Power company has secured a splendid roadbed for its tracks along the river and eliminated a number of curves. The change in the tracks will give a saving of two minutes in operating time of the cars. It also gives a perfectly safe track whereas the old one, with its many curves, suggested the danger of collisions of slides. As a result of the improvement the roadway through the bluff is now hanging in width from 200 to 400 feet. Much of the gravel was used in filling the low lands owned by the Inman, Poulsen Lumber company.

Injured Laid Improving.—Although still in a rather precarious condition at the Good Samaritan hospital, Logan Ross, six years old, who was struck by an automobile July 15, has a good chance for recovery. It is believed that several times the little boy has regained consciousness for a few minutes and it will only be a question of time before he completely recovers consciousness. It is said. He is suffering from concussion of the brain and his left leg is broken.

Woman Falls From Car.—Mrs. Alice G. Smith of 1409 Benton street, fell from a fast moving Mississippi avenue car near her home last night and sustained painful injuries about the head. She was taken to her home and a physician was called. The woman is blamed for the accident as she attempted to alight before the car stopped.

Missionary to Speak.—Rev. C. S. Johnson, who recently returned from China, where he was a missionary for many years, and who is now in this city with his family, will talk at the Forbes Presbyterian church, Canton and Graham avenues, tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock.

Seeks Wife's Doctor.—Detective Sergeant Walter Godfrey, of Newark, N. J., arrived here this morning to take back Uriah Seely, arrested here by Detective Vaughn and Litherland for wife desertion. The man abandoned his wife last March, taking with him their 9 year old son, Theodore, ostensibly to

take the child to a doctor, but he never returned to his home. The man was located in Montana and fled from there to Portland when he found he was discovered. He declared he intended to get a divorce from his wife and was attempting to stay here long enough to establish a residence.

Police Seek Bitter.—Charles E. Pottage, a contractor, who is wanted on a charge of mayhem, preferred against him by Thomas Conroy, business agent of the Carriers' union, has not been apprehended by the police, although a persistent search has been made for him. The claim by Conroy is that in a fight Pottage bit off a portion of his ear. Pottage has been in trouble with the police on many occasions, but his most notorious escapade was the killing of Frank Porter, a steam engineer, working under him. Pottage was acquitted of a murder charge in that case.

Former Manager Arrested.—Mathew P. Hanson, who is wanted here on a lacy charge, and who is said to have defrauded many creditors through mismanagement of the Portland restaurant which is conducted at 344 Washington street, has been arrested in Vancouver, B. C. by Portland officers, under the name of W. P. Rader. Detectives Hammersly and Mallett are today arranging to extradite him. The larceny charge was preferred by Walter C. Day of the Washington Creamery company. Hanson left the restaurant early in July.

Alleged Fighter Arrested.—J. R. Mills, one of the four men wanted for being implicated in the shooting last Saturday morning of W. E. Taylor, was arrested this morning by Detective Vaughn and Litherland. Taylor, who lives at 145 North Fourteenth street, was shot at 1 o'clock Saturday morning through the neck by Monroe Cox, during a drunken fight in which Taylor, Cox, Mills and W. D. Neighbors and Will Mosby, both of whom were arrested Saturday, were involved. Taylor's wound was not serious.

Must Wear Bathing Suits.—An order has been issued by Chief of Police Slover to the effect that bathers in the river must be clothed in bathing suits before going into the water. Many complaints have been made by passengers on the various street car lines of young boys and several grown men going to the river without bathing suits. Patrolmen are ordered to stop the practice.

CONSCIENCE STRICKEN MAN RETURNS \$100 TO P. R. & P. CO.

President R. S. Josselyn of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company was somewhat surprised this morning when a citizen entered his office and handed him \$100, explaining that the money rightfully belonged to the street car company and that he wanted to clear his conscience. "I have received the money deal over this matter," said the man, whose identity will always remain a secret of President Josselyn. "and I concluded to make restitution. My views of life are different today from what they used to be and I feel that I must return this amount to the company."

President Josselyn says it is quite common for the company to get amounts ranging from \$2 to \$5 from anonymous sources through the mails with explanations that the money is for the conscience fund, but he says the amount received this morning beats all records. The man did not explain how he had managed to get the best of the company.

ALASKA PACKERS DENY NAMING SALMON PRICES

A published report to the effect that the Alaska Packers' association has established lower prices for canned salmon for 1912 has been denied by William Timson, vice president of the association. According to the schedule of prices published, the association would suffer a loss of 25 cents a dozen on each grade of salmon; that the eastern jobber would be receiving the benefit of the loss, and the Pacific coast would be the loser.

The report of reduced prices was sent out from Astoria, and is said to have been entirely without foundation.

BEATEN TO DEATH BY HOODLUMS, IN FIGHT ON STREET

Adam Baker Dies as Result of Attack; Assaulters Use Brass Knuckles; Kick Victim in Jaw; Skull Fractured

Victim of a gang murder, Adam Baker, a painter, aged 30 years, who resided at Hamilton and Corbett streets, is dead at the morgue. Detectives C. R. Hillier and Glenn Howell are working on the case.

Baker was knocked down and fatally kicked about the head at 1 o'clock Sunday morning in front of the Gevurtz furniture store, Second and Yamhill streets, by a gang of six young men, who, without apparent provocation, followed Baker and his companion, Herk Rost, from the House cafe on Third street near Washington, and attacked them after a four block chase.

Rost, a cement workman of giant stature, put back to a wall and succeeded in beating off his assailants. Baker, however, a smaller man, was knocked down by a fellow who wore brass knuckles, and then some member of the gang kicked him a terrific blow under the chin, breaking it and fracturing the skull at the base.

The injured man died an hour and a half later.

Assaulters Make Their Escape.

Realizing that serious harm had been done, the hoodlums took to flight, running down Yamhill to First street, whence they turned south and disappeared.

"They've broken my jaw," groaned Baker, when Rost attempted to assist him to his feet.

"Almost carrying the dazed man, Rost hurried to the Grotto restaurant, nearby, and a waiter telephoned for a taxi, which carried Rost and Baker to the Multnomah County hospital. There Rost asked Henry Miller, a night attendant, if the hospital would take care of the injured man. Receiving an affirmative reply Rost helped Baker into the building, then paid the taxi driver, Pete Hendricks, and walked to his rooms at 395 Front street.

Baker was given first aid attention, then an ambulance was called and the man was started for St. Vincent's hospital. He died en route.

Owing to excitement, Rost explained today at detective headquarters that he neglected to give Miller his name. A few hours later, however, he telephoned N. A. Boody, advertising manager for Roberts Brothers, and told him the story of the fight. Boody today, accompanied by his brother, Dr. Fred Boody, a dentist, residing at 814 1/2 Corbett street, identified the body.

Tells Him to "Beat It."

According to Rost, the murder was caused indirectly by a quarrel over a woman, which occurred between two young men who met on Third street, just in front of them. Rost and Baker were leaving the House cafe, and the members of the gang that later attacked them were standing on the curb talking, when a man and woman approached, walking toward Washington street.

Another man, larger than the one who accompanied the woman, hurried up to the couple and told a smaller fellow to leave the girl and "beat it." The smaller man lost no time in obeying the command and the interloper took the woman by the arm and they walked away.

"That's one time the big fellow got the better of the little one," Rost remarked to Baker.

"What in— is that to you," said one of the gang, addressing himself to Rost.

"Nothing at all," Rost replied.

The fellow declared that Rost and "his friend" had been talking to the trouble they wanted and Rost said that trouble was not being sought.

Tried to Escape Ruffians.

With the strangers trailing them, Baker and Rost hurried to Third and Morrison streets where the gang overtook them, and then the two men ran down Morrison to the dock, thence to Yamhill, trying to escape.

They expected to board a Fulton car for home at this point. No car was in sight, the next morning their pursuers closed in. The fight lasted only a minute or so.

Rost told the police today that he could readily identify his assailants. A City Physician Ziegler performed the autopsy.

Baker, who had been employed as a painter by the Oregon Electric for several months, quit the company two weeks ago and was employed in the same capacity at the new county courthouse at the time of his death. He was unmarried. His mother resides at Oakland, Cal., and a brother, John Baker, is general chairman of the Brotherhood of Railway Trainmen of the coast lines and resides at West Albuququerque, N. M.

The inquest probably will be held tomorrow. The body is being held at the morgue. McEwen undertaking parlors pending instructions from John Baker, who has been notified.

RESCUE WOMAN FROM A MORNING BUILDING

A perilous climb by Patrolmen Kelleher, McCarthy, and Crane, this morning onto the roof of a burning building on Morrison, between Park and Seventh streets, saved the life of Mrs. Armstrong, a roomer, who, panic stricken, had climbed to the roof and was sitting on the edge ready to jump. She was caught by the policemen, who lowered her to a place of safety. The fire which caused her flight to the roof, broke out at 343 Morrison street from an unknown source about 1 o'clock, and spread through the lodging quarters, doing about \$5000 damage.

Water did almost equal damage to Ireland's buffet, 347 Morrison street, the Orpheum restaurant at 348 Morrison street, and to W. E. Reid's fruit store at 343 Morrison street. The rooming house was conducted by Mrs. Alice Hamot and Bertha Mason. The building, a four story affair, is owned by the Risley estate and the loss is covered by insurance.

The police were instrumental in saving many women from the quarters who were taken to places of safety in nearby lodging houses.

Fire which started from a cigarette stub did small damage to a real estate office at 15 North Fifth street this morning shortly before 1 o'clock, but before the blaze spread to any extent, messengers from the Aero Messenger company had extinguished it.

LAY CORNERSTONE OF NEW CLUBHOUSE

Quite elaborate was the ceremony that attended the laying of the cornerstone of the new Rose City Park clubhouse, at East Fifty-seventh street and Sandy Road yesterday afternoon, when a large number of persons of the Rose City Park district interested in the clubhouse work were present and assisted in the cornerstone laying.

The exercises yesterday started at 4 o'clock and were under the direction of Charles B. Merdell, executive of the Rose City Park club, the first speaker of the afternoon, congratulated the people of Rose City Park on their progressive spirit in backing such an undertaking.

A. H. Metcalf, president of the Rose City Park club, spoke of the conditions abounding years ago. Frank Schlegel, the first resident of Rose City Park, immediately after the district had been formed, also spoke briefly. Among the others who had a part in the program were Dr. T. Peckley, Ex-Governor T. T. Geer, F. H. Whitefield, Floyd J. Campbell and H. J. Blasing. It was Mr. Blasing who had donated the cornerstone and who yesterday put it into place.

O. G. Hugheson read the list of objects which were placed in the metal box inserted in the stone, consisting of copies of yesterday's papers, a list of city and state officials, a copy of the city charter, a list of the officers and members of the club, together with a brief review of its history, and photographs.

The new building is expected to be finished October 15, and will cost about \$5000.

CONTRACTOR ADMITS WAKEFIELD DELAYS HIM

Cross examination of A. Brandon, subcontractor on the grading work of the Mt. Tabor reservoir, occupied the forenoon in the case of Wakefield & Co. against the city for the payment of \$408,000 for construction of the two water receptacles. Brandon's testimony in chief was to the effect that he and the original contractors were delayed in their work on account of acts of the city.

In his cross examination, Brandon admitted to Assistant City Attorney Tomlinson that Wakefield & Co. caused him considerable delay. This delay was to such an extent that he had to modify the completion of the excavation in September, 1910, but when Brandon started work, or came to Portland in the spring of that year to start work, Wakefield & Co. had not completed the work to such a point as to allow him to excavate.

Brandon said he put his teams to work, scraping for several days, finally placing them on the excavation work. He testified that all the rolled embankment work was to have been completed by April 1, 1910, when his contract began. Since this work was not completed on time, he was delayed in beginning excavation, and so notified Wakefield & Co. that he could not complete his work by September. He had up a \$5000 bond to complete the work on time.

These circumstances brought out the change in the original contract. Evidence also came from this witness that the city inspector continually kept urging him to get better scrapers, as the wheels on the old ones would pick up the dirt, leaving holes in the surface of the excavation.
