

## JOURNAL'S PRESS CAN PRINT 72,000 PAPERS AN HOUR

Editions of Journal Now Being  
Run Off on Mammoth Press  
Which Has Been Installed  
in Its New Home.

Practically the entire marvelous development of the typical metropolitan American newspaper of today has been accomplished in the 80-odd years which have elapsed between the advent of the old Washington hand press, which now occupies a place among the museum "relics," and the perfection of the wonderful Hoe octuple press, on which this number of The Journal is printed.

Monday last this new press, the finest and largest in the northwest, installed in the spacious basement of The Journal's new building at Seventh and Yamhill streets, whirled out its first issue of The Journal. Through the week, although the rest of the mechanical equipment has not been moved, the papers have been printed on the new machine, as they will continue to be printed from now on.

**Press's Enormous Capacity.**  
The new Hoe is one of the two largest presses on the Pacific coast, a similar machine having been recently installed by the Los Angeles Times at Los Angeles. Known as the "double," or "quadruple," the press is really a combination of eight distinct press units, including one color "deck" on top. Larger presses with greater capacity are no more perfect in construction or operation than the octuple, as they are but an additional combination of the individual units.

The capacity of The Journal's new press is 72,000 4, 6, 8, 10, 14 or 16 page papers per hour, all inset, pasted and folded to half-page size; 36,000 18, 20, 22, 24, 26, 28, 30 and 32 page papers collected, composed of two sections laid together to half-page size; 36,000 16, 20, 24, 28 and 32 page papers collected, composed of two sections and laid on each other and delivered folded to gether in half-page sizes; 18,000 36, 40, 44, 48, 52 and 64 page papers collected, composed of either two or four sections, all delivered folded to half-page size.

**Run by Electricity.**  
Electric power operates the press and an elaborate switchboard has been installed to properly regulate the speed of the machine. The great rolls of paper which are fed into the press are lifted into position by a specially built electric power crane, which reduces to a minimum the time and effort expended in supplying the machine's insatiable appetite.

The Journal's new octuple was set up and operated by its manufacturers before it left the Hoe plant in New York. Found to be complete and in working order, the big machine was taken apart again, shipped across the country and set up in its permanent home, special machinery being sent along to put it in readiness for its first tryout.

The Journal has two other presses which will be moved from the old pressroom to the new. The combined capacity of the three machines is 114,000 4, 6, 8, 10 and 12 page papers per hour, or 2400 papers a minute.

The public is invited to view the new press, which can be seen from the Yamhill street side of the new building.

## EQUAL SUFFRAGE WILL MAKE TOUR

Mrs. Atkins to Lecture in  
Eastern Oregon—New  
Clubs in the South.

Mrs. Florence Atkins of Tennessee, equal suffrage lecturer of the Woman's Christian Temperance union, will start an extensive lecture tour of eastern Oregon August 11 under the auspices of the local W. C. T. U. and the campaign committee of the Portland's Woman's club. Her itinerary will include Baker on August 11 and 12, LeGrande, August 13, Union, August 14; Hot Lake, August 15; Echo, August 16, and Milton, August 17.

The campaign committee has received excellent news from organizers in southern Oregon. At Talent, near Medford, a club of 12 members was formed last week, and at Phoenix a club was formed under the auspices of the new Southern Equal Suffrage association. The meeting was held in the home of Mrs. S. P. Cope.

The College Equal Suffrage league board of directors held a meeting Tuesday afternoon and reports of finances and work accomplished were gratifying. It was announced that Miss Jane Addams would not be able to accept the invitation of the club to speak during the campaign owing to illness in her family. It was also announced that an effort is being made to secure ex-Governor Brady of Idaho as a speaker during September.

The directors decided to send organizers to the seaside resorts at once and it is probable that Mrs. Clara B. Colby and assistants will start within a few days. During the meeting announcement was made that Mrs. Frank W. Cotterill, a personal friend of Mr. and Mrs. Jack London, has written to the famous writer inviting him to stop in Portland on his way south from Seattle. Should he accept he will be asked to speak on suffrage.

Window cards have been prepared by the College association and a committee is making arrangements to have them scattered throughout the city. Even more vigorous work than heretofore is to be done by the association, according to its officers. A special meeting of the entire membership of the association will be held next Wednesday afternoon, at which a general review of the work to date will be given.

At Tuesday's monthly meeting of the Portland Equal Suffrage society Mrs. Frank W. Cotterill, organizer among labor unions of the society, gave an interesting address. Mrs. Cotterill is a member of the American Federation of Labor. August 13 Mrs. Cotterill will speak at a big meeting to which everybody will be invited. The meeting will be held in the Seeling-Hirsch building in the evening. Several new members joined the association at Tuesday's meeting.

## 1912 PAMPHLETS WILL COST STATE VERY LARGE SUM

Will Have 264 Pages Each  
and There Will Have to Be  
160,080 of Them; 52,800  
Go to Multnomah County.

Salem, Or., Aug. 1.—It will cost the state something over \$22,000 to furnish the voters with the pamphlet containing the initiative and referendum measures and the arguments for and against them. This year the pamphlet, of which 160,080 will be printed, will be larger than ever before. It will have 264 pages of reading matter, while the pamphlet last year had 208 pages.

Estimates place the cost of printing the pamphlet at \$10,000, the binding \$2500, the paper stock \$3000, postage \$5400 and mailing \$550, making a total of \$22,250.

Six counties will have county measures in the pamphlet. It is now proposed to print these county measures with the exception of those applying to Multnomah, in supplement form and hold them in with the regular pamphlet of general measures that are to be sent to the voters of the county concerned in the county measures. The counties which have special measures are Multnomah, Clackamas, Coos, Harney, Jackson and Wallowa. As Multnomah county will require 52,800 pamphlets, they will be printed separately and the county measures will be printed in with the general measures.

The law provides that the pamphlets must be mailed by the secretary of state not later than September 11, but Secretary of State Gileott expects to have them in the hands of the voters considerably earlier than the date fixed by law. He expects to begin mailing them between August 20 and 25.

## KLICKITAT STOCK WARNED OFF YAKIMA RESERVE

Goldendale, Wash., Aug. 1.—Klickitat farmers and stockmen who have summer range for their stock in the Blincoe mountains, at the head of Three creeks and Deer creek, bordering on the Yakima Indian reservation, have been notified that they must immediately get stock that has strayed across the line to graze off the Indian lands, or the stock will be gathered up and taken to Fort Simcoe by the Indian police, to be held for sale. Figures completed by the Yakima Indian reservation, have been issued from the Indian agency. Farmers and stockmen claim the Indians have no right to hold stock for trespass that is not wilfully driven on the reservation for grazing purposes, as there is no herd law in Washington and the reservation is not fenced. So far they have made no effort to get their stock off the reserve.

## MAYOR OF SEATTLE TO SPEAK FOR SUFFRAGE

Milwaukee, Aug. 1.—Beginning today, the fight for votes for women will increase in vigor in this state. The suffragists have planned a big campaign, and are bringing to the state some of the best known men and women in the country to help their cause. They are planning more speeches by men than by women. As a result of this policy, Mayor George F. Cotterill of Seattle, arrived here today to campaign for equal suffrage.

## TRIAL OF CAMORRISTS COST ITALY \$800,000

Viterbo, Italy, Aug. 1.—The recent trial here of the Camorristi, which broke all records for length, having lasted more than 16 months, is also believed to have exceeded all world's records for cost. Figures completed by Judge Bianchi, who presided throughout the trial, show that it cost, including the work of gathering evidence, \$800,000.

## Pilgrim Fathers Memorial.

Southampton, England, Aug. 1.—Work has started on a handsome memorial to the Pilgrim Fathers, to be placed on the site from which they embarked on the Mayflower. It will be in the form of a marble shaft 60 feet in height. Panels about the base will depict scenes of the voyage.

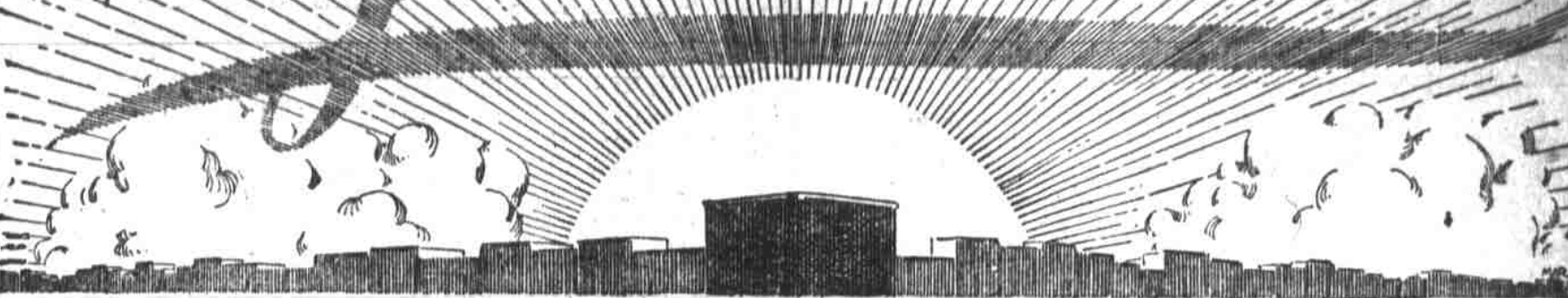
