

## FORMER ITALIAN CONSULAR AGENT PASSES AWAY

Dr. Charles Ferdinand Candiani  
Who Went to His Old Home  
in Italy to Regain Health,  
Well Known in Portland.

Dr. Charles Ferdinand Candiani, formerly Italian consular agent in Portland, and a well known Portland physician, is dead, according to a message received here yesterday morning by Frank C. Pozzi, a friend of Dr. Candiani for many years. Dr. Candiani had been living in Olivola, Italy, where he had resided for some time in an attempt to regain his health. The cablegram arrived here about 10 o'clock yesterday morning. It stated that the doctor had expired during the night of July 31.

Dr. Candiani, who was about 67 years old, left Portland two months ago for his old home in Italy, in company with his wife and C. Marco, a Portland merchant. At the time he was suffering from complications resulting from rheumatism and little hope was held out for his ultimate recovery. He had to be carried on board the train and at many places enroute to New York.

**Physician Well Known Here.**  
He and his little party were met at Genoa, Italy, upon the arrival of the steamer, by Dr. Candiani's brother. He was taken by automobile to Castle of Olivola where he died Wednesday night or early Thursday morning.

Dr. Candiani was very well known in this city, having been in Portland since 1875. It was he, with the cooperation of three other Italians, that started the Italian colony in Portland and in other places in Oregon. For a number of years he practiced medicine in this city until ill health compelled him to discontinue his work, two years ago. In 1898 he was appointed Italian consular agent and held this position until he was taken ill.

Shortly after Dr. Candiani's arrival in Portland he established an Italian colony in Yamhill county and near Cape Horn, Wash. Many Italians of these colonies are now living in Portland and the vicinity. From Portland he moved to the Cascade Locks, where he lived for a number of years. At one time he was justice of the peace of that place.

**Was Member of Elks.**  
It was there that he was married. He was engaged in the drug business and was a thorough chemist. He also was interested in several fishing companies along the upper Columbia river. Later he returned to Portland and became interested in the mining business, besides owning an orchard and vegetable tract near Vancouver, Wash.

Dr. Candiani was a member of the local lodge of Elks, and a member of many of the Italian societies on the Pacific coast. Besides a widow, he leaves a brother and sister in Olivola, Italy. Because of his prominence as an Italian worker among the colonists it is probable that the different Italian societies will hold some sort of memorial services within a few days. The body will be buried near his old home in Italy.

## STEAMER KILBURN CONTINUES VOYAGE

Fire in Engine Room Damages  
Vessel and Several Are  
Injured.

(United Press Leased Wire.)  
San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 2.—That the fire in the steamer F. A. Kilburn while on her way to Eureka, was not so serious as reported, was the statement issued today by officials of the North Pacific Steamship company.

The announcement was made that the vessel was able to start on the return voyage and would arrive here at her usual time, Saturday.

The fire was confined to the engine room amidships. There were 130 passengers aboard, mostly from San Francisco. The usual quota will be carried on the return trip.

The reports from Eureka were that only the calmness of the sea prevented a disastrous catastrophe.

The fire was discovered at 11 o'clock Wednesday night in the engine room while the steamer was 25 miles south of Point Arena. It burned fiercely for two hours and because of its rapid encroachment on the wireless room, the radio apparatus was early put out of commission.

There were several narrow escapes and two accidents during the progress of the fire. E. G. Clough, chief engineer, and Sidney Ashton, chief steward, who rescued two girls from suffocation, fell to the deck and were bruised, while Conrad Newmyer, a wiper, sustained a broken leg in a fall to the deck.

The F. A. Kilburn, which is a wooden vessel and was burned to the water's edge at the Oakland long wharf about two years ago, is well known in Portland, having been on the run between the Oregon metropolises and Coos Bay about 10 years ago, being owned at the time by the Watson Navigation company. Since that time she has been lengthened and changed in other ways.

**WARRANT IS ISSUED  
FOR FURNITURE MAN**

Mrs. M. E. Camille of 570 Couch street, who was responsible for the indictment of Attorney C. H. Libby, on a charge of embezzlement and misappropriation of funds, several months ago, this morning secured a warrant for the arrest of Harold R. Butler of the Butler Furniture company, 662 Williams avenue, whom she accuses of larceny by embezzlement of \$600.

According to the complaint by the woman, Butler recently made her a proposition to take the furniture which she had in a rooming house at East First and East Ankeny streets and sell it, and then reestablish her in a fashionable rooming house on the west side. The man is said to have taken furniture valued at \$350 from her, and later, through intrigue, secured checks and money from her to the extent of \$600.

When the woman demanded the return of her money and the profits from the sale of the furniture, the man failed to comply, but offered her interest in his business. It is said, she at first objected, but finally agreed if certain conditions were carried out. These, it is claimed, were never lived up to, hence the request for the arrest of the man. F. P. Rondeau is representing the woman.

**URNS STATE'S EVIDENCE;  
ACCUSES EX-CONVICT**

Detectives Swensen, Maloney and Snow last night arrested Jim Monroe, an escaped convict, and Joe Brown, a delinquent, for the robbery of aged Tom Howell of 558 Hood street on the night of April 4, 1912, when the two men entered the store and stole by the old man, and at the point of a gun demanded his money, it is claimed.

Brown, who has turned state's evidence, confesses to the holdup and implicates Monroe, who escaped from the Iowa state penitentiary. According to the story told by both Brown and the victim, Howell, Brown entered the store to buy some tobacco and while in there, Monroe came in and held the old man up. Nothing of value was secured at the time, however. Howell was brought to police headquarters this morning and asked to pick out the holdup men from the line of prisoners who had been arrested without hesitation to the two men, naming Monroe as the gun-man. Both were indicted by the grand jury this morning.

**OLD PENDLETON ACADEMY  
SOLD TO LA GRANDE MAN**

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 2.—By a deal completed yesterday the buildings formerly occupied by Pendleton academy in this city were sold to Henry T. Hill, a real estate dealer of La Grande, by the Presbyterian college board. The consideration has not been made public. It is understood Mr. Hill purchased the property as a speculation and already has a prospective buyer for Brown Hall, formerly used as a men's dormitory. Since the Pendleton academy closed its doors two years ago the two fine brick buildings have stood empty save the last few months of the past school year, when one building was used as temporary quarters for the high school while the new high school building was being constructed.

**State Editors Will See Round-Up.**

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 2.—The Pendleton Round-up will be attended by newspaper men from all over the state, the annual convention of the State Editorial association having been scheduled for this city on the Round-up dates. If Secretary Phil Bates can fill four cars, the O.-W.-R. & N. company will grant him a special newspaper train out of Portland on Friday evening-September 27, the train to lie over here Saturday, go on to Hot Lake for Sunday and return to Portland in time to connect with the Monday morning train to the Willamette valley.

**Paving Idea Takes Hold.**

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 2.—With West Court street already being paved with gravel bitulith, there is a strong likelihood that the property holders of other Pendleton streets will follow the lead. A petition asking for similar improvement of West Webb street has been presented to the city council and other petitions are being circulated among the property owners on Jackson and Water streets. When the work under way on Court street is completed the city will have a paved thoroughfare from Main street to Round-up Park.

**STRAHORN LOOKS OVER  
EUGENE-CRESWELL ROAD**

Eugene, Or., Aug. 2.—Robert E. Strahorn, president of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern Railway company, spent all day yesterday inspecting the route of a proposed electric road to extend southward from Eugene over a range of hills to Creswell. There has been much question whether a line with a satisfactory grade could be built over this route, but it is understood Mr. Strahorn was satisfied as to the grade, although he declines to make a public statement to that effect.

Several months ago a preliminary survey was made over this route at the instance of P. E. Snodgrass, vice president of the First National bank of this city, and Frank L. Chambers, a retired hardware merchant, who own, jointly, a tract of several thousand acres of land half way between Eugene and Creswell. They have secured deeds to the right of way the entire distance and have offered it to the first company that guarantees to build the line.

Chief Slover's plan is to have every policeman provided with some sort of a retainer so that when he sees an opportunity to capture a stray dog, he may do so. He will then tie the dog to his leg or to a convenient telephone pole to hold the animal until the dog wagon arrives.

## ALLEGED SPEEDER APPEALS CASE

Oregon Naval Militia Officer  
Admits Identity—Other  
Offenders Fined.

W. H. Rober, executive officer of the Oregon Naval militia and a salesman for W. P. Fuller & Co., who under the name of W. H. Roberts was yesterday morning sentenced to five days in jail for trying to drive his automobile while in an intoxicated condition, late yesterday admitted his identity, and started a fight to be released from jail. This morning, however, Judge Tazewell stated that he would compel the man to stay in jail until Saturday night, when he would reopen the case and suspend sentence. This morning, however, the sentence was passed and notice of appeal was given.
