

SETTLERS WANT AID FROM STATE

Homesteaders in North Lake County Plan to Get Experimental Farm.

(Special to The Journal.) Lake, Lake Co., Or., Aug. 5.—Northern Lake county settlers, especially those in Pleasant valley in the vicinity of Lake, Arrow, Viewpoint, Cliff, Buffalo and Butte, postoffice, want an experimental farm located about the center of the valley. Crops this year have been wonderfully successful, though the fact remains that but about one homestead in ten is capable of making his land produce even a quarter of what it is capable of producing. This lack of industry is due to two important causes. Shortage of money and lack of knowledge of what to do and what not to do, in handling the land.

Feeling that they are an integral portion of Oregon with an area of 600,000 acres of land, the most of which is good agricultural land, in southern Oregon, and that the Oregon Trunk railway cannot long overlook the tillable area that is handicapped for transportation, the people of this portion of the county desire that they be brought closer to the business men and people of the state. If their lands are properly tilled and the crops multiplied on the lands that are so productive when handled even carelessly, they feel that they should have cooperation to obtain the desired experimental station. F. A. Remington, W. R. Kieck, F. E. Anderson, F. A. Watkins and many other live settlers here have signified that they will give 150 acres of land for use of the experimental station for a term of years.

BAKER FEELS EFFECT ON LIGHT COMPETITION

(Special to The Journal.) Baker, Or., Aug. 5.—With the decision of the city commissioners that the city lighting contract will be decided by competitive bids, comes the announcement by the Eastern Oregon Light & Power company, the present holders of the contract, that the monthly meter maintenance fee of 25 cents would be discontinued, which means a monthly saving of several thousand dollars to the consumers.

The action by the present lighting company followed the announcement of the Eagle River Light & Power company that it would furnish light and power at about one-half the present cost. It was on the representation of the latter company that the commissioners decided to open the contract to bids. The Eastern Oregon company wanted a five year contract, which the people did not desire. The two companies will submit bids on or before August 15. According to the terms of the advertisement, the new contract is to date from October and run for two years.

The Eagle river plant and power line is about completed and the officials say they can deliver power by that time. The entrance of this company brings competition into the local field for the first time.

BAKER SWEET PEA SHOW PLANS ARE MATURED

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AMERICAN DANES BUY HOARY HEATH

Typical Ancient Landscape to Be Preserved in Park—Starry Flag to Fly.

Copenhagen, Denmark, Aug. 5.—Americans of Danish descent have purchased a tract of 300 acres of typical and virgin Danish heath landscape which is to be preserved for all ages to come as a national park. The park is a gift to the Danish nation from Danish Americans, as a memorial of their love and good will. It is dedicated today.

The wonderful picturesque Danish heath, which for ages has furnished inspiration to national artists and poets, has been disappearing fast for the onslaught of the thrifty Danish farmers, who are bringing every available square inch of Denmark's soil under cultivation. One day it dawned upon the Danish people that soon there would be nothing left of this typical landscape, and while the good people of Denmark were discussing ways and means of preserving this virgin soil, Americans of Danish descent had already had a representative on the spot who had bought from a number of small land owners the 300 acre tract known as Rehdal Bakkar (Rehdal Hills), considered the most beautiful part of the heath, besides having historical associations dating hundreds of years back.

President Taft has accepted the honorary presidency of the plan. The honorary vice presidents are the United States minister at Copenhagen, Dr. Maurice Francis Egan and the Danish minister at Washington, Count Carl Moltke. Officers of the committee are Dr. Max Habius, chairman; Mr. Carl Antonsen, secretary; and Consul C. H. Hanson, treasurer, all of Chicago. On the committee are a number of prominent and representative Danish-Americans from all parts of the United States.

The Danish-American National Park was formally presented to a representative of the royal government at the dedication. The deed to the park passes to the people of Denmark, with the proviso that on each Fourth of July the stars and stripes are to be hoisted over the park, and the park turned over to the Americans.

COQUILLE PLANS NEW HIGH SCHOOL

Board of Education Prepares to Erect Two Story Modern Building.

(Special to The Journal.) Coquille, Or., Aug. 5.—Coquille educators are pushing the movement for a new high school. Sentiment is in favor of abandoning the old Academy building on account of its unsanitary features, and another modern building is badly needed. The Coquille Library association has offered its property as a building site but the grounds are hardly large enough to permit a playground. At a recent meeting of the school board tentative plans for a new high school building were considered. The plans were for a building two stories and basement to be constructed of red brick.

Fair Plans Maturing.
Coquille, Or., Aug. 5.—Citizens here are enthusiastic over the prospects of the coming Children's Industrial Fair, to be held in conjunction with the first annual fair and race meet at Myrtle Point, September 25. Representatives of various Coos county cities met here Friday to arrange prizes and to complete plans to procure an exhibit. Merchants and individuals have subscribed liberally to the fund and the committee has \$600 in cash available as prizes. The committee in charge consists of N. C. Morris, of the extension department of the O. A. C., and field organizer of the Children's Industrial contest, A. G. Raab, principal of the North Bend schools; Dr. Stenler and L. A. Roberts, of Myrtle Point; R. S. Knowlton and C. A. Howard, of Coquille. County School Superintendent W. H. Bunch is also giving his aid to the contest.

AUTO ARRANGED AS HOTEL WITH A TENT GARAGE GOES ON TOUR

OKLAHOMA HOLDS PRIMARY ELECTION

Senator and Eight Congressmen to Be Nominated in New State Tomorrow.

Oklahoma City, Okla., Aug. 5.—One United States senator, eight congressmen (under new apportionment), a state corporation commissioner, justices of the supreme court and the criminal court of appeals and the members of the 1913 legislature are to be nominated in the Oklahoma primaries tomorrow. The most interest, of course, centers in the contest for the United States senatorship. The senatorial vote is not a direct nomination, but it is an expression of preference supposed to bind the legislature which next winter will name a successor to Robert L. Owen, who is a candidate for reelection.

Former Governor Charles N. Haskell is opposing Senator Owen for the Democratic nomination for the senatorship. The fight between the two was commenced as early as last December and has been extremely bitter. Five Republicans are contesting for the Republican endorsement for the senatorship. Among them is "Dynamite Ed" Perry, of Coalgate, who is regarded as the leader of the Roosevelt faction of the Republican party in Oklahoma. All of the five representatives who now make up the Oklahoma delegation in the lower branch of congress are candidates for renomination. The three new representatives are to be elected as congressmen-at-large, because of the failure of the legislature to re-district the state. For the three seats there are a total of 44 aspirants, including 25 Democrats, 13 Republicans and three Socialists.

'DYNAMITERS' WILL NOT TAKE STAND

Alleged Conspirators Will Not Offer Any Evidence in Own Behalf.

(United Press Special Wire.) Indianapolis, Aug. 5.—That the defendants in the dynamite conspiracy cases which are set for trial in the federal court October 1 do not expect to introduce any evidence in their own behalf, was the declaration of Herbert S. Hockin, secretary of the Iron Workers' union. Hockin is one of the men under indictment.

"We are going to let the government pick its own jury and introduce all the evidence it has and that will be all there is to it," declared Hockin. "If any intelligent man on a jury will say that the government can prove that we carried dynamite or conspired I will eat my shirt."

FRUIT PESTS TROUBLE GOOSE LAKE ORCHARDS

(Special to The Journal.) Lakeview, Or., Aug. 5.—Aphis, codling moth, San Jose scale, blight and other pests have made their appearance in large numbers in the finest orchards from Davis creek at the lower end of the valley here to Lakeview. This has been known as a country absolutely free from fruit pests until this year. The importation of large quantities of young trees without adequate inspection, has been blamed for the trouble that will cause much work and considerable expense before it is entirely eliminated. Last spring the spraying was poorly done and instead of following the first application with another when the trees were in bloom, this important part of the work was in many instances neglected. The lack of care has been caused by unfamiliarity with the methods generally used in well known fruit districts, owing to the healthful condition of the trees heretofore.

MRS. T. R. BLACKABY DIES AT ONTARIO, OR., HOME

Blackaby, wife of President Blackaby, of the Commercial club, one of the best known society and club women of this section, died very suddenly of heart failure at her home in this city. Few of her friends were aware she was ill and her sudden death was a great shock. Besides her husband, she leaves a small daughter, Margaret, about five years of age. Her mother and two sisters, Mrs. M. Currey and two daughters, Estelle and Wilmoth, reside here. She was also a sister of Dr. Currey of Baker. Mrs. Blackaby was a native of Indiana.
