

OAKLAND RETAINS MOTT AS MAYOR

Executive Wins Sweeping Victory in Recall Election, Winning by 1000.

Oakland, Cal., Aug. 6.—After a sweeping victory in a recall election, at which the voters expressed their preference for the extent of nearly 7,000 majority, Mayor Mott today resumed his chair as the chief executive of the city, and Commissioners F. T. Turner and W. J. Hucius will also remain in office for the remainder of their terms.

CLATSOP COUNTY FAIR HAS LIBERAL PRIZE LIST

(Special to The Journal.) Astoria, Or., Aug. 6.—To make the second annual Clatsop county fair at Gearhart park, September 12, 13 and 14, a fine advertising medium for Clatsop county, is the object of the Lower Columbia Agricultural company.

Construction work will soon be under way toward erecting a number of new buildings, to be used for housing the stock and agricultural and horticultural exhibits. The premium list will be extensive and liberal, including a large number of special prizes donated by prominent residents of Gearhart park, Astoria and Portland.

The management of the fair has arranged to close the last day with an exciting steeplechase. The assistance of James Nichols, owner of the Portland Riding academy, now at Gearhart park with his horses, has been enlisted in the venture, which will be pulled off on the five mile course along the beach.

The object of the steeplechase is to give a little diversified amusement to the Portland Commercial club and members of the Oregon Development league who will be present on that date.

VALLEY OF M'KENZIE DELIGHT TO STRAHORN

Robert E. Strahorn, president of the Portland, Eugene & Eastern railway, the electric system of the Southern Pacific in the Willamette valley, has returned from a trip to Eugene and up the McKenzie River valley.

McKenzie River valley is a wonderful stretch of fertile land," said Mr. Strahorn enthusiastically yesterday. "It is a great Mecca for summer campers. When, during the two days we spent on the road going up and down the valley, we saw an almost unbroken string of camps and met about 50 automobiles. The valley depends on auto trucks and auto stages for transportation, but is well cultivated in many places and has several very prosperous communities. I believe some of the oldest farms in the state are in the McKenzie valley. The valley has an abundance of fine timber, including maple, especially well adapted for the manufacture of furniture. The mining industry is important, too, the Blue River mines being at the upper end of the valley.

State Insane Asylum Must Remove Unsanitary Conditions.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Aug. 6.—The state board of health has condemned the hog house at the state asylum for the insane. Superintendent Steiner has been notified that the house must be put in a sanitary condition or be abolished within 30 days.

During the last session of the legislature Superintendent Steiner called the attention of the law makers to the great need of an adequate hog house for the insane asylum and asked for an appropriation for erecting such a building. His request was turned down.

CHINESE PHEASANTS WILL BE RELEASED

Over 3000 Chinese pheasants raised on the state game farm near Corvallis are to be turned loose in different sections of the state beginning next week. State Game Warden Finley has made arrangements to have each bird marked with an aluminum tag which is numbered and has the date and place of release marked. In this manner he hopes when the habit of pheasant hunting is taken off to be able to trace the migration of birds and the changes in conditions and appearances. The birds are to be turned loose wherever requests are received and promises made to see that the birds are not molested and are fed during extreme weather. A large number are also to be turned out on the game preserves in different parts of the state.

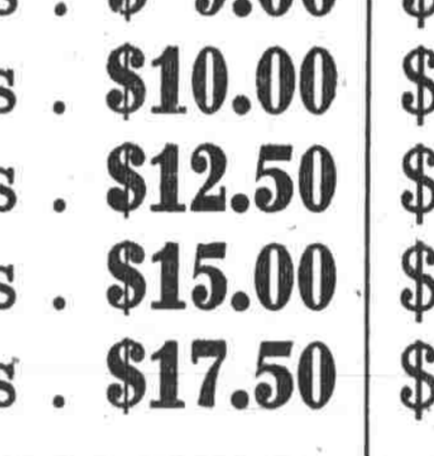

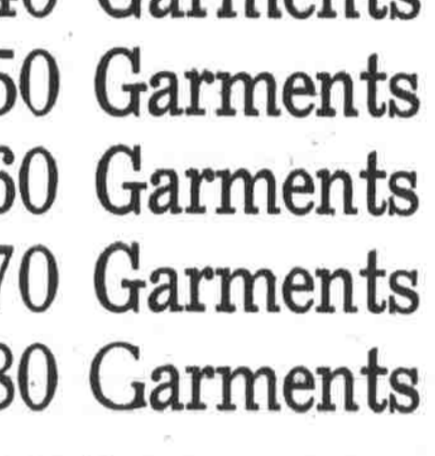
