

FREE CUPS MUST BE KEPT ON CARS

Idaho Forces Railroads to Furnish Sanitary Drinking Vessels to Passengers.

(Special to The Journal.)
Boise, Idaho, Aug. 7.—The state medical board yesterday adopted a resolution requiring railroad companies within this state to furnish, free of charge, sanitary drinking cups for all passengers upon request.

About two years ago an order was issued abolishing the use of the common drinking cup on trains within this state. That order was complied with by the railroads which thereupon supplied cups which were placed on sale on the trains, passengers desiring to quench their thirst being required to buy one of these cups from the train boys unless by reason of foresight and knowledge they had provided themselves with a cup of their own.

Many passengers, however, especially passengers of the poorer classes, were compelled to suffer greatly because of the regulation. Many of them passing through the state as home-seekers, were not aware of the regulation, and had not made provision for cups of their own and many of them are illly able to spare even the nickel required to buy one, many times. Hereafter, all that will be required is to request a drinking cup and one will have to be furnished at the expense of the railroad.

shares of stock being of a par value of \$100 each. Up till a few months ago, however, the market price of the stock was as low as \$10 a share with little active demand for it even at that figure.

President Samuel Hill of the Home Telephone company is out of the city at present, but the information was obtained from a friend of Mr. Hill today that he has denied that his company intends to sell out to the Pacific Telephone interests.

Threatens to Bring Damage Suit.
The battle now centers on the result of the petition of the Pacific Telephone company for an injunction against the Multnomah hotel. This hotel, the largest in the city, signed a three year contract with the Pacific company, and later entered into an agreement with the Home company. It is said that the Home company bound itself to pay the amount due the rival concern on its three year contract. This amount, it is reliably stated, is \$30,000.

It is not believed that the Pacific company will be able to prevent the Multnomah hotel from installing the automatic phones in its rooms and discharging the Pacific phones, but the threat is made by the Pacific company that it will bring a big damage suit against the Multnomah, in the event that an injunction is not granted.

If the Home company proves to be victorious in the injunction suit, then the complete supremacy in the hotel business of the city will be assured. The Imperial, the Oregon and Portland hotels have all signed contracts to install the automatic service in place of the other telephone service, on condition that all four of the hotels are bound by the same agreement. If the injunction should be decided favorably for the Home interests in the Multnomah case the contracts already entered into by the other hotels are thereby abrogated.

War on at Oswego.
The local telephone war has also broken out at Oswego. Yesterday the Bell company withdrew its service from the Oswego exchange and the Home company promptly extended its lines and connected with the same exchange, with the result that many Oswego residents are today talking over the Automatic's lines.

As the story goes, the Oswego patrons of the Pacific States company have been clamoring for a better service, and not getting it, most of them signed up with the Home company. The Pacific States people hearing of this action sent a force of men out Monday night and disconnected all of their Oswego lines. Yesterday the Home company had a large force of men extending its lines from Riverside south and connecting up with Oswego phone users.

The whole telephone trouble at Oswego arose over the failure of E. D. Adamson, owner of the Oswego exchange, to keep his contract with us," said C. H. Moore, district superintendent of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company. "Several months ago Adamson put in an exchange at Oswego and our company furnished him service with Portland. Recently we understood that he had signed a contract with the Home company for its Portland service and of course we promptly withdrew our service. We are now engaged in re-installing Pacific telephones for our customers."

Other Towns May Be Affected.
As a result of the new arrangement at Oswego there is a strong probability that Tigard, Greenburg, Mitzell, Nesmith and Garden Home will be supplied with Home phones by October 1. This entire district has never been served with local phones in spite of the fact that hundreds of residents have insistently demanded for several years of the Bell company that it invade that territory.

The Home company reports that it has installed over 2000 telephones in Portland hotels in place of Bell instruments during the past 60 days. Officials of the Home Telephone company made the statement today that 19,600 had been expended since the first of the year in extending its city service. Large cables have been extended to Woodlawn, Rose City Park, Montavilla and to the southeastern section of the city, with a view to greatly increasing the residence telephone service of the company.

Railroad Plans Interfere.

Brooks, Or., Aug. 7.—James Fratt of this place will have to leave his residence soon if the plans for double tracking the Southern Pacific are carried out. The brick house of Frank Beatty, of Chemawa, is also in the path of the proposed line, while the wagon road through the Indian school ground will be occupied by the extension. Some farmers are holding out for \$200 an acre for land through which the track will be laid.
