

TWO ROAD HOUSES CLOSED BY SHERIFF; WAR IS DECLARED

City and County Officers Unite to Keep Suburb Resorts Morally Fit; Joyriders to Feel Law's Hand.

Chief's Order Hits Joy Riders.
"Captain Keller. With a view to cooperating and assisting in every way possible Sheriff Stevens in his endeavor to clean up this joy riding element, you will investigate all cases coming under your attention and instruct all officers, especially those stationed on streets leading toward roadhouses, to be vigilant in stopping and questioning all automobile parties coming in after the hour of 1 a. m. and who show any indication of not being out for proper purposes. You will also pay particular attention to motorcycle riders who carry young girls on the rear seats of their motorcycles. In all cases where parties are stopped under the authority of this order, the officers must be brought to headquarters on charges of being out after hours."

Sheriff Stevens and the grand jury last night started war on the road houses. Two places were closed and ordered to stay closed. Four taverns were ordered to close at 12 o'clock on Saturday night, and 1 o'clock through the week. The slightest infraction of this order means the arrest of the proprietors and all persons found in the places.
This activity on the part of the county officials, who will be assisted by the police department, was brought on by the grand jury's finding that the roadhouse, on the Linnton road, in which two men were seriously beaten by joyriders. Sheriff Stevens gave orders this afternoon to his deputies to be on guard tonight at each tavern, in which they agreed to work together to suppress the joyriding element after the midnight hour. The police will stop all auto parties entering the city after midnight. If such parties can give a reasonable excuse for being out, they will be allowed to proceed, but the joyriders will be arrested under the vagrancy law.

As Members They Get Liquor.
The grand jury has been informed that the Twelve Mile house was operating under the guise of a social club. Two members of that body were authorized to investigate. They asked for a deputy sheriff, and Harry Bulger was detailed to go with them. At the Twelve Mile house, which is operated by Frank Lovridge, the two grand jurors went in to investigate. They called for liquor but were told they must become members to get it. The proprietor was then ordered to close the place. Deputy Sheriff Bulger and Hunter then went down Linnton road, ordering all taverns closed at 1 o'clock. All closed at this hour.

Joy Riders Must Be Kept Early.
"I propose to arrest every roadhouse operator upon the least infraction of the law," said Sheriff Stevens this morning. "All houses must close at midnight on Saturday and 1 o'clock through the week. All joy riders must be off the public roads by that time. I propose to arrest all persons on the roads not able to give a good reason for being out at that hour. I and my deputies know a joy rider and a member of the 'rough neck' class from pleasure riders, and there will be no 'monkey' business in this matter. I was in Seattle when I heard of the riot Friday morning at the Hut. I knew the crowd and knew they had stepped over all bounds of decency. I rode with me and I came home on the next train to start this fight against 'rough neck' work on the county roads and around taverns. There are some auto drivers who are all right, but there are some who have no right whatever to be on the public highways."

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BOY SCALDED, DIES NINE DAYS LATER

Nine days after he had fallen into a bucket of boiling water and been terribly scalded, Coney Malvin Chaudle, 3 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. W. Chaudle, of 1181 Maryland avenue, died at his home early yesterday morning. If he had lived just 24 hours longer, Dr. Frisbie, the child's physician, said that he would have recovered.

Half the skin on the child's body was scalded when he tripped over a bucket of hot water which he did not see, in the kitchen, and fell into it on July 21. Death in usually certain, physicians say, when one-third of the skin area is scalded.

Kept for three days in water, part of the time unconscious, new skin had formed on the little boy's body, and the crisis from the scalding itself was past. Heart failure, caused by general weakness from the long ordeal, was the direct cause of death.

The funeral will be held from the residence of his parents Sunday at noon. Burial will be at Riverview cemetery.

HURLBURT TO TELL OF PLANS FOR BIG SEWER

With the plans for a sewer to cost approximately \$2,000,000 which will drain the Vernon, Placerville and Peninsula districts, City Engineer Hurlburt will appear before a mass meeting at Thiel's hall on Killingsworth avenue next Monday evening. His address will be delivered under the auspices of the North Portland Commercial club and property owners of the districts affected are asked to attend. The hall is opposite the Killingsworth avenue car barn.

The regular meeting of the Commercial club will be held next Tuesday evening and then a committee will recommend the time and place of a banquet to be given for the promotion of the interstate bridge over the Columbia between Portland and Vancouver. The Portland, Vancouver and St. Johns Commercial clubs will be invited. The Tuesday evening meeting is to be held in Kenton.

President J. H. Nolta of the club has appointed a number of working committees which are as follows:

RAINMAKERS' CARNIVAL TO BE HELD AT BOISE
E. H. Peasley, a prominent business man of Boise, Idaho, is in Portland this week on a tour of recreation and incidentally doing a little boosting for the Idaho-Intermountain fair, to be held in Boise in the early part of October. The fair will begin October 7, to last a week.

In connection with the fair will be what is called the Rainmakers' carnival, which will cover the amusement features of the affair. Mr. Peasley is chairman of the executive committee of the carnival. The entire affair will be under the auspices of the Boise Commercial club, of which Mr. Peasley is an active member and officer.

"We expect to have a very successful fair this year," said Mr. Peasley this morning, "and we are doing our very best to make it interesting in every way. The fair itself will in all probability be the best ever held in that part of the country and the Rainmakers' carnival will include many very interesting features."

Blind Couple Seek Divorce.
Los Angeles, Aug. 10.—Pending further investigation, Judge Monroe today has halted the case of Mrs. Dottie Reed, who seeks divorce from Benjamin Reed. Both are blind. The woman alleges her husband beat her with a cane and taught their small son to drink beer. The boy was given into the temporary custody of his mother.

PROGRESSIVES AT MEETING CHEER NAME OF WILSON

Speakers at Medical Building Predict Election of New Jersey Governor; Bull Moose Gets Scoring.

Filling the hall to the doors, an enthusiastic crowd gathered at the quarters of the Progressive Democratic club at the Medical Building last night and cheered the name of Woodrow Wilson, along with every prediction of the speakers that he will carry Oregon as well as the nation in November.

C. E. Wood, Dr. Harry Lane, Milton A. Miller and Samuel White were speakers. It was the first open meeting of the club and its success gave the organizers great encouragement. Alva L. McDonald, the president, was in the chair.

Colonel Wood made a brief talk, in which he dealt with Wilson's speech of acceptance. He said the candidate has not flinched anywhere, neither has he made a demagogic appeal to the people. He declared that Wilson's speech shows a clear comprehension of the difficulties before the nation, and a steady purpose to pursue the course of right government.

Wilson is in position to apply the remedy. Colonel Wood read frequently from the speech of Wilson to apply his remarks.

Milton A. Miller of Lebanon followed giving statistics of the tariff and extravagance in government. On the point of extravagance he pointed out that the cost of government in 1860 was \$1 per capita, \$6 in 1890, \$8 in 1900 and \$12.50 in 1912. He took a heavy tilt at the Bull Moose.

Tolls of Great Expense.
"In four years of the last Roosevelt administration," he said, "the appropriations were \$3,428,000,000, or \$33,000,000 more than during four years of civil war. Roosevelt uttered not one word of protest. During the seven years of his administration, 100,000 new officers were added to the army."

There is an overcapitalization of \$30,000,000,000 in the securities of this country, on which the people are compelled to pay dividends. The income of the steel trust in 1911 was \$702,000,000 and the income of the United States government \$700,000,000. The great industry has a greater income than the government.

"The tariff is being levied under pretext of benefiting the laboring man. But the steel trust, out of 200,000 men, employs 160,000 foreigners, pays them starvation wages, and treats them as old junk."

President Taft enjoys the distinction of being the only president to veto bills that would reduce the tariff and lift some of the burden from the people.

We find that under the tariff today banknotes pay 125 per cent, diamonds 10 per cent, dress goods pay 105 per cent and champagne 50 per cent. Sugar pays 19 per cent, jewel boxes 32 per cent, stockings 88 per cent and automobiles 45 per cent. To cap the climax, the duty was taken from playing cards and put on the Bible.

Gift to Railroads.
Mr. Miller referred to the payment of \$7,000,000 to the railroads for carrying the mails, and to the gift to the railroads of lands equal in area to New York, New Jersey, Ohio, Indiana, Iowa and Pennsylvania. He said he would rather see this sum paid to the unemployed employees of the post office department.

He quoted the famous letter of Lincoln in 1864, in which the great emancipator said, "As a result of the war corporations have been enthroned and an era of corruption in high places will follow. I feel at this moment, amidst the clamor for the safety of my country, that ever before, even in the midst of war."

Dr. Harry Lane, Democratic nominee for United States senator, was introduced by President McDonald as one who is "not a sphinx," and Dr. Lane aroused much enthusiasm by his vigorous summing up of Democratic principles.

"No party deserves to exist," he exclaimed, "that allows an element of the people, a minority, to prey upon and rob the majority. The only way to settle the tariff question is to insist that the plain people get equal justice in the laws of the country."

"No bull moose can teach progressiveness to an Oregonian. We were applying these principles while they were stampeding. We respect the bar and the bench, and it is because we respect them that we are just as much opposed to being robbed by a dishonest judge as by a hole. We may feel a little more insulted by the judge, because he ought to know better."

Tariff Used as Tax.
"The tariff is used as a tax. At the beginning some small industries were enabled to get a little help. But the growth of the system has led to a great abuse and oppression, and this growth is worse than the mere monetary loss of hundreds of millions taken from the masses. It has corrupted the government and put a false estimate upon our national affairs. It has allowed a few to delude the representatives of the people."

"Great captains of industry have gotten millions, and what benefits have we had? They have bought a few lawless judges and spawned counts for sons-in-law."

"I know the people of Oregon, and they are not going to take any flimflam this year. They do not want a man who says he is the most progressive stampeder on earth, and they do not want one who has to carry a sunshade on a warm day to keep from being sunburned."

The last speaker of the evening was Samuel White, who spoke briefly. He said the Democratic party has always been progressive and that Wilson's speech of acceptance shows he is the clearest headed statesman and most profound scholar nominated for president since Thomas Jefferson.

LAFFERTY REJOICES OVER BILLS' PASSAGE

Washington, Aug. 10.—"The day I never get any bills passed," exclaimed Lafferty today. "Well," he continued, "I got through the house today two bills."

One of the bills referred to is for reimbursing Robert E. Scott, of Portland, in the sum of \$475 for services in Utah in excess of contract requirements. The other grants \$500 to Harry Wade for injuries received while drilling on the Cello canal May 10, 1912, struck an underground load, injuring his sight and breaking his ear drums.

MEXICAN REBELS UPON WAY TO JUAREZ; WILL DISCUSS PEACE TERMS

Reported That Several Federal Commanders to Meet Generals of Orozco.

El Paso, Texas, Aug. 10.—Commanding rebel generals today are on the way to Juarez from all sections of Mexico to confer with Pascual Orozco, commander-in-chief of the revolutionary forces, regarding peace negotiations.

While verification has not been obtained, it is believed that several of the federal commanders will participate in the conference. It was the first open meeting of the club and its success gave the organizers great encouragement. Alva L. McDonald, the president, was in the chair.

It was reported today that General Orozco agreed to 15 days of peace, beginning yesterday, while the conference is in progress, but that later he declared the truce at an end.

American Miners in Peril.
Mexico City, Mex., Aug. 10.—To protect Americans believed to be imperiled in the Tehuantepec mine, in northern Durango, Minister of Foreign Affairs Lafferty has ordered the governors of the states of Durango and Sinaloa to rush troops to that point at once.

Raiding Bandits Recross Lines.
Austin, Texas, Aug. 10.—Fearing a clash with United States troops, Mexican bandits who crossed over the international boundary into Texas and raided several ranches near Sierra Blanca, withdrew today across the border, according to word received here. Colonel Steever, of El Paso, ordered American troops to patrol the border to prevent a renewal of the raids.

I STILL LOVE EUGENE GRACE

Mrs. Grace Says if His Family Leaves Them Alone They Can Be Happy.

Philadelphia, Pa., Aug. 10.—Declaring that she still loves her husband, Mrs. Daisy O. Grace, recently acquitted of the charge of attempting to murder him, is today hoping to effect a reconciliation, according to statements made here following her return from Atlanta.

Mrs. Grace, mother of Mrs. Grace, said that she had a friend that she soon expected to have another grandchild.

Speaking of the man who accused her of shooting him as he slept, Mrs. Grace said:

"I still love Eugene Grace, no matter what he has charged me with doing. I love him. I simply can't help it. I believe, if his family would only leave us alone, we could live happily together."

CHARTER MAY GO TO COUNCIL WEDNESDAY

The official charter board expects to file the completed draft of the commission plan charter with the council at its meeting next Wednesday. On Monday evening the charter board will meet to consider suggestions that may be received relative to changes or amendments in the draft.

Though the people were invited to submit suggestions and criticisms freely, S. Grute, member and secretary of the charter board, says he has received but one. A number of provisions are to be submitted with the charter at the election, as amendments if he voted on separately. Among these is the section that gives the Greater Portland plan a guiding influence in the future building of the city.

LUMBERMEN MEET AT DINNER; HEAR TALKS

A number of Portland and Willamette valley lumbermen met at dinner at the Portland hotel last night and listened to a talk on the workmen's compensation act now in force in the state of Washington, by Chairman C. A. Pratt, chairman of the Washington Industrial commission. Oregon lumbermen who have interests in the law working out well both in the interest of employers and employees as it disposes of a lot of expensive litigation.

JOY RIDE ROWDIES TO REPENT ON ROCKPILE

Thirty days on the rock pile add a fine of \$50 was the sentence Ian Black and Leo Nichols got yesterday afternoon from Judge Bell of the justice court, who the two young men pleaded guilty to assaulting C. Ulrich at the "Hut" roadhouse. Bennie Newman, considered by the officers the ring leader in the assault, asked for a jury trial, which will take place Wednesday.

Testimony was to the effect that Newman, Black and Nichols were looking for trouble when they went to the tavern and started the fight with Ulrich when he left the place. Newman is under indictment for forcing his wife into an immoral life. He has figured prominently in joy ride scandals.

CHRISTIAN CONFERENCE CHIEF IS IN PORTLAND

Dr. Henry Collin Minton of Pittsburgh is in Portland. He is president of the National Reform association, which has in charge the preparation for the second worldwide Christian citizenship conference in Portland next summer. Tomorrow morning he will speak at the First Presbyterian church of the purposes and scope of the great meeting, explaining how delegates are secured from many nations and how leaders of world wide importance will be analyzed. Dr. Minton has a guest at the Hotel Portland, and while in Portland will arrange many details incident to the meeting next summer. 148 will also meet with the Commercial club committee, of which G. F. Johnson is chairman.

OLD STEEL BRIDGE CLOSED FOR LAST TIME AT MIDNIGHT

After 24 Years' Service O.-W. R. & N. Span Gives Way to New Viaduct; Little Ceremony at Its Passing.

After 24 years continuous service, the old O.-W. R. & N. steel bridge spanning the Willamette at Portland was closed for the last time, shortly after midnight this morning, and the new \$1,715,000 structure located 700 feet further upstream was opened to the public in its stead.

Scant ceremony marked the official death of the old bridge and its replacement by the new one.

Samuel Hall, for 15 years, chief engineer of the steel bridge, swung the big draw open and cut off the steam. Mr. Hall, John Selvers, and Frank Smith wrote their names in the bridge "log" and appended the one word "Good-bye." They then made their way to shore in a row boat, and with the gate tenders and railway flagmen, hurried to their stations on the new structure.

Meanwhile gangs of workmen on either end of the bridge constructed barricading fences of boards.

The old bridge was opened for the last time at 11:50 p. m., when the steamers Bailey Gatzert and Cascade whistled for the draw. After they had passed through Hall closed the draw, then promptly reopened it. The draw will remain open until the structure is removed, which the new span today.

Two score workmen are employed on the bridge putting on finishing touches, which probably will take ten more days to complete.

The bridge force at present includes three lift men, quartermen, eight gate tenders and four flagmen. Each employ works an eight-hour shift.

REMONSTRATE AGAINST HEAVY ASSESSMENT

Remonstrance has been filed by H. L. Corbett, E. F. Corbett, H. C. Corbett and 75 other property owners against the proposed reassessment of the cost of improving Hall street and Heights Terrace.

The remonstrators declare that the council has no power to levy any reassessment for a number of reasons, the principal one being that the reassessment is for \$17,000 more than the contract price of \$12,905.32. This was the price at which the famous Hall street retaining wall was let to Giesbach & Joplin during the Simon administration. The contractors filed claims for \$17,000 additional and the council later various delays commenced proceedings to reassess. H. L. Corbett, one of the protesting property owners, was chairman of the street committee of the city executive board during the regime of former Mayor Simon and H. M. Tomlinson, another remonstrator, is a deputy in the city attorney's office.

SENATOR ATTACKS JUDICIARY BODY

Pomerene Says Committee's Dilatory Tactics Are Not Explained.

(United Press Special Wire.)
Washington, Aug. 10.—Red-hot denunciation of alleged dilatory tactics of the senate judiciary committee was voiced in the senate today by Senator Pomerene, of Ohio, in an effort to secure action on his resolution directing the attorney general to criminally prosecute defendants in the oil and tobacco trusts.

Pomerene moved to take the matter out of the hands of the judiciary committee and consider it on the floor of the senate.

Chairman Clark explained that the committee's work had been so heavy that it had been impossible to get to the resolution, but Senator Pomerene asserted that the members of the committee intended to do nothing, and pointed out that the statute of limitations would prohibit criminal action. The matter went over.

54 HORSES ESCAPE BURNING IN BARN

Walter M. Pierce of La Grande Loses \$12,000 in Mysterious Fire.

La Grande, Ore., Aug. 10.—Fifty-four work horses and mules and half a dozen men were saved from cremation at an early hour this morning in a fire which did \$12,000 worth of damage and burned three horses belonging to Senator Walter M. Pierce, candidate for the United States senate last spring.

Cries of fire awakened workmen sleeping in the barn in time to get out of the hay mow, where the blaze was. Leaving their clothing behind, the men rushed to the stalls to cut loose 57 head of horses and mules. A big mule headed a stampede that followed and the horses contrary to their nature, rushed through the flames that singed them.

Four animals were killed and others were badly burned. Thirty sets of work harnesses burned together with oats, grain, tools, clothing belonging to workmen, making a total loss of \$12,000, with trifling insurance.

That a tramp had crawled into the barn and accidentally ignited the hay, escaped and warned the workmen as he fled, is the theory of the men who found no trace of the voice that had saved them from quick death.

FORMER SLAVE PASSES AWAY AT OREGON CITY

Oregon City, Ore., Aug. 10.—John Livingston, a popular negro, died Friday. Livingston was a slave in the early days and moved with his master, Judge Joseph Ringo, to Oregon City. In the last few years he has been farming and is well known in Oregon City. His funeral will be held Sunday.

HIGH OFFICIAL IS HIDING SUSPECTS, WHITMAN AVERS

District Attorney of New York Takes Steps to Force Surrender of "Gyp, the Blood," and "Lefty Louie."

(United Press Special Wire.)
New York, Aug. 10.—That a high police official who fears further exposure in the Rosenthal murder and graft scandal, is hiding Harry Horowitz, alias "Gyp the Blood," and "Lefty Louie" Rosenberg, was the flat charge made here today by District Attorney Whitman, who has been making developments within the next 48 hours. Horowitz and Rosenberg were two of the five occupants of the gray automobile on the night that Rosenthal was shot down in front of the Hotel Metropole, and Whitman today took steps to force the surrender of the fugitives. There will be no session of the grand jury today, but the district attorney plans to bring the police official whom he suspects of hiding the two fugitives, before that body Monday.

Burns detectives and representatives of Whitman's office who have been investigating the graft end of the case, assert that Police Lieutenant Becker, charged with murder in connection with Rosenthal's death, cleaned up \$50,000 in four months preceding the tragedy. They have already found, they say, seven banks in each of which Becker has \$4000 on deposit. The detectives today are making the rounds of suburban banks in search of other deposits. Despite Becker's denial that he is about ready to talk because he knows nothing of the Rosenthal murder, it is believed at the district attorney's office that a confession will be forthcoming from him before the end of the week. Becker is breaking down under the terrific strain; his nights are restless, and his appetite is gone.

Arrangements were completed today for a mass meeting to be held early next week in Cooper Union, at which action to abolish alleged police grafting will be demanded. It is also expected that resolutions denouncing Mayor William J. Gaynor, Police Commissioner Rhinelander Waldo and others, will be adopted.

CIGARETTE BUTTS ARE CAUSE OF \$600 BLAZE

Fire which broke out at 3 o'clock this morning, caused, it is believed, by the careless throwing of cigarettes about a room, did about \$600 damage to the Mercedes apartments at 163 Stout street and caused the hasty descent of a number of recently clad tenants to the streets, after the police had rushed through the halls and awakened the sleepers.

The three rooms most badly damaged were on the top floor of the building. All were occupied by chauffeurs, who have been repeatedly warned against throwing matches and cigarette stubs about.

Considerable damage was done to other rooms by water. The landlady, Mrs. Nellie M. Rogers, said that the loss will be covered by insurance.
