

WITH NO QUORUM SENATE DISCUSSES GOOD ROADS PLAN

Bill Grants American Register to Foreign Ships Wrecked on American Waters and Rebuilt by Americans.

Washington, Aug. 10.—The absence of a voting quorum kept the senate from transacting any business today except the passage of a bill and a resolution before the point of no quorum was made.

The question of a quorum was raised in connection with a vote of 22 to 12 on a request by Senator Pusey to make a special order for the consideration of his vocational educational bill.

Unable to do anything but talk, the senate then proceeded to a discussion of the good roads feature of the post-office appropriation bill and later took up the rural route provision of that measure. The good roads provision will be voted on Monday.

A bill granting American register to all foreign ships wrecked on American waters, purchased by American citizens and rebuilt in American shipyards, provided the repairs constitute three-fourths the value of the vessel, was passed.

Senator Smith of Arizona obtained for use in his state \$20,000 of the \$100,000 appropriation for the relief of American refugees from Mexico.

Senator Borah introduced a bill for a commission to investigate whether any improper charges have been assessed against homesteaders in the irrigation projects in the west.

Senator Pomeroy attempted to have the senate judiciary committee discharged from further consideration of his resolution directing criminal prosecution to be instituted against officers of the Standard Oil and the American Tobacco company. The matter went over until Monday.

Senators Brandegee, Bristow and Simmons were appointed conferees on the part of the Panama canal bill after the house requested a conference.

The senate agreed to the house amendments to the Alexander wireless bill. The measure provides that only experienced operators licensed by the department of commerce and labor shall be allowed to handle wireless instruments doing an interstate business.

The house transacted a mass of routine business today, evidencing the approaching end of the session. The house passed the Alexander bill requiring all ocean-going vessels to be equipped with sufficient lifeboats to accommodate every person aboard, including the crew. It applies to vessels on the Great Lakes also; also the board of supervising inspectors is to regulate the number of lifeboats on lake vessels.

The house Democrats called a battle-ship session for next Wednesday, and at the time a compromise nomination for one new battleship, of the super-Dreadnaught type will be accepted.

President Taft sent a special message to the house urging the passage of the bill appropriating \$250,000 for medical services for the Indians. The president cited the large death rate and the great amount of sickness among the Indians to support the bill.

FOLLOWERS OF ONE T. R. TO MEET MONDAY NIGHT

Tomorrow night the followers of Roosevelt will gather to ratify the nomination at the east side club, it is said. The meeting has been called by Dan Kellaher, president of the National Progressive club, and one of the things to be done is to issue a call for a mass meeting of the Progressives of Multnomah county to name a member of the new party's state committee.

Ben Riesland and Martin Watrous have accepted invitations to speak and other speakers will be announced later. Election of a third ticket in the county probably will be ruled out of order, but it will be distinctly in order when the mass convention meets, probably one week from tomorrow.

Dr. H. W. Coe, national committee man of the third party for Oregon, yesterday wired from Chicago urging that further steps by the third party as to a local ticket be taken with caution. He says the leaders should deliberate on the subject first. Dr. Coe is expected to return to Portland the latter part of next week.

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SEATTLE WILSON SAYS JERSEY MAN WILL RUN FIRST

Roosevelt to Be Second and Taft to Trail, According to His Prediction; Has Politics Well Mapped Out.

Rufus Wilson of Seattle, one of the prominent progressives of Washington, a leader of the La Follette movement and manager of the victorious campaign of Miles Folmer for the United States senate two years ago, is out for Woodrow Wilson for president and a Democratic ticket in the state of Washington.

"With the nomination of Wilson and the triumph of Bryan at Baltimore, the fight of the progressives for equal opportunity has passed into the Democratic party," is Wilson's statement. He stated yesterday that he was at the Carlton hotel, stopping in Portland for a day on his way to eastern Washington.

"It is not possible for the third party to win," he said. "Mr. Wilson will carry New York, New Jersey, Illinois, Indiana, Ohio and Wisconsin. And he will carry the state of Washington. I think he will win in my state by 15,000 to 20,000 plurality. Roosevelt will be second and Taft third."

"Bryan has done much to weaken the cause of Roosevelt. People are asking why he did not do as Bryan did at Baltimore, stand aside and permit the nomination of a progressive like Harry or Cummins. I am sorry for Mr. Taft. He means well. I will not venture to predict as to the states he may carry. I said while talking to some friends in Vermont, but this was instantly questioned by another of the party."

Washington Politics Mixed.
"Politics in Washington are much mixed. There will be a four-cornered fight for president, for governor, and in each of the congressional districts, as well as for congressmen at large. Wilson will get the state, a Democrat will be elected governor and a Democrat will be elected to congress in the Seattle district."

Mr. Wilson declares the Roosevelt charges of theft of the Washington delegation at Chicago are unjustified. He says the action of Thomas Murphree, Roosevelt boss, in filling vacancies in the King county committee, whereby the Roosevelt men gained a majority in that body and ordered primaries, was indefensible.

The initiative, referendum and recall amendments to the state constitution will win, Mr. Wilson predicts, as there seems to be no opposition of consequence to them. He says the Democrats are nominating strong men over the state for the state senate, and these men will participate in the election of a United States senator to succeed Wesley L. Jones. Since Jones voted for Lorimer, says Wilson, his support has fallen away, and he is certain to fail of re-election. Anticipating this, his friends are advising Jones to take the appointment as federal judge to take the place of Hanford.

Another matter of interest reported by Mr. Wilson is that a fight will be made in the next legislature for the adoption of Statehood No. 1. He says he proposes to make a fight for it, and believes it will be enacted into law.

Either Good Governor.
On the governorship situation, Mr. Wilson predicts the nomination at the primaries by the Republicans of Governor Hey for another term. Hay is a "Taft progressive." The bull moose candidate will be W. H. Paulhamus, and the Democrats will name either E. C. Millon of Seattle or Ernest Lister of Tacoma. Mr. Wilson thinks Millon has a shade the best of it, and says either will make a good governor, and either will be a winner.

In the first congressional district (Seattle) Mr. Wilson believes Daniel Landon will defeat Congressman Humphrey for the Republican nomination, that ex-Mayor George W. Dilling will be put up by the third party and Charles G. Heifner by the Democrats, with almost certain success for Heifner.

See Other Nominations.
Mr. Wilson has just been through the second district, western and southern Washington, and believes Albert Johnson of Hoquiam will get the Republican nomination, that Congressman Stanton Warburton will take the bull moose end, and J. A. Munday of Vancouver will walk off with the Democratic honors.

In the third district, eastern Washington, Congressman La Follette is likely to win the Republican nomination. P. M. Goodwin the progressive and Rocco Drumheller the Democratic. For congressman at large Mr. Wilson picks J. E. Frost of Ellensburg and Harry Rosenhaupt of Spokane as the probable Republican nominees, J. A. Falconer of Everett and J. M. Bryan of Bremerton as the progressives and Robert McMurtrie of Everett and E. L. Farnsworth of Wilbur as the Democrats. The primaries will be held on September 10.

There will be no complications over the electoral ticket, Mr. Wilson says. The third party will have a straight ticket for Roosevelt and the issue will be squarely presented between the three leading candidates for president.

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PADDED TROUSERS CAUSE DROWNING

Boy in Swimming, Wearing Baseball Pants, Unable to Rise in Wet Clothing.

Unable to keep afloat because of the weight of a pair of baseball pants, which were doing duty as a bathing suit, little Julius Kuzma, 13-years-old, of 1071 Third street, was drowned yesterday afternoon near the Multnomah Lumber & Box company's plant in South Portland. Although members of the harbor police made every effort to revive the lad, their efforts were unavailing.

Along with several other lads, young Kuzma went in swimming yesterday afternoon and for a bathing suit he used a pair of padded baseball pants, which are supposed to be responsible for his drowning.

According to the stories of the other boys told to the harbor police, Kuzma kept venturing out into the river until the padded trousers became too heavy for him to keep afloat and he was dragged to the bottom before he could reach shallow water.

The boy was drowned at about 2:30, but it was nearly 3 o'clock before the harbor police received the telephone message notifying them of the accident. Clarence Gilland, engineer of the patrol boat Eldor, and Hugh Brady, city grapple, arrived on the scene in the patrol at 3 o'clock and within 15 minutes Brady had the body out of the water. Efforts of the pair to revive the boy brought warmth to the body, but in spite of all their efforts they were unable to save young Kuzma's life. The harbor police say in this connection that in many similar cases it might be possible to save life if they were notified sooner instead of all the bystanders depleting their time to ineffectual efforts to bring the drowned person ashore. By that it is not meant that no efforts should be made in that direction, but where a telephone is handy it should be used immediately to get the grapple, they say.

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ALL WANT TO BE "PROGRESSIVES"

Many Voters at Registry Counter-Would Change Party Affiliations.

Voter—I want to change my registration.
Register Clerk Peebler—Republican, Democrat, Socialist, Prohibition or Independent?
Voter—Well, I want to register "Progressive" this time.
Clerk—Can't register that now, as there is no party title.
Voter—Can't register "Progressive" yet? Well, that's what I'm going to vote anyway.

Clerk—You can vote that in the general election by registering under either old party, or as an "Independent," but there is no "Progressive" party title on the registration books this year.

Voter—Put me down as an Independent, then, for I am going to vote for the most progressive candidate for president this time.

Conversation of this kind is heard daily at the registration office. While there are a scattering few who have not and there are many who are changing their address or party affiliation. The general tendency is to register in order to be able to vote for the most progressive candidate. Since August 1, there have been 34 new registrations.

As explained by Clerk Peebler, a voter can register under either party and vote in the general election for any candidate, but the voter must vote in the primary the ticket under which he is registered. A person registered as "Independent" cannot vote in the primary election. He can vote for any candidate in the general election. The books are open on the fourth floor of the courthouse during regular office hours. All voters who have changed their address since the primaries must reregister.

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
