SEATTLE TEAM TO STRENGTHEN SOON

Dugdale Will Likely Get Nill From Tigers to Bolster Up Giants.

The Seattle team is likely to plug up the gap at second base which has been apparent all season, for George Nill is expected to be in the Dugdale lineup before next week's series opens. Mike Lynch is well supplied with infielders with Goodman, Jansen and McMillin, so Watkins is willing to accept a fair price for Nill, who is an experienced fielder and not a poor batter. Nill has been out of the game for a few days with an injured finger and when this is written negotiations had about been closed for him to come to Seattle. Fred Chick, who is really a third baseman, has been playing at second for a month and the youngster has been guilty of several bonhead plays. Thirty California horses are due to arrive Thursday afternoon and next Monday afternoon several of the fast Canadian entries will come in. By the middle of next week it is expected that over 75 per cent of the stoppers and gallopers will be at the stables.

George Welch, advance agent for a number of the Canadian stables, arrived yesterday and immediately went to the track, where he selected stalls. Welch also looked at the track and announced that it was in better condition than any track he had been on this season.

ROSS IS WINNER IN TILLAMOOK SWIM

Portland Waterdogs Cross the Bar in Rapid Fashion and Spurt at End.

Norman Ross of the Portland Amateur Swimming club won the race across the Tillamook bar Sunday. Ross covered the distance, a little over one half mile, in 12 minutes and 45 seconds. This is the first time that a race has been held across the bar and hundreds of people watched the event. Lewis Thomas was second and John McMurray third. Thomas' time was 12:48 and McMurray's 12:55. Preble, the fourth starter, was taken out after swimming 200 yards.

The start was made from a boat five yards from the shore line. Lewis Thomas took the lead and held it for nearly three fourths of the distance, when Ross headed him. McMurray was tied with the winners when they were 150 yards from the finish
