

THAD SUMNER GOES TO FRONT IN RACE

Takes Last Three Heats in \$3000 Purse; Padishah Finishes Third.

Pete got it while he was throwing a 200-pounder named Carter yesterday afternoon in 10 minutes, his optic coming in contact with the heavyweights' foot. Last night he threw Coffey of Iowa, 195 pounds, in 10 minutes and Kid Exposito in six minutes after toying with him.

Tonight Buzukos will wrestle Carlson, the Columbus club wrestler, who turned professional last Sunday and defeated Walter Arndt at Crystal Lake, and an unknown Italian. Carlson's friends do not think that Pete can throw him in 15 minutes.

No Gambling at Los Angeles.

JOHNSON, GREATEST BOXER OF TIME, WOULD RETIRE ONLY NEGRO CHAMP

JACK HAS FIGHTING STYLE ALL HIS OWN—NO EQUAL

San Francisco, Aug. 13.—Jack Johnson says he has retired and it remains to be seen whether he means it. Just at present his resolve is of an adamant character. He swears that the world will never hear him say, as John L. Sullivan said, "I tried once too often," and that never hereafter will the lure of gold bring him back to the ring as it brought Jeffries back, when he was far past his athletic prime.

The writer believes that Johnson is out of the game to stay. The heart knows its own bitterness and no one knows better than Johnson what rough sledding it was with Fireman James Flynn at Las Vegas.

Two years ago Johnson would have literally spanked Flynn for his bad ring manners. As it was, the best Johnson could do was hold on and holler for help. Two years of acquaintance with the Paris cafes, and the pleasure haunts of London had told in Johnson's case just as similar dalliance had done in the case of Peter Jackson.

It's Time to Quit.
When the state police were clambering into the ring in New Mexico and Referee Smith was mopping his perspiring brow, a little bird whispered in Jack Johnson's ear, "The time is ripe for retiring."

And who can blame him? He has acquired a competence through the use of his gloves and now that he feels he is not as spry, or as sure fisted as he used to be, he is showing good judgment in sidestepping possible disaster. Because other champions made mistakes in no reason why Johnson should. In getting out at this time Johnson is catering to an ambition he has long felt, even though he may not have given expression to it. He would dearly like to be known as the only negro to have held the world's championship and then retired undefeated.

Sidestepped Colored Boxers.

In support of this view it is only necessary to recall Johnson's attitude toward other colored fighters since he became champion. It is claimed that he deliberately backed out of a match with Sam Langford, a made man, who had been the world's champion and then retired. He has been a veritable will of the wisp to Joe Jeannette, who has been after him for a long time. He has often talked of going to Australia to box Langford and McVea, but judging by his actions he was never for an instant sincere in this. If the last has really been seen of Johnson as a pugilist, he will be remembered as a fighter who was seldom if ever fully extended. Some say that his fight with Tommy Burns in Australia was his hardest. This may be so. He certainly never had any hard fights in the ordinary acceptance of the term, in this country. His go with Jeffries, from which so much was expected, was so extremely one-sided that it lives in

WOMAN JUSTICE CALLS FOR BRAINS

Kells Constable to Bring Her "Highbrows" for Jurors, Not "Bums."

Chicago, Ill., Aug. 13.—Angered because a constable submitted for jurors three men he had found loafing in a livery stable and three from a pool-room, "Judge" Catherine Waugh McCulloch of Evanston, the only woman justice of the peace in the country, yelled: "I want highbrow jurors, not bums."

Turning to the constable, she said: "Get Professors James A. James, U. S. Grant, Walter Dill Scott and John A. Scott of Northwestern university, and men of that caliber, and bring them here at once."

Constable Jones returned with the explanation that all "the noodle experts" were out of town, and that the court would have to be satisfied with red-necks.

The case on trial was that of an ex-pressman who wanted \$9 for moving some household goods.

BAND OF WANDERING SHEEP NOT CLAIMED

Goldendale, Wash., Aug. 13.—Three hundred and twenty-six head of sheep, found by James Gleason, a Klickitat stockman, in the isolated wilds of Butte canyon in the Simcoe mountains, have been turned in with the flock of Uri Trumbo. Mr. Gleason kept the sheep for some time in his pasture, thinking the owner would inquire for them, but so far no one has appeared. The sheep are 2-year-old wethers and it is thought they became separated from one of the bands brought from the Yakima Indian reservation and the Columbia forest reserve, while trailing through the Simcoes. Small bunches of lost sheep are often picked up in the mountains but it is seldom that a large bunch is isolated from the main band very long.

SUFFRAGETTES TO KEEP ON FIGHTING

Suggestion That There Be a Truce From Militancy Not Favorably Received.

London, Aug. 13.—The fighting section of the suffragettes has emphatically repudiated the suggestion made by government leaders in parliament that there be a truce from militancy.

"There is only one thing that will induce us to call a truce," said Miss Annie Kenney, one of the most prominent leaders of the Women's Social and Political union, who has taken the mantle temporarily laid aside by Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst pending her recovery from her recent hunger strike experience in Holloway prison, "and that is for the government to bring forward and pass into law a measure for women suffrage. Twice before we called a truce, when the Conciliation bill was before parliament and the government calmly went ahead and killed the bill by denying it further facilities after it had passed its second reading with large majorities."

"We do not propose to be caught again. The government must either amend its manhood suffrage bill, now before parliament so as to include equal rights for women, or introduce a separate measure."

"Further, even if we were to call a truce, the power to prevent militancy has entirely passed out of the hands of the union. We are now no more able than the government itself to restrain the individual women of whom there are many, who are determined to continue their militancy until votes for women is an actual accomplishment."

BLERIOT, RETIRED FOR 3 YEARS, WILL FLY AGAIN

Paris, Aug. 13.—Louis Bleriot, the hero of the first flight across the English channel in an aeroplane, after three years' retirement, is to fly again. He has forwarded his application for membership in the new Friendly Society of Aviators, or airmen's union, declaring he expects to resume his wings in the fall.

JAPANESE PRESS WRITES ON FRIENDLY RELATIONS

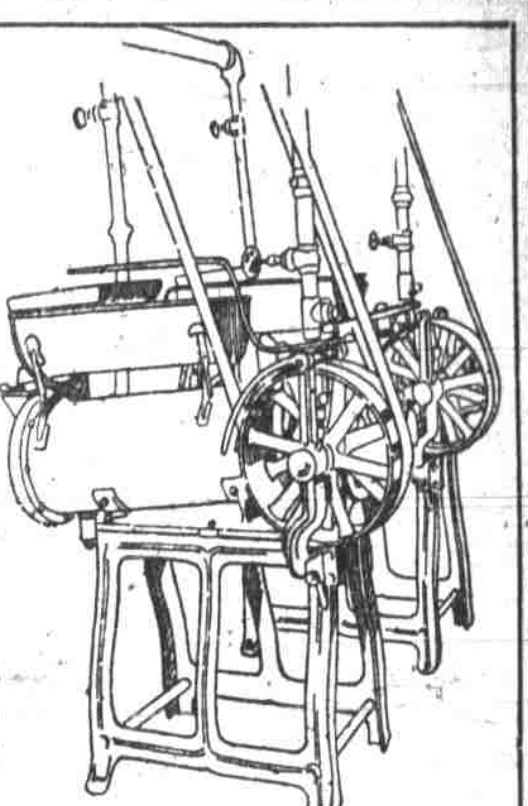

UNIFIED RELIGIOUS BODIES WISE MOVE

"On general principles I believe that the massing of bodies of Christians in one whole is a wise move," said Bishop R. J. Cooke, the new resident bishop of the Methodist church in discussing the proposed consolidation of the Taylor Street (First) M. E. church and the Grace M. E. church. "By this means it is possible to concentrate the energies of a unified body and the method of utilization of energy is materially strengthened."

"The matter of the union of the churches has been referred to me as resident bishop and will require great consideration. I believe at present, however, that an announcement of my views in this instance would be premature and inadvisable. Nothing definite has been accomplished and I do not feel that I should speak out my views before the official boards of the two religious bodies have taken definite action."

"The change has long been desired and I think is popular. With careful management the consolidation of the two churches if consummated should be brought to a very happy conclusion."

SEEKS TO FREE MATE WHO STOLE FOR HER

Los Angeles, Aug. 13.—Lloyd Knapp, accused of passing two worthless checks for small sums, is a prisoner in the county jail today, while his wife, Mrs. Knapp, since his imprisonment, to \$55,000, is making frantic efforts to secure his release.
