Monday's Delayed News Briefly Told

Resume of World Happenings Received From 8 o'Clock Yesterday Afternoon Until 8 o'Clock This Morning.

Congressional.

In the senate Monday Senator La Follette, of Idaho, charged officials of the postoffice department with rifling his mail in an attempt to delve into an investigation he was making into the postal service.

Representative Catlin of Missouri, Republican, was unseated Monday night as a member of the house of representatives. His Democratic opponent, who contested the election, Patrick F. Gill, was seated amid wild enthusiasm from the Democratic side.

A fourth Democratic house caucus has been called for Wednesday to decide the battleship question. Fully 100 Democratic members have subscribed to a proffered senate compromise to accept provision for one battleship instead of two, which the senate amendment to the naval appropriation bill called for. Congressman Underwood, majority leader of the house, predicts an adjournment of congress this week, unless President Taft vetoes the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill. Mr. Taft has said he would veto the measure because of amendments to abolish the commerce court and limit the tenure of office of civil service employees to seven years.

Underwood will attempt to pass the wool revision bill over the president's veto. Failing in this, he will not attempt to press any more tariff legislation.

Failure of the sugar tariff bill and the excise tax measure is feared by Democratic leaders of the house. Both bills are in conference. The house conferees insist upon a sugar tariff reduction much below the basis the senate will accept. There appears little hope of the deadlock being broken.

Without a word of debate, the senate on Monday adopted the Bourne-Bristow parcels post plan as a substitute for the house parcels post provision in the post-office appropriation bill. The Bourne-Bristow plan would divide the country into eight zones. Within a 50 mile radius, the rate would be fixed at 5 cents for the first pound and 3 cents for each additional pound of fourth class matter. A graduated rate covers the other districts.

The judiciary committee of the senate has refused to make a report on the Pomerene resolution directing the attorney general to bring criminal proceedings against officers of the Standard Oil and American Tobacco companies.

Representative Byrnes has introduced a bill in the house appropriating \$50,000 for investigation into pellagra.

Political.

The warring elements in the camp of the California Democracy have been harmonized. All differences of the Clark and Wilson factions have been quashed and a new committee appointed to work out the program in the coming election.

It is stated that Colonel William V. Judson, United States army engineer, commissioner of the District of Columbia, will be appointed governor of the Panama canal zone as soon as President Taft signs the pending canal legislation. Judson has the endorsement of Colonel Goethals and many officials who have to do with canal affairs.

Senator A. J. Gronna of North Dakota, who was in Minneapolis Monday, said he was going home to support the Republican ticket from top to bottom, including the presidential electors. Senator Gronna said that at a conference of progressive Republicans in Washington

Saturday, in which Senator La Follette, of Idaho, and others took part, the form of a statement was agreed upon which gives reasons why La Follette followers should refuse to leave the Republican party and join the third party movement.

Eastern.

At Chicago Monday night four robbers boarded a Western avenue car, covered the passengers with revolvers and escaped after taking \$31 and a watch from the conductor. Several passengers, among whom were women, were forced to give up their jewelry. On the same evening A. C. Thumman, owner of a chain of cigar stores, was choked into unconsciousness and robbed of \$1500 and jewelry valued at \$500 by three men on the North Side.

George M. Nicholas, a wealthy hermit farmer, was found dead near Port Republic, Va., Monday. Worth \$250,000, which he is said to have scattered in 15 banks in Virginia and Maryland, the old man lived in squalor in a 15 room mansion, bare of furniture, and slept on a bare floor. He was unmarried and left no will.

The Equitable Life Assurance society has sold to a syndicate headed by General T. Coleman Dupont of Wilmington, Del., the block known as 120 Broadway, the site of the society's old home in New York, which was destroyed by fire last winter. The purchaser will erect a 35 story office building on the site. The youngest mother recorded in medical history is an 11 year old girl from near Davenport, Iowa, who gave birth Monday to a healthy eight and one half pound child.

Dr. Thomas B. McClintock of the public health service, who has been fighting Rocky mountain spotted fever in the Hitter Reef valley all summer, been infected with the disease and is being rushed to Washington for treatment. He contracted the disease while doing laboratory work. Rocky mountain spotted fever exists only in America, and has puzzled scientists.

Pacific Coast.

Informed wool dealers declare that the Oregon 1912 clip has been sold closer than ever before in the history of the industry for the same period. The yield for the season has been put at 18,700,000 pounds, which brought to the state \$2,000,000.

In an opinion rendered at the request of Dr. F. Williams of Westfall, the attorney general's office holds that a physician cannot decline to respond to a subpoena in a criminal case because he has not been tendered the expert witness fee, but he must attend and cannot exact a larger fee than that paid other witnesses.

Henry Weinberger, itinerant shoe repairer, drifted into White Salmon a year ago, obtained credit, opened up an exclusive shoe store, did business until a couple of weeks ago, when he left and his whereabouts are still unknown. In the meantime several creditors have attached the goods.

After having put her 11-year-old daughter, Viola, to bed Saturday night and then reading for a while, Mrs. Fred J. Damon of Moscow, Idaho, wife of a former O-W. R. & N. brakeman now at Portland, disappeared out the back door and has not been seen since. It is said the woman had been dependent for some time over domestic troubles.

"Country Life" day at the state fair is one of the features that is being planned by the county life commission of Oregon, and it is hoped to start a state wide movement toward bringing about in all rural communities the same conditions that exist at East Gaston. The East Gaston plan includes a community system of raising crops and livestock and a community system of advertising and sale.

The desert land board has received a request from the Waterusers' association of the Central Oregon Irrigation company, that the system of rotating water, as adopted by the company, be discontinued. This came as a surprise to the board, inasmuch as it was the Waterusers' association that originally made the request that the rotation system be adopted.

Advices from the railroads indicate 200 in the delegation for the Lakeview meeting on August 20 of the Central Oregon Development league. Preparations are made for handling a large crowd.

Abraham W. Engle, who has been clerk of Ex-District Judge Hanford's court since the enforced retirement of Robert M. Hopkins last fall, resigned Monday, in order to permit District Judge Cushman to organize the court. Near Medford, Or. Monday, a spark from a passing county road engine set fire to some stubble in the old Gordon place on the Jacksonville road and resulted in the burning of a valuable barn, full of hay, and 20 acres of 8-year-old apple and pear trees.

William Houser, supervisor of Kern county, California, and one of the most wealthy mining men in the Randburg district, was accidentally killed Sunday by his 10-year-old son. The boy was taking some shells from an old rifle when one of them was accidentally discharged.

Opium valued at \$22,000 and contained in 300 five tael tins, neatly packed in two new steamer trunks, was seized at Los Angeles Monday by Inspector F. C. Boden of the state pharmacy board. At the same time D. D. Williams of Benson, Ariz., a railroad conductor, was arrested on the charge of having opium in his possession.

Three hundred members of the bridge and structural iron workers of San Francisco struck Monday for higher wages and all the structural iron and steel work in the city came to a stop. The men demand an increase of \$1 over their present wage schedule of \$5. Carried out to sea by a tide rip, John D. Cavanaugh, aged 27, telegrapher, was drowned at Benham, Cal., Monday. Five other members of a family party with whom Cavanaugh was enjoying a trip in the ocean were rescued from a watery grave by Arnold Gutierrez, aged 16.

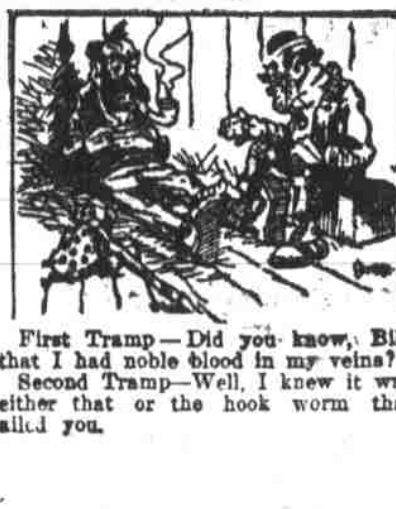

GERMAN WORKERS NOT
GIVEN YEARLY REST

Berlin, Aug. 13.—That less than 1 per cent of Germany's vast army of workmen engaged in the various industries are given an annual vacation is the statement made by Dr. Heyde of the International Arbitration Union for the Protection of Workmen. Dr. Heyde says that comparatively few German employers seem to think that the working men are entitled to a vacation with pay. A few of the mines are granting a five days' vacation to married men, and then only after they have been employed 10 years.

In the hotel industry with nearly 1,000,000 men, only 11,455 were given vacations.

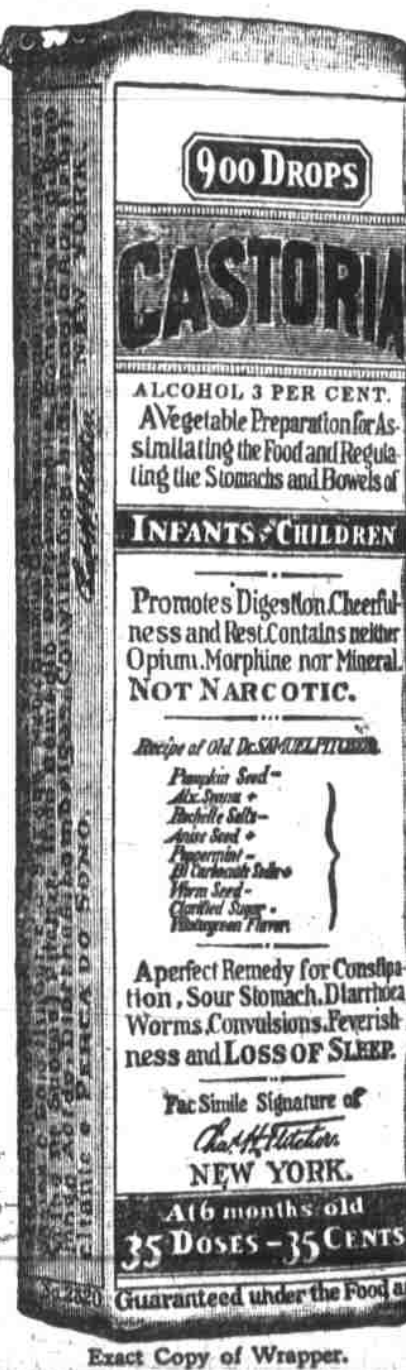
