

DEATH PENALTY IS DECLARED CRIME

SAYS HER MONKEY IS ABLE TO TALK

"Relic of Barbarism and Unworthy of 20th Century," Says Pastor.

(United Press Special Wire.) Los Angeles, Cal., Aug. 13.—Dr. Re-nold Blight, pastor of the Los Angeles Fellowship, and head of an organiza-tion opposed to capital punishment, de-clared today the execution of seven murderers at Sing Sing, prison, New York, to be a crime against science and civilization.

"It was a relic of barbarism and unworthy of the twentieth century," Dr. Blight said. "It merely was an admission that society does not know what to do with its criminals and therefore kills them. It was vindictive and inhuman. We must find a better way."

Mr. Josiah Evans Cowles, president of the State Federation of Women's clubs, deplored conditions permitting the wholesale execution, and advised a concerted demand for investigation to find an effective substitute for the death penalty.

Washington, Aug. 13.—Senators and congressmen are chafing about express-ing their views on capital punish-ment. Robert La Follette, wife of the Wisconsin senator, said today:

"The executions in New York empha-size this outrage against society. Capital punishment tends to increase rather than obviate crime. I do not think the state ought to take human life, as executions have an evil effect upon the public mind. Capital punishment ought not to exist in America or any other civilized country."

WRIGHT TELLS WHY MEETING NOT CALLED

Replying to statements of P. T. Fisher, a member of the Republican executive committee, who charged that he refused to call a meeting of the full committee to consider the local political situation as it has now shaped itself, Chairman R. C. Wright of the committee today said he does not feel like assuming responsibility for calling such a meeting because of the expense unless the idea is approved by the executive committee of 13.

"I am not aware that any considerable number of the committee is dis-satisfied with the action of the execu-tive committee," said Mr. Wright today. "Mr. Fisher himself is the only member I know that is out for Roosevelt. He told me he was for the bull moose, and said he wanted a meeting of the full committee so a resolution could be introduced to condemn the Republican delegates at Chicago who voted for Root for chairman of the national conven-tion."

"I told him I did not believe the com-mittee would favor any such resolution. I did not tell him he should resign. I am dissatisfied, but I do not think he does not resign since he is in sym-pathy with the bull moose movement and has left the Republican party. He seemed to think he ought to stay on the committee because he was elected by the Republicans of his precinct."

"As to calling a meeting of the full committee of 130 members there is con-siderable expense attached to it. I do not feel that the members of the com-mittee ought to be called on to chip in and pay the expense unless there is an urgent need for a meeting. I under-stand the executive committee has full power to act for the full committee."

"The executive committee was not ap-pointed by me. The full committee voted not to let the selection to the chairman, and each ward in the city and outside districts elected its own mem-bers."

"I told Mr. Fisher I would put his request for a meeting before the execu-tive committee and abide by its action. I admit that in the pressure of other business last Tuesday I forgot it. The committee will meet again tomorrow and the matter will then be placed be-fore it."

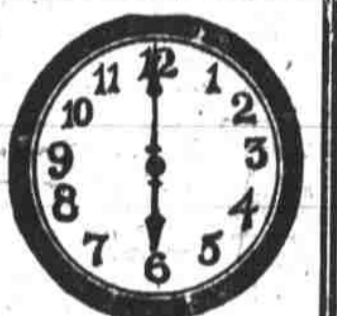
