Mrs. Lee's Answers to Household Queries

DEAR MRS. LEE—Will you please inform one of your readers what are the ingredients used in making it sherbet; also the method of preparing? MRS. E. A sherbet is really a water ice, with a small quantity of dissolved gelatin or the whites of eggs well beaten.

There are many different flavors, but the process is about the same in each case. Raspberry and currant sherbet is delicious. You take one quart of raspberries, half a pint of currant juice, two cups of sugar, and one quart of water.

plain of an inability to swallow, especially acid food giving excruciating pain. The jaw is moved with difficulty. The swelling may be on one or both sides. Usually it appears on one side first and then a few days later on the other. The mouth is dry as the saliva usually is lessened.

Inquiry usually reveals that the child has been exposed to the mumps one to three weeks previously. The disease usually is acquired through direct contact and probably from the secretions of the salivary and parotid glands. It is contagious from the beginning of the symptoms and for about three weeks after the swelling first appears.
