

BECKER WILL TRY TO FASTEN GUILT ON HARRY VALLON

Lieutenant Will Set Forth That Gray Motorcar Was to Have Been Used Only to Kidnap Rosenthal.

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, Aug. 17.—Coronel and fighting for his life as a representative of the system which is alleged to control the underworld of New York, Police Lieutenant Becker will try to fasten the crime of murder on one of the state's witnesses when the police official is brought to trial for the killing of Herman Rosenthal.

Will Show Kidnaping Plot.

Lieutenant Becker will set forth that the so-called gray motorcar was in front of the Hotel Metropole on the night of Rosenthal's murder, but it was there, not with intent to kill, but to kidnap Rosenthal. Vallon was one of the gang of kidnapers. But when Rosenthal appeared according to the Becker defense, an old grudge came to the mind of Vallon, who admits he was very drunk, and he shot the gambler dead. The four gunmen, two in custody and the two still fugitive, had nothing to do with the shooting, according to the defense, beyond being witnesses to it.

Whitman Is Disturbed.

These stories of Becker's defense, coupled with persistent reports that Sam Schepps, now in Buffalo, will not tell what he knows in aid of the prosecution have disturbed District Attorney Whitman. He believes the stories of Rose, Vallon and Webber of the murder plot, but he is taking no chances that some representative of the system shall set to Schepps and frame up a story for him to tell.

Attorney, Hired by Brother of Schepps, Meets the Prisoner

Buffalo, N. Y., Aug. 17.—Samuel Schepps of New York, who is well known in church-circles of Hot Springs, Ark., is spending the week and here the guest of Mr. Rubin, also of New York, who is a member of Mr. Whitman's staff of district attorneys. He declared that he was twice divorced from Mrs. Alice M. Boland Warren, of Key West. It was the act of this woman, claiming to be the legal wife of the planter, which led to his arrest at the breakfast table in a Central Park West apartment where he was today taken from his bride by Sheriff Blawie, of Fairfield.

Uncharted Rock Struck by Steamship Mariposa

Seattle, Wash., Aug. 17.—Instructions issued today by the Alaska Steamship company order all vessels of that fleet to avoid a new shoal discovered off Point Baker, Sumner straits, Alaska. This is the result of the experience of the steamship Mariposa, which has just returned after striking what was first thought to be submerged wreckage. Captain Thomas Moore is now convinced it was uncharted rocks and officers of the survey service have asked him for detailed information. They will probably order a resurvey of Sumner straits. The point in question has been on the regular course for years and navigators never before realized the danger.

Federal Aid is Given Wizard Luther Burbank

Carload Rate on Honey Too High, Says Bee Man

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Or., Aug. 17.—W. H. Pennington of Ontario has made informal complaint to the state railroad commission that the freight rate on honey in carload lots from Ontario to Portland is too high. He says the rate is 75 cents per hundred and that it ought not to be more than 25 cents. He alleges the rates from California, a longer distance, are cheaper. He says when he takes the matter up with the Oregon State Line officials they lay the blame on the O. W. R. & N. and when he writes to the latter company it lays the blame on the O. S. L.

British Public See New German War Scare

London, Aug. 17.—News which leaked out tonight that the war office has confidentially circulated all retired officers of the royal engineers corps to notify their superiors promptly of changes in address, if even for the holidays, caused a sensation in military circles. The war office says the circular has no special significance, but of course, the public sees prospective trouble with Germany.

Explorer's Death is Uncertain

Bombay, Aug. 17.—Confirmation is yet lacking of the report today that W. Hunter Workman, the explorer, from Worcester, Mass., has been killed in the Himalayas. It is only known that his party was caught by an avalanche and that lives were lost. Whether Workman was one of them is uncertain.

Rebels Retreat from Managua; Loss Over 400

Nicaraguan Revolutionists Mobilize at Masaya—Presence of U. S. Marines in Capital is Reassuring.

(By The International News Service.) Managua, Nicaragua, Aug. 17.—All the rebels under command of General Zedillo and Mena have retreated to Masaya, capital of a province of the same name and located about 30 miles south of Managua. Rebel losses in the attack on this city are estimated at between 400 and 500 men.

Three companies of American marines arrived on Thursday morning from Panama, and their presence turned the fears of the local foreign colony into rejoicing and feelings of safety.

Austrian Royalty Torn by Dissension

(United Press Leased Wire.) Vienna, Aug. 17.—The Austria's aristocracy is on strike against the attempt of Archduke Franz Ferdinand Kaiser, Franz Joseph's heir, to place his morganatic wife upon an equality with royalty. It is current gossip in court circles tonight.
