

STR. HERCULES TO MAKE ONE MORE VOYAGE TO COAST

Vessel to Be Turned Over to Owners When Charter of Frank Waterhouse & Co. Expires; Monkeys Escape.

That the Norwegian steamship Hercules, operating under charter to Frank Waterhouse & Co., between Portland and the Orient, will make one more trip to this coast before being turned back to her owners, was announced this morning.

Manager Pritchard of the local branch of Frank Waterhouse & Co., said this morning that the steamer would take cargo to Japan ports this voyage and she will load there for another voyage back to this coast. What she will do then is not known, but she will probably be chartered for lumber or wheat from that port.

Officers of the Hercules said this morning that the voyage from the Orient was very uneventful, but dense fog was encountered from 190 west to within an hour of Port Townsend, when it cleared. Six monkeys which broke out of two boxes in which they were held captive, afforded some excitement one Sunday in mid-Pacific, and it took the Chinese crew several hours to get them out of the rigging.

The Hercules brought 1000 tons of oriental cargo consisting principally of 500 tons of sulphur, 800 bales of hemp, 600 bales of gunnies, 700 bales of kapok, 70 bags of sugar, 50 bags of beans and some miscellaneous merchandise.

CAPTAIN DOLBEARE HURT

Newport Steamboat Man Falls While Boarding Launch Fish.

Newport, Ore., Aug. 21.—Captain Dolbeare of the launch Fish was severely injured while carrying a five gallon can of oil from the wharf to the boat. His foot slipped and he fell heavily forward across the rail. Injuries to the lower abdomen and chest are serious and it is not known whether there are internal injuries.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT

When she arrived at 2:15 yesterday afternoon from Angeles and San Francisco, the steamer Bear, Captain Noyander, had 230 passengers and 1400 tons of general freight.

Carrying passengers and freight, the steamer Breakwater, Captain Magenn, is scheduled to arrive this afternoon from Coos Bay.

The steamer Roanoke, Captain Purington, is scheduled to sail tonight with passengers and freight for San Francisco, San Pedro and San Diego.

The Norwegian steamer Solveig, Captain Boeth, which arrived from Portland to load for Australia, Monday night, loaded 600,000 feet of white pine at San Francisco and 500,000 feet of redwood at Eureka.

Laden with 800 tons of cement and general merchandise, the steamer Yellowstone, Captain Maro, arrived at Oak Street from San Francisco at 4 this morning. She also had passengers. Lumber will be loaded down the river for San Pedro.

Unsettled weather was encountered by the tug racket Amy when she started on her last trip down from Bandon, as she had to buck a heavy southeast gale all the way down with a strong sea running. She arrived here last night several hours late, with 14 passengers and general freight, but she will sail on time tonight.

Regular annual inspection of the Oregon City Transportation company's steamer Pomona will take place today.

Captain H. C. Nason, formerly master of the steam schooner Washington, is in Portland today on his way from British Columbia to his home in Oakland. He has been overlooking the loading of the British steamer Strathmore for A. F. Thane & Co.

Two vessels were taken yesterday to load lumber for Australia. The American bark, Hecla, 1425 tons net, Captain Nelson, was fixed by the American Trading company to load for Sydney or Newcastle at 2 1/2 and 6. She is now due at San Francisco with coal from Newcastle and Newcastle into Honolulu July 19 for provisions and sailed again on July 20. The British steamer St. Kilda, 3017 tons net, Captain Lewis, was last reported at Newcastle, Australia, was chartered by Davies & Ferguson to load at Newcastle and on the Columbia for Australia.

Captain Albert Schultz of the German ship Bone Rickmers, which will load wheat for the United Kingdom here, died August 2, while the vessel was bound from Bremen for New York. His body was preserved in ice by the crew and was sent back to Germany for interment.

\$5,000,000 INVOLVED IN THREE TIMBER DEALS

Approximately \$5,000,000 has been invested in the past few days by outside capitalists in Oregon timber. The largest deal consummated involves \$2,500,000, the price paid for a large body of fir in Tillamook county. Details of the transaction are kept secret, but it is known that the deal was a cash transaction and that the papers will be filed in a few days.

Another large transaction, involving more than \$1,000,000, was the whereby the Wheeler Timber company purchased from the Booth-Kelly Lumber company of Eugene a large body of timber in Lane county. The Wheeler Timber company has an office in Portland, but represents eastern capital to a great extent, the Wheeler interests being among the oldest in the history of timber operations in the United States.

The Blodgett company Limited, of which E. S. Brumby is Portland manager, has sold to the Crosscut Timber company a large tract of timber in Clatsop county, for a consideration, so it is reported, of \$1,500,000.

Timber has moved very poorly for several months, but it is now said to be more active than for several years, with many inquiries from investors.

WIFE SEEKS A SECOND DIVORCE FROM SPOUSE

Married twice and divorced once, Kate Cudaly entered the circuit court today with another complaint against John Cudaly for a second divorce. Cruelty is the charge upon which she asks the decree. They live at 501 Harrison street.

Cudaly recites that they were married the first time in 1896 at Grand Rapids Mich. A few years later, at the same place, she complained against him and got a divorce. In September, 1910, they remarried, coming to Oregon upon affairs. In her present complaint she says Cudaly earns \$150 a month, and refuses to give her sufficient funds upon which to live, thereby forcing her to keep a lodging house for support. On August 13, 1912, she alleges, he struck her, with the result neighbors had to interfere. The suit was filed by the legal firm of Joseph & Haney.

ALICE BROWN SOBS SELF OUT OF CELL?

David Napping Has Left San Francisco and Prosecution Probably Be Dropped.

(Special to The Journal.) San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 21.—The "Old Man's Darling," as handsome 23-year-old Alice Brown, Los Angeles divorcee, chose to call herself in an interview given in Portland, apparently has sobbed herself out of an embarrassing predicament. David Napping, aged 78 years, the wealthy farmer of Farmington, Ill., who charged her with having swindled him out of \$17,000 through promises of marriage, has left San Francisco and it is believed will drop the proceedings.

Napping visited Mrs. Brown in her cell yesterday and the day before. She wept copiously. After he left the jail day before yesterday Napping sent her a large bunch of American beauties. He said he didn't want to prosecute the girl, but that he wanted his money back. She asserts that he never had any intention of prosecuting; that he brought charges against her in the hope that she would be frightened into marrying him.

Mrs. Brown, who was arrested in Portland in company with George Montrose, against whom a charge of complicity rested, advised all young girls to stay away from old men. Any man over 50 years of age, she says, whether married or single, is dangerous for a good looking young girl to tamper with.

FORMER REPUBLICANS REGISTER INDEPENDENT

Registration of Democrats yesterday exceeded that of Republicans. There were eight of the former and seven of the latter. Four voters registered Independent, making a total registration for the day of 19. There were 15 changes of address. Reference to the old registration books showed that three of the four independents were formerly identified with the Republican party. The fourth independent was not registered. The books are still open on the fourth floor of the courthouse.

Richard Alshberger, 205 Jersey street, St. John's, was refused registration on the ground that he did not have his citizenship papers, and his name did not appear on the registration books for the primary election. He said he was registered, however, and voted. The county clerk is today investigating the case.

LOGGING ROAD TO TAP HUGE FORESTS OF FIR

Flagg & Standifer, railroad contractors of this city, have been awarded the contract to build a 25-mile logging railroad for the Silver Falls Logging company, from a connection with the Southern Pacific at Silverton into an immense body of Douglas fir timber in Marion and Clackamas counties.
