

## CORVALLIS PLANS INDUSTRIAL FAIR

Children's Exhibits Will Be Shown Next Week; Many Prizes Offered.

Corvallis, Or., Aug. 22.—An industrial school fair will be held in Corvallis Wednesday, August 28. Twelve hundred dollars has been subscribed, of which about \$500 will be given in prizes for exhibits of vegetables, fruit, canned fruit, canned vegetables, bread, jellies, needlework, pigs, chickens and manual training. A prize is offered for the best labor saving device for use on the farm, and another prize is offered for the best big house. Exhibits of Benton county merchants, the floral department of the Oregon Agricultural college and the manual training department of the Corvallis high school will be made. The exhibits of the successful contestants will be taken to the state fair for the best big house. In view of the fact that Benton county will place an exhibit of farm products in the state fair pavilion in competition for the "Blue Ribbon" prize, the local fair committee has issued a call for exhibits of farm products, for which ribbon awards will be given. The fair committee plans to make the school fair an annual event, adding to it each year until it becomes a county fair in which the industrial or children's part will be a feature.

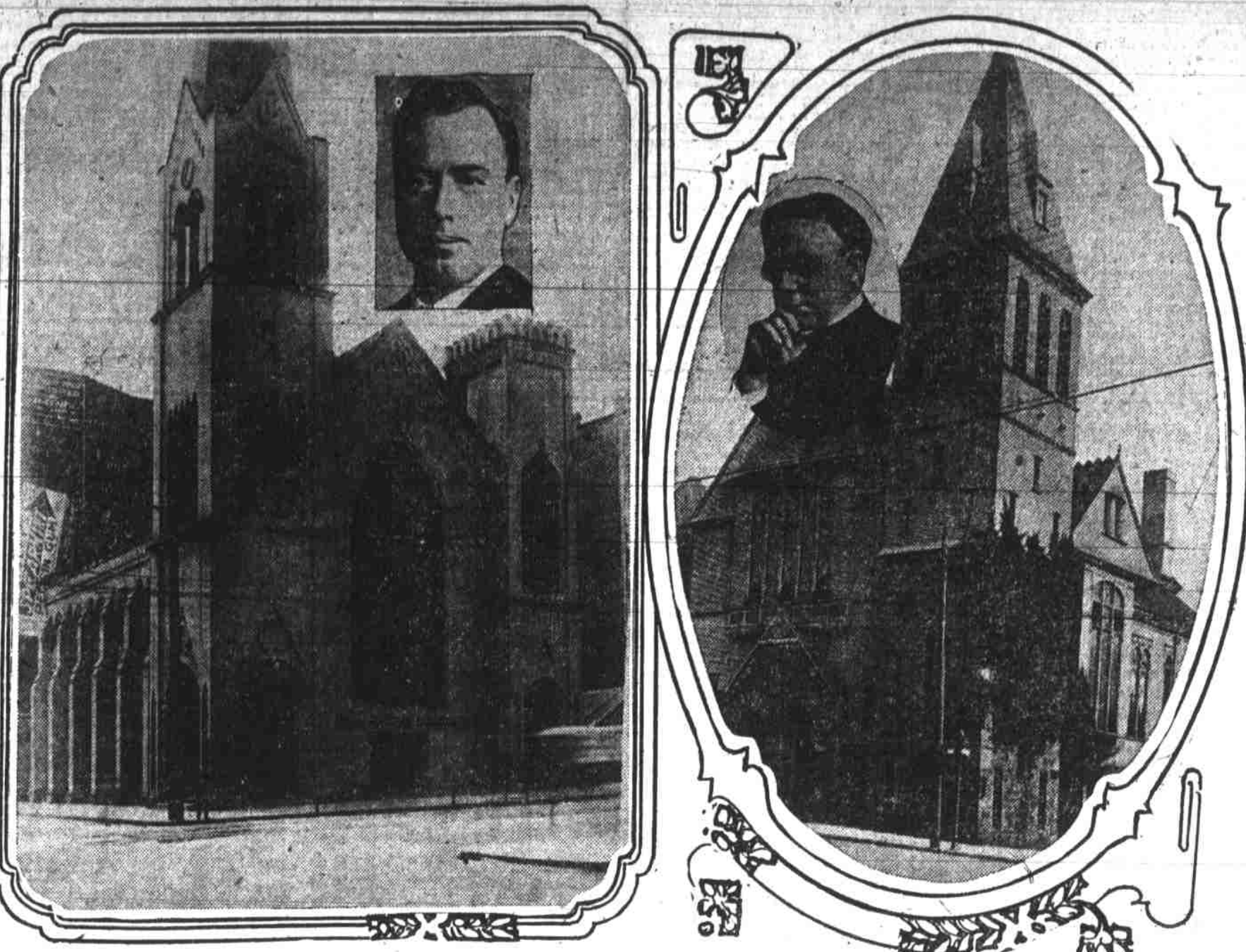
**Railway Gets Franchise.**

One feature that this area presents over the general run of western ranges is the possibility of growing an abundance of winter feed, either on land that can be taken under the homestead and other acts, or that is held in the national forest.
