

TARIFF PLANK IS "SAME OLD SHAM"

Bryan Comments Caustically Upon Roosevelt's Progress- ive Platform.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Lincoln, Neb., Aug. 22.—Commenting on the Progressive platform in the current issue of the Commoner, out today, William J. Bryan says:

"The tariff plank in the platform is the same old sham used for a generation to deceive the public. The tariff plank is a restatement of Roosevelt's position which leads directly to socialism."

"The new party clings to the idea that the trusts can be left in private hands and yet be controlled through a national bureau. History proves this theory incorrect."

JOURNAL'S W. WILSON CAMPAIGN FUND PLAN IS GIVEN INDORSEMENT

In these campaigns Bryan and his managers were opposed to receiving contributions from corporations or even to receiving it from individuals in such sums as might make the contributors feel that the presidential candidate was under special obligations to them. The maximum allowed as a contribution from one individual by Mr. Bryan was \$10,000.

"This campaign is a fight in which the masses are concerned. Contributions of corporations or of large sums are neither invited nor accepted. It is to be a fight in which our candidate will not be placed in any doubtful position by reason of the money that is contributed. His only obligation will be to the people as a whole."

Methods Are Condemned.
"If the Parker campaign, Mr. Belmont admits he contributed \$250,000, while Mr. Roosevelt consented to Mr. Harrison raising \$250,000 for his campaign and received in all the sum of nearly \$500,000."

"These methods are condemned by our platform, and if we are not to receive large voluntary contributions from the masses, the national committee will be left practically without funds, for we will not receive help from Perkins, Morgan and men of that type, who appear to be financial adjuncts of the Roosevelt campaign."

"It has been demonstrated by past experience that many hundreds of thousands of dollars are required to pay the legitimate expenses of a campaign. There are large printing bills, such as the printing of the campaign text book, speeches of Governor Wilson and other leaders of our party. These are printed in different languages. Then lithographs must be sent out, expenses of speakers paid, and headquarters established and equipped with an efficient force of employees."

"At the meeting of the national committee in Chicago we were informed by man in charge of previous campaigns that to state successfully they were compelled to guarantee the payment of \$250,000 for printing alone. The longer the receipts are delayed, the slower the progress will be."

"It requires no argument to show that money is needed to conduct large public affairs. Even the churches must have millions to carry on their work. The new settled policy of our party is to be under obligations to the people only, and we look to the people for our contributions."

Money Returns to State.
"Those supporting Wilson, regardless of political affiliation, ought to expect the aggregate contributions in any state to be not less than \$5000, while the states of large population should contribute in corresponding amount."

"Money sent back to the national committee returns to this state and to every state in the form of literature, speakers and other assistance, which is given as the campaign progresses. It is a national campaign and it does not in any way conflict with the operations of the various state committees. Some may wish to contribute to the national fight alone, others to the state. If they wish to help out both, the national contribution should be sent in now, and the remainder should be turned over to the state or local committees at the proper time."

"We expect to win. The outlook is most encouraging for success in all parts of the Union. But we must have contributions to supply the legitimate expenses of presenting our cause to the people, and this help must come from the people themselves."

Master Riley Peterson of Pendleton, 6 years of age, is one of the contributors to the Wilson fund whose money was received today. He is the son of Will M. Peterson, one of the five democratic electors, and chairman of the Democratic central committee of Emmet county. Master Riley was named for Colonel J. H. Riley, a leading lawyer and leader of the Oregon bar, and the lad shows his quality as a Wilson booster by sending \$1 for the campaign expenses.

New York, Aug. 22.—In front of a big desk at the Wilson-Marshall headquarters in the new Fifth Avenue building here, sits Miss Alberta Hill, the only woman officially connected with the organization committee of the Democratic campaign of which Senator Gore is chairman. It is Miss Hill's duty to place in a great map of the United States, which rests on her desk, multi-colored tacks, the various shades indicating the progress of the Wilson campaign throughout the country. 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THREE PORTLAND GIRLS OF 17 SAID TO BE FIRST WOMEN TO REACH TOP OF STEEP SOUTH ROCK

Newport, Or., Aug. 22.—Three 17-year-old Portland girls have the distinction of being the first girls to set foot on South Rock, at Yaquina Head, just north of here. The rock is one of the two immediately in front of Yaquina Head lighthouse and has been visited by fewer than a dozen men, and till last Sunday had never been scaled by women. It is separated from the cape by a chasm and the rock looks easily accessible, but inspection shows only one spot where it may be climbed and that begins with 50 feet of sheer cliff, where ropes are necessary.

Years ago a lightkeeper used to go on this rock to fish, but until four years ago no one else had climbed it. Two Newport boys, Elwyn Young and Will Burton, in search of cormorant and gull eggs, found the way up, and since have made several trips. On one of them Young was nearly killed when the rope broke, nearly precipitating him into the boiling surf and leaving him hanging in a precarious position until assistance arrived.

The rock is of interest on account of a remarkable natural phenomenon on the far side, which is invisible from the mainland. Near the base of the rock is a round hole about 10 feet in diameter, out of which every few minutes issues a column of water about 90 feet high. On a rough day the column has been seen over the top of the rock, about 110 feet. A number of people witnessed the girls' daring climb and the lightkeepers are going to fix a permanent rope ladder so tourists may see the natural wonder without much danger.

The young women were Miss Hazel and Irene Haucom, daughters of B. L. Haucom, vice president of the Portland Seed company, and Miss Eva Ellis of Portland. They were accompanied by Ralph Leber of Seattle.

DEMOCRATS COME WEST TO OPEN THE CAMPAIGN

San Geronimo, N. J., Aug. 21.—Acting on orders of Governor Woodrow Wilson, the Democratic nominee for president, about half of the Democratic campaign committee started to Chicago yesterday to conduct Wilson's campaign in western states. Governor Wilson explained, however, that this arrangement will not interfere with the authority of the national campaign committee as a whole. Secretary Davies of the campaign committee headed the party. Those accompanying him were Senator Gore of Oklahoma, Congressman Burleson of Texas, Colonel Edwin of Louisiana, C. R. Crane of Illinois, Senator Reed of Missouri, and Will King of Oregon. Congressman Burleson will continue

to be chairman of the speakers' committee and Senator Gore chairman of the organization committee. Crane will have charge of the financial end. The following members of the committee remained in New York: Chairman McCombs, Vice Chairman Meador, Josephus Daniels, Senator O'Govern of New York, Congressman McGillicuddy, Maine; Robert Hudspeth, New Jersey; and Willard Saulsbury, Delaware.
