DEALERS AROUSED BY FIREARM ORDINANCE

Pawn brokers and hardware dealers who have firearms for sale are greatly incensed over the recently instituted ordinance against the sale of firearms and it is declared that the matter will be taken to the courts, to the supreme court if necessary, to secure an injunction against the police department preventing enforcement of the measure.

Pawn brokers are almost unanimous in declaring that if the police enforce the ordinance, they will refuse to give the police any further "tips" regarding criminals, and it is through the pawn brokers that the most valuable information regarding thieves is secured. Pawn brokers who act as a "fence" for thieves or who sell firearms to persons have heretofore been liberal in their distribution of information to the police and many crimes have been cleared up through their aid, but it is declared that this will cease at once.

"If a man wants a gun he can go into any saloon and get one without a bit of trouble, and if he can't get it there he can go to St. Johns, Vancouver or any of the nearby towns, and then laugh at the city," declared a prominent broker yesterday. "We are now packing up our guns and sending them to places where they can be sold, and we will do this even if a permit from the chief is presented."

COLLUSION WITH FORGER ALLEGED

In an answer stating that Anton Neppach enriched himself thousands of dollars through collusion with Temple Alexander in the timber deals, Attorney A. E. Clark, representing Alexander, has replied to the suit of Neppach for the recovery of the Alexander home at 349 Twenty-eighth street.

Alexander is serving time in the state prison for his conviction of forgery and embezzlement from the O-W. R. & N. Co., where he had charge of the timber and the department.

The answer to Neppach's suit was filed this morning, and includes several accusations against Neppach, who is vice president of the Nicolai-Neppach Planning Mill company. It is charged that the house occupied by the Alexanders was given to Alexander in place of a valuable timber claim which Neppach had promised him in exchange for valuable railroad contracts which Alexander was to give Neppach's company.

It is further alleged in the answer that Alexander was instrumental in giving to the Nicolai-Neppach company railroad business amounting to more than \$25,000 a year, and that because there was no competition for the contracts, the Nicolai-Neppach company was enabled to make a profit of at least 50 per cent of the gross amount of the orders.

One deal set forth relates that Alexander purchased a large consignment of ties from the Nicolai-Neppach company at a price of \$1.50 per thousand above the current market price. Another purchase, the answer says, included an order of fencing at \$1 per thousand feet above the market price.

According to the answer Alexander did pay \$600 on the property in question, because he and Neppach had agreed that it would be safer to draw up a form of contract to show that Alexander was to buy the place in regular form.

INSANE MAN IS BEATEN OFF WITH PITCHFORK

After a medical examination last night at the county jail, a man giving the name of Conrad Shaffer, who yesterday was beaten off with a pitchfork by Mrs. M. Fagan, who he approached the entrance to her home, East Fifty-eighth street and Powell valley road, was adjudged insane and removed to the asylum at Salem.

Shortly before 8 o'clock Mrs. Fagan noticed Shaffer running around her home. He had followed a young woman for a considerable distance, but returned to the Fagan home and attempted an entrance.

Mrs. Fagan went to the rear of the house, armed herself with the pitchfork and held the insane man at bay, while she called lustily for help. L. M. Lashey, a special deputy sheriff living near by, was notified, and with three other men overpowered Shaffer. He was handcuffed and brought on a streetcar to the county jail by the special deputy.

"The man could give no account of himself, further than to say that he has been staying at the Park hotel, and is 37 years old."

RECEPTION PLANNED FOR VISITING SCIENTISTS

A meeting for the purpose of adopting plans was held recently in the green room of the Portland Commercial club, and J. B. Kerr, of Carey & Kerr, representing the University club, was elected chairman of the committee of arrangements. Mr. Kerr will in a few days announce a committee to look after the reception, entertainment and finances.

A. D. Charlton, assistant general passenger agent of the Northern Pacific, has communicated with the heads of the party and he outlined some plans which were adopted. This includes an automobile tour of the city, a visit to the Eastern & Western Lumber company's big sawmill, and a reception and light luncheon at the Commercial club. The party will be met at the special train by a corps of automobiles.

SEEKS EVIDENCE IN SUIT AGAINST COUNCILMAN

Manager George W. Simons of the Pacific Bridge company yesterday asked two newspaper reporters who attended Monday's session of the city council if they could swear to an affidavit as to the exact words used by Councilman James Maguire in an attack he made upon the character of Robert Wakefield, Charles Swigert, H. C. Campbell, Simons said his object was to gather evidence for a contemplated libel suit against Maguire.

The councilman used vigorous language in describing the operations of Campbell, Swigert et al. His remarks were incident to a speech he made to have a resolution adopted authorizing an investigation into the appointment of former Judge Cleland as referee in a \$400,000 suit brought against the city by Wakefield.
