

LAND PRODUCTS SHOW VALUABLE ASSET TO STATE

Every Dollar Subscribed Will Bring Back Five Dollars, It Is Declared; To Rush Plans for Big Show.

That the big Pacific Northwest Land Products show will be worth \$5 to Oregon, Portland and the northwest for every \$1 subscribed was asserted yesterday at a meeting of the executive board of the show.

John S. Beall, chairman of the board, asserted with emphasis that the terdy appreciation of the combined land products and dairy exhibit had to be quickened into organized support.

By vote it was resolved to stop the question as to whether the show will be held as formerly arranged, November 13-25, and to spend the energy that has been discounting success in bringing about the largest event of its kind ever held in the west. After the land products show in Portland is over the exhibits will be taken by the Hill and Harriman lines to land shows throughout the east, thus providing one of the most effective advertising mediums ever established.

To Rush Campaign.
Organized on a systematic basis, work to secure the \$25,000 required for the exhibit, including prizes and running expenses, will proceed at once with vigor. Committees will call upon the people who have benefited from the growth of Portland and the northwest and will define to them the value of the show as a reason for their making generous contributions.

One of the big features of the show will be its educational value. The secretary, G. E. A. Bond, said yesterday that workers in the soil from all over the northwest will be brought together in discussion of advanced methods in land production. Many from the east will make low rates on the railroads and the land show an excuse to come to the northwest and here learn the home making opportunities. Whatever will add the earth education movement in Oregon, it was asserted, will constitute the most practical plan for increasing productive settlement and thus bring about the most permanently valuable advertising of the home opportunities in the northwest.

President Edgar B. Piper of the Commercial club, D. O. Lively of the Portland Union Stockyards company, J. Fred Larson, Phil S. Bates, E. D. Timms, F. W. Power, John F. Carroll and J. L. Purse all made short addresses defining the value of the show to Portland and the northwest.

Educational Effort Pays.
B. B. Miller, traffic manager of the O.-W. R. & N. company, asked some questions relative to the value of the exhibit and its attendance drawing power that, answered by Mr. Beall and Mr. Bond, showed what the show would mean to the city and the entire Pacific northwest. Mr. Lively said that educational effort kept \$500,000 in Oregon last year that otherwise would have been sent east for home. In other words, that the value of production had been increased to that extent in Oregon in one year.

James J. Sayer was appointed chairman of the publicity committee to serve in putting before the people who will be interested in the exhibit all possible information as to its purpose and plan and benefits. Of the \$25,000 to be raised \$20,000 will be used for the land products show proper and \$5,000 for the dairy show, which is to be held in connection with it.

PROMINENT LODGE WOMAN IS DEAD

Mrs. Robert Lutke, 61 years old, wife of a prominent Portland manufacturer, past president of the Portland Women's club, and a grand matron and past grand matron of the Order of the Eastern Star, died yesterday at the Good Samaritan hospital, from an abscess for about a year, and had been removed to the hospital but two days before her death.

In June, 1908, Mrs. Lutke was elected thirteenth president of the Portland Women's club, and while a member of this organization she made a great many friends. In 1898 as grand matron of the Order of Eastern Star, and as past grand matron the following year, took much interest in the work. She was quite well known for her philanthropic spirit.

The body is now at Finley's pending word from the east in regard to the funeral.

REFUSE TO REVOKE LIQUOR LICENSE

Vote 5 to 2 Regarding Yeon Grill License During Elks' Week.

The liquor license committee of the city council yesterday by a vote of five to two refused to recommend the revocation of the license under which liquor was sold in the notorious Yeon building grill during Elks' week. Those who voted for revocation were Councilmen Will H. Daly and R. C. Clyde. Those who voted against revocation were Councilmen Allan R. Joy, R. E. Menefee, John Montag, H. W. Wallace and F. E. Watkins.

Councilman Daly declared warmly after the vote was taken that he would show in the council why "certain members voted the way they did." He then invited the committee to issue an order that the breweries of the city furnish for the inspection of the council a complete list of their transfers, saloon leases, insurance policies and receipts.

Councilman Daly, backed by Councilman Clyde, will carry the fight into the council. He said yesterday that the liquor license committee really had more power, if it were used, to prevent violations of the liquor laws than have the police.

Half a dozen detectives and patrolmen testified before the committee that the Yeon grill had been run loosely, that it was a "tough and disreputable place." The license, however, under which the grill was run, was controlled by Weinhard's brewery and Manager Paul Wessinger of the brewery told the committee that when he had the license transferred to E. J. Hanbury he thought Hanbury was able and willing to conduct a decent place. He said he did not know of the trouble that took place in the grill till he saw the newspaper accounts and that he then took immediate steps to recover his license.

Two cases were brought against the company, the specific offenses having occurred August 16. The company pleaded guilty to the charges and a fine of \$25 for each offense was imposed.

FREEWATER PEACH DAY DRAWS 3000

Annual Festival Takes on Features of Great Political Love Feast.

Freewater, Or., Aug. 23.—Freewater Peach day festivities were attended by about 3000 people, not quite the number of previous years on account of harvest conditions.

J. P. Neal presided. The speakers were Rex Bleakney, Ben Hill of Walla Walla, Jack Keefe of Pendleton, George Cochran, water commissioner of Oregon, and J. C. Sanderson.

The afternoon political talks brought out the largest crowd of the day not less than 3000 being in attendance. Judge Stephen A. Lowell spoke for the Republican party, F. B. Mulkey, candidate for senator on the Bull Moose ticket, and Will A. Peterson of Pendleton, for the Democrats, spoke and county officers were introduced.

The baby show contest for children under one year was decided as follows: First prize, baby of Mrs. C. A. Mason; second prize, baby of Mrs. Myrtle Johnson. The baseball contest between Freewater and Stanfield was won by the latter by a score of 8 to 4.

VETERAN'S FUNERAL TO BE HELD TODAY

Funeral services for Captain Salmon B. Ormsby, 76 years old, who died Wednesday at his home, 621 Nehalem street, from heart trouble, will be held from the house at 2 o'clock this afternoon. The body will be placed in a receiving vault at the Portland crematorium. Captain Ormsby was a Civil war veteran, ex-superintendent of the Oregon forest reserve, "father" of the soldiers' home at Roseburg, and ex-member of the legislature.

Captain Ormsby was born in October, 1835, at Parlatville, N. Y. For 25 years he lived in that state, and there received his education. Shortly after moving to Missouri, in 1860, he was arrested by confederates, but escaped. In 1862 he enlisted as a private in Company K, Fifth Michigan Volunteer cavalry, and with his company was assigned to the Army of the Potomac, serving in the battle of Gettysburg. Later he was promoted to lieutenant in Company C, One Hundred and Eighth colored infantry, and in 1865 to Captain in Company A. He was mustered out in March 1866.

In 1882, after serving as superintendent of public schools of Joplin, Mo., he came to Oregon, settling on a farm near Salem, where he raised stock for over 17 years. He was elected from Marion county to the legislature in 1892. Among the important measures he helped in passing was the bill establishing the soldiers' home at Roseburg. Five years later he was appointed superintendent of the forest reserve of the Cascades, serving until 1902.

Captain Ormsby leaves a widow and one son, Lyman Merritt Ormsby. He was a member of the Sedgwick Post, No. 19 Grand Army of the Republic. He served as commander of the Department of Oregon, and was assistant to Grand Commander Adams. He was also a Mason and a member of the Commandery of Legion of Honor. The funeral today will be in charge of the A. J. Smith Post and Blackmar Circle, auxiliary of the Grand Army of the Republic.

WOMEN TO RAISE FUNDS FOR TAFT

Endless Chain System of Letters Will Be Managed by Mrs. Mabel Boardman.

Washington, Aug. 23.—An endless chain system of letters is to be used to raise funds for the election campaign in behalf of President Taft and Vice President Sherman. Mrs. Mabel Boardman, national director of the Red Cross society, and a personal friend of the president, is to manage the plan.

Charles D. Hilles, chairman of the Republican national committee, said that Mrs. Boardman is doing this work as an individual and not as the head of the Red Cross society.

Under the present plan \$1 is to be solicited from each person receiving a letter. Mrs. Boardman expects that scores of her intimate friends will be the initial contributors. The chain will be started by mailing 4000 circular letters.

STEAMER SINKS FISHER BOAT IN THE STRAITS

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 23.—Coming into the straits this morning, en route from San Francisco, the British steamer Ikalas, Captain Clarkson, collided with and sank the power fishing boat Dove, Captain Weaver, of Seattle.

The crew of two men, Captain Weaver and Engineer C. E. McMaster, were rescued by the crew of the Ikalas and were landed here by the Nanaimo pilot boat this morning. They left by the steamer Iroquois at 3:30 a. m., bound for Seattle, having been given a passage by Captain Carter. They were destitute, all their effects except the clothing they were wearing being lost with their vessel, which was broken and practically in two by the propeller of the freighter.
