Court Grants Vacation.—That he has had no vacation for five years, was the reason given by H. D. Barber, clerk for the S. P. & S. company, yesterday morning to the judge, Judge Morrow, for asking to be excused from jury service during the coming term. The term begins September 3, for which 130 men have been summoned to serve.

Ordinances Vetted.—Mayor Rushlight today vetoed an ordinance reimbursing Albers Bros. in the amount of \$597 for the paving of a portion of Front street under the approach of the Broadway bridge. The mayor says the street is almost excluded to the public and that it is used principally by three railroads for switching purposes. He sees no reason why the city should pay for the improvement. The mayor vetoed two other ordinances regarding special permits for the installation of a gasoline filling station, because no provision was made in the permits for the replacing of public streets in good condition.

Eleven Crap Shooters Fined.—Eleven crap shooters paid fines of \$10 each in police court this morning following their arrest last night at the Country club stables by Sergeant Van Overn and a squad of patrolmen who had been advised that the race track followers were gambling and who caught them all in a game of craps. The police had been advised some time ago that games were running wide open and had been for some time, in fact ever since the work of horse training had started at the track.

Lawrence, candidate for the legislature on the Republican ticket and editor of the Labor Press, will speak from the Graduated Single Tax wagon after Cartoonist Bengough has drawn some of his cartoons. At this same meeting Will Daly, president of the State Federation of Labor and member of the Portland city council, will be one of the principal speakers.

Girl Brought to Portland.—Myrtle Shaffer, the 19-year-old Tacoma girl who was brought to Portland by George Gies, and for which Gies was arrested several days ago, was found yesterday afternoon by Detectives Vaughn and Litherland and turned over to Sheriff Longmire, who had an insanity complaint for her. Both Gies and the woman left for Tacoma last night with the sheriff. The man attempted to fight extradition, but failed.

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CRIPPLES ARE DENIED VENDORS' PERMITS

A new rule was established by the license committee of the city council when it yesterday refused to grant permits to a score or more of cripples and blind persons who applied for the privilege of vending pencils, shoe strings, notions and the like without payment of a license.

"The committee has been too lax heretofore," declared Councilman Schmeier, "and as a consequence nearly every down town corner is congested by the presence of a number of life's flot-sam and jettam army. The word has been passed abroad that Portland is a paradise for beggars and we must do something to stop the influx."

The committee withheld the granting of three roly dealers' licenses pending an investigation to be made of their conduct. A delegation from the Portland Realty board appeared before the committee and protested that the license should not be granted, because the dealers had been unscrupulous in the past. The protesting delegates of the realty board were E. E. Cannon, H. K. Shellaby

TROUT EGGS TO BE TAKEN TO ALBANY

A carload of 300 cans of trout eggs are to be taken to Albany for distribution throughout that section today from the Bonneville hatchery. Another carload will be taken at the first of the week to Washington, Yamhill and Polk counties. A carload of 189 cans was released near Roseburg Wednesday.

Over a million and a half young trout have been turned loose throughout the state from the Bonneville hatchery since operations began on June 5 and a similar amount were released from the other hatcheries of the state. There are probably 1,500,000 remaining to be turned out, mostly at the Bonneville hatchery. The work will not be completed until well into October.
