

THEFT OF AUTOS CHARGE AGAINST FOUR JOYRIDERS

Sheriff Stevens and Deputies Arrest Three Young Fellows Who Smashed Lewis Machine Near Gresham.

With Mark King, 20 years old, and Eddie McGinty, 22 years old, in the county jail, Thomas King, 18, at Good Samaritan hospital with a dislocated hip, and a warrant out for the arrest of Darrow W. Walker, 26, the sheriff's office has knowledge of the gang of youthful auto thieves, which not only stole and wrecked the automobile belonging to Mrs. C. H. Lewis, near Gresham, Sunday morning, but which has appropriated but a dozen or more automobiles in Portland within as many weeks.

The youths operated apparently for the mere joy of reckless riding along country roads. It has been their practice to start automobiles from where they were left along the curbs in the downtown district, take a ride, and upon returning to leave the machine, not necessarily where they found it, but down town. The youths will be held to the grand jury.

The Gresham Joy Ride.
Mark King was not a member of Sunday morning's party. The Lewis machine was taken from the curbing on the Fourth street side of the Multnomah hotel. Thomas King and Walker had tried to move another car before taking the Lewis machine, but the first was locked. They then speeded up in the Lewis machine and McGinty joined the party before they left town. After driving out Gresham way they started back on the Section Line road. The smashup came when the auto left the road at Gresham.

Thomas King, the only boy at all seriously injured, was driving, and according to McGinty, had been warned to slow up for the curve. "We must have been going 60 miles an hour," said McGinty this morning, "and it was too late for the emergency brake when we thought we were going to hit. We went over in a bunch and it's a wonder it didn't get us all. I seemed to be racing with one of the wheels which flew off, and the car seemed to go all around us and over us, too. We were just out for a ride."

Brought Injured Man to City.
Walker came into town and got another car, in which King, who could not walk because of his injured hip, was taken to the home of a friend. Dr. Earl Smith was called and ordered King's removal to the hospital. King's hurt, the physician says, will not necessarily keep him in the hospital very long.

Walker, the only member of the gang at large, is said to have come from Kallispell, Mont. He is a chauffeur.

The very car taken by the youthful thieves to prevent detection and apprehension resulted in their downfall. It was their custom after appropriating a car for a jaunt to change the license number tag as soon as practicable after starting. This was to throw tracers off the trail in case the disappearance of the car should be reported to the police before the joyriders were well out into the country.

Telltale Automobile Tags.
When the sheriff's deputies visited the scene of Sunday morning's wreck they found four number tags, and it was through a pair not belonging to the Lewis car that the officers got their first tangible clue to the identity of the miscreants.

Mark King, though not a member of Sunday morning's party, was found to be implicated in former depredations, and was picked up by the deputies at the home of McGinty, 644 Hoyt street, where he went to pay McGinty's board bill and get his belongings. McGinty was arrested last night by Deputy Sheriff Phillips, who was waiting for him at the McGinty home.

Mark King at first stoutly denied having been mixed up with the affair in any way, and indignantly told the officers that he was being imposed upon. Under a cross-fire of questions, however, he broke down, and implicated his brother and the others of the party.

After getting Mark King's story Sheriff Stevens went to the Good Samaritan hospital, where he found Thomas King with a dislocated hip. The injury, King had told the physicians and nurses, was received when he fell down a flight of stairs. Sheriff Stevens soon got the truth from the victim, however, and was given the name of Darrow W. Walker as the fourth man in the party.

Sheriff Stevens and Deputies Leonard, Eniger, Hunter, Morris, Phillips and Huchaby worked on the case.

Secretary Meyer Ill.

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STAPLE CLOTHING SHOULD ALL BE MADE AT HOME

Portland Ideally Situated as Manufacturing Center, Declares R. E. Farrell, Just Returned From East.

"Practically all of the clothing, shoes and wearing material sold in Portland should be manufactured in Portland," says R. E. Farrell, president of the R. E. Farrell company, dealers in cloaks and suits, who has returned from a purchasing trip in the east.

Mr. Farrell says that with the natural resources at hand in the country tributary to Portland, and with the greatest motive power available, there is no good reason why the staples in men's and women's clothing, shoes, furs, etc., should not be manufactured at wholesale. Mr. Farrell says that there are manufacturing plants in San Francisco, Seattle and Tacoma that are doing well and that Portland, priding itself on being a progressive city, should get into line.

Can Be Made Here.
"All the staples in clothing could easily be manufactured here," said Mr. Farrell this morning. "Of course there are some novelties that each season brings along that it would not pay to manufacture, but the real clothing that is the basis of business is a different thing. The quality would be better and the price would be about the same. It would be the popular priced goods rather than the high priced goods, because when a man or woman wishes to pay a fancy price for a suit or a coat he wants a certain atmosphere of fashion that can be found only in the fashion centers."

"The New York market is beginning to feel the competitive effect of the San Francisco manufacturers. San Francisco is gradually getting into the graces of the buyers on the coast and in the northwest, and larger orders for the coast companies naturally mean smaller orders in the east."

"Portland is situated to better advantage for a manufacturing city than any other city in the northwest. We have the mills to make our cloth at Oregon City and Pendleton; we have the natural supply point for a vast territory, and with proper cooperation between the retailers and probable manufacturing plant capital, we would soon have some great factories here."

Portland Ideally Located.
"Oregon mills can turn out staple cloths just as easily as they can make fancy blankets and other souvenir goods. Portland can not expect to compete with the eastern manufacturing companies in making the cheaper grades of clothes, because we haven't the labor, but the average grade, for which there is the greatest demand, could be made to advantage."

"Portland is ideally located, too, for fur manufacturers. The northwest is a great market place for furs. Raw pelts are sent from Portland to New York, Paris, Berlin and Vienna for treatment and dyeing and manufacture, and then the made goods are returned again and sold to the local market. Think of the advantage all around if the furs were made up right here in Portland."

"I am glad to say that in the clothing line a start in a manufacturing line is being made in Portland. It is on a small scale, to be sure, but it may grow, and it certainly should do so."

"Clothing, shoes and furs are but a few items in the great list of commodities that could be and should be manufactured in Portland. We should have dealers throughout the northwest and along the coast, sending to Portland for their wholesale lots, rather than having our merchants sending east and to San Francisco and to Seattle for their goods."

Portland Is Handicapped.
"Seattle, San Francisco, New York and other manufacturing cities have representatives in Portland, and through them the local business is given away, whereas, if we had our own plants we could buy direct. There would be a saving in time, and the risk of receiving unsatisfactory and inferior goods would be eliminated."

"We can't even buy our findings in Portland. Such little articles as pads, haircloth and other fixings of suits and coats have to be purchased in San Francisco. Of course we could buy such stuff at the retail stores here, but we cannot afford to pay retail prices for big orders. We must have the manufacturing plants here to supply the market at wholesale, and practically from maker to wearer."

"Seattle now has about 16 clothing manufacturing plants and San Francisco has 35 or 40."

Mr. Farrell says that the styles and fabrics in the eastern markets at this time are very beautiful, and that there is no indication for advance in prices.

GABY DESLYS SHOCKS LONDON THEATRE GOERS
London, Aug. 27.—English theatre goers are still gasping today over the performance of Gaby Deslys, the dancer and former favorite of ex-King Manuel, of Portugal, at the Palace theatre here, during which she disclosed on the stage more amazingly near the limit than has ever been seen in a London theatre.

The disrobing act followed a wild dance in which she indulged with her American partner, Harry Plicer.

It is predicted that her performance may be interfered with by the English Anthony Comstock.

BECKER'S HEARING IS STAYED BY COURT ORDER
New York, Aug. 27.—When Police Lieutenant Charles Becker was arraigned here today for alleged complicity in the murder of Gambler Herman Rosenthal, his attorney served on the court an order from Supreme Court Justice Amund staying the proceedings until September 4. Judge Mulqueen accepted the order and remanded Becker to the Tombs.

ADJOURNMENT PUTS MANY OUT OF JOBS
Washington, Aug. 27.—All out going trains today were jammed with cabinet officers, senators and representatives, leaving Washington for vacations. Most of the members of congress planned a brief absence before starting upon campaign duties. As a result of the adjournment of congress, hundreds of clerks and stenographers are out of jobs today.

IMPURE MILK IS CAUSE OF ILLNESS

Vancouver Girl Dying After Drinking Fluid Bought at Dairy.

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 27.—"Owing to the shocking state of affairs in this city, unique perhaps on the continent inasmuch as there are new regulations governing the sale of milk for consumption, one of my patients is dying from spinal meningitis, contracted from impure milk," said Dr. A. A. Wilson today.

The case to which the doctor refers is that of Miss Elsie Stainforth, a girl of 16 years, of 1938 Third avenue west, who at a late hour "not expected to survive."

About four days ago, Miss Stainforth partook of some fresh milk purchased at the regular family dairy, and shortly after consumption of the milk, symptoms of poison were apparent, and Dr. Wilson was called to attend the girl. He diagnosed the case to be spinal meningitis, and attributed it to the consumption of milk containing poisonous germs.

DIGS UP CHOPPED REMAINS OF MAN
Vancouver Laborer While Excavating Discovers Body Hacked to Bits.

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 27.—What is considered by the Vancouver police to be a murder rivaling in its ingenuity and fiendish detail that committed by Dr. Crippen, was disclosed late yesterday afternoon by laborers excavating for an apartment house on Seymour street.

Antonio Pocatelli, a laborer, felt his pick strike something hard. Thinking it a piece of rock, he stopped to investigate, brushing away the earth. A skull was disclosed. Further digging showed that the remains of a human body had been buried there.

The body had been cut up so as to be unrecognizable, but from the bits of clothing that remained it was that of a man. From a cursory examination, it was stated that the bones had been buried about a year.

MEXICAN RAIDERS FIRE UPON AMERICAN TROOP
El Paso, Texas, Aug. 27.—Making way with 100 head of cattle obtained in a raid on the Culberson ranch, situated four miles from the border and 35 miles from Hachita, N. M., a band of 25 Mexican rebel raiders exchanged shots with a troop of the Third United States cavalry stationed below Hachita, according to reports received here today by Colonel E. Z. Steever.

Colonel Steever announced that additional troops would be rushed to the scene immediately.

Arthur Bonar Law Injured.
London, Aug. 27.—Arthur Bonar Law, conservative leader in the house of commons, was severely bruised in an automobile accident today near Margate. Physicians report that his condition is not serious.

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PORTLAND SAN FRANCISCO

Pendleton Will Provide Accommodations for All Who Visit Their City.

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 27.—Directors of the Round-Up have been notified that a special train will be run from Tacoma to Pendleton during the Round-Up next month. The excursion is being arranged by the Tacoma Commercial club and will extend over four days, arriving here either Friday or Saturday.

Announcements have also been received that a special train will be run from Aberdeen and Hoquiam and North Yakima, and others from Spokane and from Portland.

Pendleton has opened a campaign to provide accommodations for all her visitors during the three days of the exhibition. A house to house canvass will be made to list all vacant rooms at a reasonable price and accommodation headquarters will be opened in a central place where guests may be assigned to rooms. Last year Pendleton had rooms to spare and no fear is felt that anyone will go without a place to sleep or eat this year.

WILSON "REAL RULER"; MAN TO BE HONORED

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5 BURGLARIES MAKE THIEVES NO RICHER

Corvallis, Or., Aug. 27.—Five burglaries were committed in the town of Sunnyside last night, but so far as is known no money or valuable was taken.

The places entered are Mason & Mason, hardware store; Gibbon & Sons, general merchandise store; Walters' butcher shop, the postoffice and a blacksmith shop. The blacksmith shop was evidently entered for the purpose of securing tools with which to break into the other places.

At Walters' butcher shop and the hardware store, there are no signs that any one burglarized the places, other than that the back doors are broken open. The butcher shop shows that some one walked in the yawdust from the back door to the cash register, which was left open and empty by the proprietor last night.

At the postoffice the desks were pried open but nothing taken, except two relief coins. No stamps are missing.

At Gibbons' general store the safe in the office was wrecked by the burglars, but they did not even get the safe open. Mr. Gibbons stated this morning, "The safe was not locked; we don't keep anything in the safe but our books and now they have fixed it so that we can't get our books."

A bag of beans was placed against the safe door, the cracks of the door were soaked and a charge of something set off but the unlocked door was not blown off. No tracks were found except close to the places burglarized, and no theories are entertained except that it was the work of amateurs.

\$500 Reward for Bellboy.
