

'FLYING LEGION' IS GUEST OF BRITISH COLUMBIA CITY

Vancouver Entertains Party of Prominent Californians on Tour of Coast in Interest of Frisco Exposition.

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 29.—The "Flying Legion," representing San Francisco's Pan-American exposition, consisting of 101 of the most prominent men in California, arrived in Vancouver this morning by the steamer Princess Alice from Victoria. No party ever organized to exploit an exposition ever included so many distinguished men. For the space of one day Vancouver will entertain Luther Burbank, Benjamin Ide Wheeler and other prominent Californians.

The legion was welcomed to the city by Mayor Findlay and representatives of local commercial bodies and taken in 25 automobiles for a tour of the city and environs. Each automobile was decorated with stars and stripes and union jacks, as were many of the buildings.

A luncheon was tendered at 1 o'clock by the board of trade and a reception being held this afternoon.

The party leaves for Seattle tonight, visiting that city and Portland on the return and will arrive in San Francisco on Sunday.

CARRIER LONG DEAD, WITH GREEK D, 10,649 FALLS FROM ROOFTOP

Ankhar, Or., Aug. 29.—Mrs. R. D. Sanford, residing at the north end of Laurel street in this city, picked up a dead pigeon yesterday at the side of the house. The bird had evidently been dead for some time, as the body was thoroughly dried. It is supposed to have lain on the roof for some time and to have been dislodged by the wind. Attached to its right leg was a light-colored metal tag, stamped with a Greek D and the number 10,649. On the left leg was a plain narrow brass band without lettering or numbers. The hands were removed and are now awaiting a claimant. The pigeon was evidently a carrier that dropped from fatigue or injury at this point.

HOTEL LAKEVIEW TO BE NEWLY FURNISHED

Lakeview, Or., Aug. 29.—The Hotel Lakeview is to change management October 15, and will be remodeled and newly furnished throughout by C. E. McDonald, one of the best known hotel men on the coast. Darrow Is Guest.

Los Angeles, Aug. 29.—Clarence S. Darrow is on record here again today with his plea that he was actuated by a humanitarian motive during his conduct of the McNamara trial. He repeated his assertion last evening at a banquet tendered him by labor leaders and attended by nearly 200 union men. Darrow was given an ovation when he arose to address the gathering. He shook hands with each guest.

STRATHCONA FINDS ENGLAND WRONGED

Believes Canal Matter Will Be Settled Satisfactorily to All Concerned.

(United Press Lead Wire.)
London, Aug. 29.—Lord Strathcona, interviewed on the question of the Panama canal, deprecated too much public discussion pending further developments.

"If the treaty," he said, "had been passed as originally intended, so that every nation should have free and unrestricted use of the canal, it would have been of great benefit to every country doing trade with the west coast. It would have facilitated and cheapened the transportation of passengers and of light goods which form so large a portion of the traffic of the railways."

"If these discriminating provisions, however, should come into operation, they would seriously hamper other nations which carry so much of the overseas trade. We look upon it as an absolute wrong, especially to Great Britain that this interpretation should have been placed upon the treaty."

"The foreign office will doubtless put the matter before the American people in the proper light and we have the assurance that a very large body of Americans are not satisfied that it should be left as it now stands."

Peace Always Rule.

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 29.—At a luncheon given to visiting British financiers and legislators at the Chateau Laurier, the guests included several members of the Dominion cabinet and the former Liberal government, among them being Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon-

orable W. T. White, W. T. Crothers, W. B. Nantel, J. D. Reid, W. J. Roche, Rodolphe Lemieux.

In proposing a toast to guests Sir Wilfrid Laurier, in pointing out how Canada's differences with the United States had been settled during the past hundred years without resort to arms, said a had arbitration was better than the most successful war. Touching on the race for armament in Europe, he said:

"Thank God, Canada shall never go into it to settle her differences by such a race. In England you think of armaments and war, in Canada we think of canals and railways and public works."

BENTON SCHOOL FAIR ATTRACTS BIG CROWD

Corvallis, Or., Aug. 29.—The Benton County Industrial School fair yesterday called out a large crowd of county people. Several thousand exhibits were shown, practically every school district in the county being represented. Aside from the children's exhibits are exhibits from the Corvallis high school, the Oregon Agricultural College, the state game farm and several manufacturing concerns and merchants of Corvallis.

A literary program was held yesterday. As the band was playing at the close of the literary program a thunder shower came up and drove the hundreds of fair visitors to shelter. The court house was soon filled and as fast as it could be done, fancy work and bread and pastry in the booths was brought into the court house. Practically all the exhibits of needlework, penmanship and domestic science were spoiled. Despite the fact that half of the exhibits had been disqualifying by the rain the fair committee decided to carry out the afternoon program. Everybody appeared good natured despite the downpour. A parade of the school children and floats from various districts of the county was held during the afternoon.

YOUNG WILL CASE MAY BE REOPENED

Mrs. Mabel Young Warner of Pendleton Wants Another Day in Court.

Pendleton, Or., Aug. 29.—Mrs. Mabel Young Warner, alleged maker of many bogus wills and recently acquitted in the third criminal trial, yesterday filed a petition to the state supreme court asking that the case be reopened and the judgment rendered by the court be set aside and that she be restored to her rights.

Affidavits are made by Richard, Samuel, John and James W. Peters, nephews of the deceased, J. W. Young; Mrs. Agnes Jones, a niece, and Mrs. Sarah Kittredge, a sister, all living in Michigan, and all of whose names appear among the contestants of the will filed by Mrs. Warner. All of these affidavits are to the effect that they have never sold the claim in the estate and have never given authority to F. D. Watts, Nora Watts or any other person to represent them in any case pertaining to the estate. Some of them state further that Watts attempted to purchase their claims, but the offer was refused.

Mrs. Warner has a letter written by Dr. Watts just after her acquittal of the forgery charge, to John Peters, in which he admits having worked two years on some of the witnesses in order to get them in shape to testify against her and declaring he had spent much time and money in so doing. He also intimates that the jury which acquitted Mrs. Warner was bribed and censures the prosecuting attorney for failure to secure a conviction.

Last spring Judge Maloney refused to probate Mrs. Warner's latest will.

DISTANCES OF INTERIOR MAKE MARRYING HARD FOR CRESCENT COUPLE

Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 29.—County Clerk C. R. DeLap has issued a marriage license to Chester C. Long and Lydia Tyler, both residing near Crescent, more than 100 miles from Klamath Falls. The license was issued upon a receipt of a letter from the clerk of Crook county, stating that the parties had applied to him at Prineville, but that as they reside in Klamath county, the license could not be issued there. In the letter were enclosed the necessary affidavits. The license will travel more than 100 miles by stage to Crescent, where the couple will be married as soon as it arrives. Southern Oregon is a country of long distances, and even marriages must abide their time.

TWO BILLION FEET OF TIMBER TAKEN BY WHEELER CO.

Booth-Kelly Company Seller of 32,000 Acres in Lane County, Which Its Mills Cannot Handle for Years.

Eugene, Or., Aug. 29.—A report of a recent sale of 3,000,000 feet of timber by the Booth-Kelly Lumber company to the Wheeler Timber company was confirmed yesterday by R. A. Booth upon his return to Eugene from an outing on the coast. He said the report was true, but declined to discuss the sale to any extent, preferring the purchasers to name the figure paid for the land, which is said to be about \$1,600,000. Mr. Booth also wished the purchasers to announce their plans as to the disposition which will be made of the timber just bought.

According to Mr. Booth's statement, the land lies along the middle fork of the Willamette river, in Lane county, and is 32,000 acres in extent. The Booth-Kelly company has held the land for a number of years, but as it is a much greater tract than the company can handle successfully in the immediate future and as its other holdings in this vicinity are sufficient to keep all of its mills in operation for many years, the sale was made upon being offered a price netting the company a handsome profit.
