

'DECLARATION OF PRINCIPLES' MAY LEAD TO CONFLICT

Some Members of Republican County Central Committee Resent Platform Action of Executive Board.

Emptying its wrath upon Roosevelt and his supporters the executive committee of the Republican county central committee last night issued a "declaration of principles" upon which the candidates in Multnomah county are supposed to stand.

Around this action is centered a possible tempest for some of the members of the county central committee resent the act of the executive committee in issuing a platform in the name of the full committee. The executive committee consists of 13 members and the general committee of 190. It is even asserted that a majority of the full committee will enter into rebellion.

P. T. Fisher, who has several times asked Chairman R. C. Wright to call a meeting of the full committee and whose request has been deferred and referred from time to time, today announced his intention to circulate a petition over the head of Chairman Wright and the executive committee and to call a meeting of the general committee.

"I believe a majority of the members will sign the call," said Mr. Fisher, "and to save expense we will try and meet at the east side library. We will act in the open. There will be no executive sessions such as the executive committee holds. If the five or six men who meet as an executive committee put forth their work as the executive committee we would not make the objection we do, but we will not stand for a few men using the name of the county central committee in such matters. As our requests for a meeting are ignored, we will call one ourselves, and it may be found wise to reorganize the committee."

Chairman Wright explained today that the executive committee was given full power to act for the full committee by a resolution passed at a meeting of the full committee held just after the April primaries. This was the only meeting of the general committee that has been held.

"Mr. Fisher is the only one I know who demands a meeting of the full committee," said Mr. Wright. "I have asked him to bring a petition signed by those who want a meeting. Let him show the goods if he has them. I can see no necessity for a meeting of the general committee. The only thing I know of that would demand such a meeting would be the filling of a vacancy on the county ticket."

The platform adopted last night calls on all Republicans to support Taft and scores the Progressives. In connection with local issues, the declaration approves the strict enforcement of laws against gambling and immorality.

After praising Taft, the platform declares a purpose to support all Republican candidates for national, state and local offices, and continues:

"We advocate, as a work both of good citizenship and of good Republicanism, the defeat of any candidates who cling to Republican nominations after ceasing to be Republicans. Acceptance of a party nomination binds the nominee, in law and in common honor, to the loyal support of the party; and to retain the advantages of the position after renouncing its obligations is an act of such dishonesty as to prove the unfitness of the candidate for any position of trust."

We believe that the self-styled Progressive party is claiming a name it has not earned, and that it did not create, and principles which are in no sense its property. Finding it already triumphant within the Republican party, under the leadership of La Follette, Borah, Hadley, Cummins and the other loyal Republicans who have fought the battle from the beginning, the promoters of the new party are endeavoring to seize upon the Progressive cause as a factional asset. Instead of advocating measures of progress and reform, they make the issue upon themselves as claimants to the Progressive banner, and instead of supporting the Progressive cause they lead upon it a burden of personal ambition, factional bitterness and partisan unfairness which is intolerable to millions of honest and thoughtful Progressives.

We believe that the Progressive cause belongs to the people, and that its leadership belongs to the men who were at the front while the fight was bitter and the issue doubtful.

We believe that the only political principle which naturally belongs to the self-styled Progressive party is the doctrine of Theodore Roosevelt that the restraints of law were intended for the people and not for their rulers, and that government ought to be the federal administrative business, regulated only by the supreme executive head. In the name of progress he would cast aside the safeguards against official corruption, favoritism and oppression, which all civilized people have demanded and established.

Would Suppress Crime.

On matters of local importance the platform says:

We advocate the strict enforcement of the existing laws against gambling, prostitution and resorts which encourage

age or tolerate debauchery, and the enactment of such further legislation as may be necessary to cope with these evils. We advocate the rigid and merciless suppression of official graft and corruption, and of all forms of private profit growing out of official positions. Honest and fair prices in all public and municipal work should be demanded; an effective public service commission should be established; the work of the dock commission ought to be supported and encouraged; river and harbor improvement ought to be pressed vigorously; adequate terminal and transfer facilities under public control ought to be provided; and just and normal railroad freight rates ought to be enforced, in order that Portland may enjoy its just share of oriental commerce and of the benefits which this coast is to derive from the Panama canal. Legislative candidates should be elected by districts in order that their selection may cease to be a lottery.

VALLEY HOP GROWERS TALK HOPEFULLY YET; LOSS SO FAR TRIFLING

Weather conditions apprehensively. The crop will suffer unless the rain lets up and cool clear weather sets in very soon. A hot spell would result in serious loss. In this connection the weather bureau says that cloudy skies and showers can be expected in the hop growing districts for another 24 hours at least, and indications are that clear temperate conditions will follow. Light showers obtained this morning in practically all points of the valley south of Salem, but telegraphic reports state that no damage through the rain has resulted thus far.

Pickers Get Wet But Hops Are O. K.

(Special to The Journal.) Hillsboro, Or., Aug. 30.—Picking in the Washington county hop yards began Tuesday, but wet weather has interfered and but little has been done. The crop was in excellent condition and no material damage has yet been caused, but should the rain continue for another day mould will begin. Should bright weather come tomorrow or Sunday, about the only effect of the rain will be discomfort to thousands of pickers camped in the yards.

Benton Growers Not Complaining.

Corvallis, Or., Aug. 30.—Hops in the vicinity of Corvallis are in good condition, weigh out well and have no rust. Unless the rains continue an undue length of time the crop will be unharmed. Picking began in several yards last Monday, but at a number of yards the picking has not begun. Growers have no complaint of the weather and are pleased with the outlook.

Linn Crop Safe for Days Yet.

Albany, Or., Aug. 30.—Hopgrowers here say the present rain is not doing any damage yet on account of the low temperature. The only drawback is the delay. Most of the yards in this vicinity are planning to commence picking next Monday and growers say that if the weather clears by the middle of next week they will be satisfied.

AMERICAN TROOPS CONTROL ALL PORTS

Hostilities in Nicaragua Not Expected, Since Forces Oust Rebels.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, Aug. 30.—Messages received here today from commanders of United States warships in Nicaraguan waters say that American troops and marines are in complete control of all the principal ports of that revolt ridden Central American country. Hostilities are regarded as improbable. Officials of the state department

seemed more hopeful today than at any time since the Nicaraguan situation became acute. Only a few cities in the interior remain in the hands of the rebels, it is said, and other points in Nicaragua are reported quiet.

One thousand American marines and bluejackets are scattered along the railroad line from Corinto, on the coast, to Managua, the capital. Other American forces are due to arrive next week to reinforce those already on police duty.

(United Press Leased Wire.) London, Aug. 30.—S. P. Cody, a naturalized Englishman, formerly an American, won the all-army aeroplane trials here today, capturing \$25,000 in prizes.

LOVETT AND PARTY SEE S. P. LINES IN LANE CO.

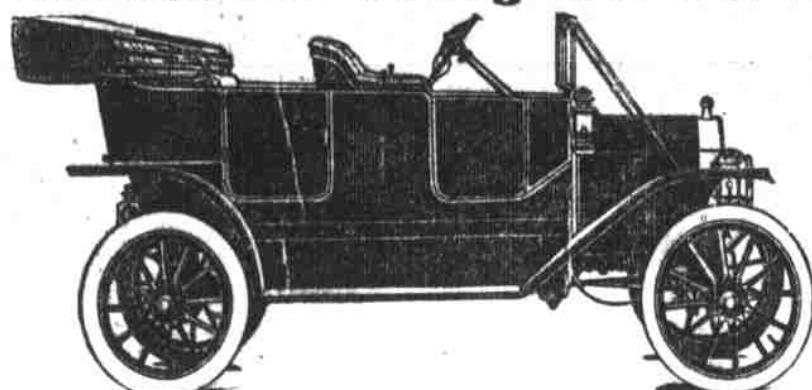
