Attorney in Prison at Jail.—Edwin E. Heckbert, an attorney in the Board of Trade building, met a very frigid reception at police headquarters when he went to interview a client, J. E. Grady, and was forcibly ejected from the jail quarters by Sergeant Wanless when he went in without permission. Heckbert, who had been interviewed by the man in the jail, returned to the desk, which was in charge of Sergeant Wanless, he walked into the jail without permission and was met by J. E. Thacher. When told he had no business in the jail without permission, he said he would stay there if he wished to. He was put out.

Appointed Probation Officer.—Walter Padrick, who for some time has acted as a volunteer in the street cleaning brigade, has been appointed probation officer and will take up his new duties immediately. The position of probation officer for municipal court wards is a new one and is intended as an aid both to the court and the wards. In many cases, a person is arrested, given a suspended sentence and then rearrested under another name, thus defeating the ends of justice by not permitting the suspended sentence to be imposed. On the other hand, it is intended that Padrick should be a guardian over the wards in an effort to help them and if possible, prevent their return to court.

Hearing Is Ordered.—Hearing of charges filed by John F. Jorg, an employee of the street cleaning department, against Dave Cohen, bar foreman of the department, was ordered continued yesterday by the street cleaning committee of the city executive board in order to give George Bowman an opportunity to testify. Chairman M. J. Murman of the committee says that Bowman has made affidavit that certain members of the street cleaning brigade frequently visited a certain saloon during their hours of duty. Cohen is accused of permitting these irregularities and of favoring certain workmen to the detriment of others.

Oil Struck Near Weiser.—J. C. Turney, who is interested with others in the development of recent oil discoveries in eastern Oregon, received a message from associates in Weiser, Idaho, this morning, to the effect that he has been struck five miles west of Weiser, or just over the line in Malheur county, Or. Mr. Turney says this is an indication of a well defined oil belt and he is satisfied that the operations planned by his company will result in the development of oil in commercial quantities.

Another Masher Fined.—"Hello, dearie, have you a date for tonight?" asked Pearl Raymond, aged 28 years, a barber, of a Miss Mays, aged 17 years, at Second and Mill streets last night. Sergeant Key and Patrolman Stewart overheard this remark, saw that the girl was much disturbed, and issued the barber under arrest on a charge of "mashing." This morning Judge Tazewell found the man guilty, and fined him \$20.

Suffers Injury Tenth Time.—Harvey Gibson of Barton, Or., who sustained a broken leg two weeks ago in a baseball game in which he was participating, is reported to be rapidly improving. The injured man was brought to the hospital some time ago. This is the tenth time, according to his story, that he has sustained a broken bone, and in most every case it was while participating in some sport.

Judge Gantenbein Investigates.—Because threatening letters were written to Judge Gantenbein by G. A. Pietzold, 708 East Thirtieth street, an investigation was started this morning by the judge, to determine why the letters were written and the responsibility of the writer. Pietzold failed to pay taxes for three years on his property, which was ordered sold. The sale is to be Saturday. The proceedings for the sale were before Judge Gantenbein and were regular. Attorneys Ridgway and Johnson represent the plaintiff foreclosing on the delinquent tax title. Pietzold claims the judge is to blame for the foreclosure.

Many Cases on Appeal.—All city cases appealed from the municipal court have been referred to Judge Gantenbein for trial. The judge took the question of trial up with City Attorney Grant this morning, and they agreed to confer Saturday or Monday to have them set for hearing. There are fully 100 cases on appeal. The cases will be classified and tried according to the changes. Assistant City Attorney Sullivan, who is city prosecutor in the municipal court, will have charge of the cases on appeal.

Yegg Men Sentenced.—Three alleged yegg men were arraigned in court this morning on vagrancy charges and each sentenced to 60 days on the rock pile. They gave the names of James Murphy, Walter Barnham and Lewis Thynik. Thynik is a cripple and had a subscription list in his possession in which he stated that he was trying to get enough money to get to his brother.

To Establish Polish Colony.—A. J. Kintzel, representing Polish, Slavish and Russian societies of Philadelphia and vicinity, has written to the Portland Chamber of Commerce that it is the intention of these societies to establish a large Polish colony in Oregon. Mr. Kintzel says that the colony will want between \$500 and 10,000 acres.

Cowling last night ran into and wrecked a motorcycle ridden by Lee Moolenbauer, at Third and Morrison streets, when the auto made a sharp turn from Morrison onto Third street. No arrests were made as the two men agreed to settle their differences out of court.

BECKER DENIES STORY OF BIG RETAINER FEE

(United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, Aug. 29.—A flat denial of the report that he had offered Congressman Martin Littleton \$100,000 to defend him and that Littleton had refused was made here today by Lieutenant of Police Charles Becker, charged with the murder of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, who was shot down in front of the Hotel Metropole.

District Attorney Whitman plans to have Becker tried before Justice Goff, the specially appointed judge to try the cases resulting from the New York police scandal, next month.

OLD POPULIST EDITOR, MEXICAN VETERAN, DIES

(Special to The Journal.)
Eugene, Or., Aug. 30.—James Franklin Amis, aged 80 years, died at his home in this city yesterday afternoon. He was a veteran of the war with Mexico and drew a pension from the government on account of his services in that war. He was a former newspaper publisher, his last venture being the Eugene Broad-Axe, published during the time populism flourished in this state. He was a strong advocate of that political faith and his editorials were widely copied. He was a forceful writer and a deep thinker. He leaves two daughters and a son, his wife having died only a short time ago. Mr. Amis was a pioneer of Oregon, having come to this state 60 years ago. He was born in Clay county, Kentucky, on February 6, 1832.
