

ROOSEVELT MEN HAVE NO BARREL, ASSERTS LEPPER

Secretary of Progressive Party
in Oregon Says He Ad-
vanced Coin for Campaign
Out of His Own Pocket.

Secretary L. M. Lepper of the Progressive party state committee vigorously denies that the Roosevelt people have connected with a "barrel," he says most of the necessary expenses so far have been paid from his own pocket.

"The statements of Chairman Moores of the Republican state committee about a 'barrel' are ridiculous," he said. "The expense of sending out calls for meetings and organization work I have paid myself, and I have paid out over \$250 so far. I expect to be reimbursed for this money, but I am not asking anything for my time for the last four months. I am giving that to the cause, because I believe in it."

"The national committee sent us about a carload of literature, and we were unable to get it out of the express office. The charges amounted to \$162.90, and the literature lay in the express office for 10 days. Then one of our local Roosevelt men wrote a check, loaning us the money to get it out. The most of our furniture has been loaned for the campaign, and the headquarters cost nothing. The typewriters you see here are my personal property."

"Members of the state committee subscribed \$150 or so when they met here, but only about one-third of that money has come in. If we had more money we could do better work, and we are getting the finance committee organized now. But there has been so much volunteer work by men who believe in the new party that we have been able to get along without much money."

"Of course, the other fellows have to have something to talk about. So they talk about a 'barrel,' and a stolen book, and the failure of Roosevelt to visit one of the places he was expected to reach. These things don't amount to much."

The literature referred to by Mr. Lepper is now stacked in the party headquarters, ready for distribution. It consists of the Progressive party platform, Roosevelt's "Confession of Faith," ex-Senator Beveridge's speech as chairman of the national convention, and a leaflet containing the speech of Jane Adams, seconding the nomination of Roosevelt, the candidate's letter to her, and an appeal to women voters by a group of Progressive women workers. The shipment includes 50,000 copies of each of these four documents.

COUNTY W. C. T. U. TO MEET NEXT TUESDAY

The annual Multnomah county convention of the W. C. T. U. will be held Tuesday, Sept. 17, in the First Congregational church. The sessions will start at 10 o'clock in the morning and continue during the afternoon and evening.

The convention this year will be of especial importance, it is said, because the national convention is to be held in this city next month, and this body will take steps, in conjunction with the local unions, to arrange for the big meeting. Three members of the W. C. T. U. of national repute will be here for the county convention.

Mrs. Jennie Kemp, business manager of the official W. C. T. U. paper, "The Union Signal," of Evanston, and Miss Edna Rowan, national secretary of the children's branch, of Evanston, will speak in the afternoon. Mrs. Florence Ewell Atkins, national lecturer, of Nashville, Tenn., will speak at night. The first two are to be here until the convention is in session, helping the local people in their arrangements.

LEGALITY OF METER RULE IS UNDER TEST

Refusal of John Lutz to pay a meter deposit or give surety for the same is the reason the Portland Railway, Light & Power company assigns in its answer to his suit for refusing to connect the current with his store at 447 Union avenue north. Lutz recently started action to force the company to connect with his business house, asking the court to issue an alternative writ of mandamus upon the company to this effect.

The company's answer further sets forth that it is ready to furnish him with electricity, if he will make the \$5 deposit or give two good sureties, as other users of electricity do. It is further answered by the company that Lutz has neglected to pay for electricity used during May, June and July. The action will test the company rule relative to requiring consumers to make a deposit.

JUDGE MORROW PUTS HIS FOOT ON DELAYS

Presiding Judge Morrow has a new rule in the circuit court for handling what he calls "fictitious" motions. These, the judge says, are filed by attorneys to cause delays and encumber the records. He says they are a general nuisance.

"One law firm had four such motions before me yesterday," the judge added. "An attorney wishing more time can just as easily go to the opposing attorney, get his consent and then make it a matter of record, instead of coming to the court with a motion."

Judge Morrow has formulated a new set of rules, chief of which is to abolish the presiding judge system. He has asked for a meeting of the judges, but this has not been called. The judges are busy getting in shape new rules to be submitted when the bench meets.

GOV. WILSON SENDS THANKS FOR SUPPORT

"I am grateful to the delegates from Oregon for their support in the national convention, and will feel most honored by the people of Oregon for their support in the November election," is the message sent to the people of Oregon by Woodrow Wilson through Mrs. Benjamin Brick, wife of one of the Democratic candidates for the legislature, who recently visited Governor Wilson at Sea Girt.

Mrs. Brick, with her little daughter, has been visiting for six months in New York. She was given an interview with the candidate through a letter of introduction by Will R. King, the Oregon national committeeman. She was greatly pleased with the governor's democratic and genial manner. She prizes a picture taken on the front porch of the "little White House," in which she and her little girl are seen standing with Governor Wilson.

Articles are under way for Pasco stockyards. The company will be incorporated for \$75,000, the promoters being local business men.

A large amount of this stock has been subscribed, and several sheep men throughout the northwest say they will subscribe for stock. An option has been taken on 160 acres of land just north of the city, on the main line of the Northern Pacific, and 100 acres of this land is

to be used for the stockyards proper, and the balance held for packing house purposes. The enterprise was taken up by the Pasco chamber of commerce about a week ago, and plans have been worked out by the committee with B. K. Short, chairman; V. B. Cox, A. F. Welch, Robert Jahnke, J. B. Crain and others.
