Workman Asks \$50,250 Damages. Suit to recover \$50,250 for personal injuries sustained while working on the Broadway bridge was started today in the circuit court by Walter Lee Eades against the Pennsylvania Steel company. Eades is a structural ironworker. He sets forth in the complaint that the company was negligent in that it allowed a large number of ties to be piled on a platform upon which he was working with other men. Eades claims that the ties fell 55 feet. His left leg was badly crushed, necessitating amputation below the knee.

Many Use Swimming Pools.—The popularity of the public swimming tanks was effectually demonstrated this afternoon. The report of the park superintendent for the summer months shows that from June 1 to September 7, 1912, persons bathed in the Sellwood park pool. This is an increase in attendance of nearly 100 per cent over last year's record. The new Fenwick swimming pool, which did not open till July 1, attracted 16,280 bathers.

Negro Is "Tip" to Game.—Tiptoeing quietly up a flight of stairs, following close on the heels of Jerry Wilson, a negro who has long been suspected of being a Chinese lottery game patron, Patrolman Long last night got into a room at West Park and Flanders streets, where a game was in progress. He arrested H. Hong for conducting the game. The Chinaman was fined \$75 this morning. Wilson and Charles Fong were fined \$15 each for attending the game.

Must Answer in Contradiction.—Louis Gribble, aged 45, a Centralia merchant, and Claude Adams, aged 22, a barman, were arrested Wednesday by Marie Ross and Merna Scott, 18 year old girls, were this morning returned to Centralia, where statutory charges will be made against them. The two girls were returned to Centralia yesterday by the department of public safety for women.

Men With Money Wanted.—Mayor Rushlight has been authorized by the secretary of the National Conservation congress to appoint five delegates to the annual convention of that organization at Indianapolis. The convention will hold a four day session, beginning October 1. Any citizen who would like to be a delegate at his own expense is invited to communicate with the mayor.

Cafeteria Proprietor Fined.—S. A. Raiche, proprietor of the Bon Ton cafeteria, 384 Morrison street, was fined \$25 yesterday afternoon in Justice Bell's court for working one of the waitresses employed at his place more than 60 hours a week. Raiche was arrested on complaint of O. P. Hoff, labor commissioner. Raiche pleaded guilty.

Fire Damage Slight.—A blaze of unknown origin caused \$150 damage shortly before eight o'clock last night in the Pacific Coast Tailoring shop on the third floor of the Phoenix building. Fire in the basement of a rooming house at 435 Yamhill street last evening did about \$20 damage.

Speeders Draw Fines.—A. C. Ruby, arrested at Twelfth and Multnomah streets, and Henry Meyers, arrested at Tenth and Holladay streets yesterday afternoon for speeding, were each fined

\$25 this morning by Judge Taswell. John P. Whitlock, arrested on the same charge at Grand avenue and East Burnside, was fined the same amount, but secured a suspended sentence.

Key Bids House.—In a raid last night on a rooming house at Third and Jefferson streets, over Denny's grill, by Patrolman Kay and Stewart, Mrs. M. Hammond was arrested for selling liquor without a license. Mrs. E. Kelly for conducting a disorderly house and Martin Peterson, R. J. Atchinson and May Davis on vagrancy charges. Helen Noble, Peter Kalvak, John Tomlinson and Evelyn Brown were arrested on a charge of immorality. All the cases will be tried on September 17 except those of Kalvak, who paid a \$20 fine, and Evelyn Brown, who forfeited \$20 bail.

Rogues' Gallery Loser.—That a man convicted of vagrancy in the municipal court, who has closed his affairs with the city by paying a fine, can not be photographed by detectives for the rogues' gallery was the decision of Judge Taswell this morning in the case of Charles E. Marshall, arrested yesterday by Detectives Hyde and Malone. Marshall was suspected of being a thief. This morning he pleaded guilty to vagrancy and was fined \$10. He objected to being photographed.

Car Men in Fight.—Trouble late last night between C. B. Hollister and C. Church, employee of the P. R. L. & P. company, was reported to Patrolman Fuller. Hollister told the officer that Church had drawn a gun on him in a quarrel over a car. Fuller was asked to arrest Church, but when he found that Church was deputy sheriff he refused to do so. Employees of the company this morning petitioned to have Church discharged.

Kidnap Robs Saloon.—A masked robber, who used a bandana handkerchief to cover his face, the Walnut hotel bar at Twenty-sixth and Nicolai streets and at the point of a gun compelled A. M. Galster, night bartender, to give up \$20 at midnight yesterday. The highwayman is described as about 6 feet 2 inches tall, rather slenderly built, and dressed as a laboring man.

Stole Furniture, Charge.—Detective Price this morning arrested John Bell, an employee of the O. W. R. & N. shops, and his wife on a charge of larceny preferred against them by G. C. Ewen of the Alaska building. Ewen declares he rented the couple a furnished house on Missouri street and that they stole the furniture. Ewen says he found part of the furniture in stores. The case will be tried tomorrow.

Directors, secretaries and members of the Portland Young Men's Christian Association will hold their annual "Setting-up conference" next Sunday, and announcements have just been mailed to the more than 5000 members outlining the day's program. Read college and members. The heads of departments will all be present and give a brief synopsis of their respective programs for the year, paying particular attention to new lines of work that are being taken up. The work will be presented by the following secretaries: R. R. Perkins, religious and social; R. C. French, educational; A. M. Grilley, physical; J. W. Palmer, boys, and Stanley Baker, employment. The work of all departments will be summed up by H. W. Stone, general secretary.

Several important addresses will be delivered. One of the principal speakers will be George Irving of Pomona college, California, who will talk in the afternoon and again in the evening. Dr. W. T. Foster, president of Reed college, will also deliver an address, his subject being "Unified Action of Educational and Religious Forces of Portland."

valuable stock ranch in this section of the state by the new owners. The new owners are also looking after other large holdings in this part of the state. It is believed the interests behind the deal may be bent upon securing all the strategic properties of this character, preparatory to entering the field on the largest scale yet attempted in Oregon and California.

The lands of the "T" have been quietly collected by purchases from the original settlers and by using agricultural college, state school and other scrip and are located in the best winter feeding section of the county, having the capacity to produce many thousands of tons of hay and grain when handled properly. The hope on the part of those interested in the development of that section of the country has been that some company would divide the holdings into 160 acre farms and sell to actual settlers, but the new owners have put a quietus on that idea and will in all probability enlarge the ranch instead of reducing its size.
