After a peaceful day in San Francisco, Colonel Roosevelt left Sunday night for Los Angeles, the next point on his tour of the continent. The colonel was weary when he finished a week of uninterrupted campaigning with his speech in the Coliseum Saturday night and said he felt grateful to his campaign man-agers for permitting him to have one "day off."

Efforts to have the names of Roosevelt Progressive party candidates placed on the general election ticket in Okla-homa have been abandoned, and members of the party in that state will be asked to vote for Republican party candidates for presidential electors and state officers in November.

The report is published in Washington that President Taft is about to ask the resignation of Lawrence O. Murray, comptroller of the currency. Accord-ing to the Washington report, Murray is to be asked to resign because he had leanings toward the new party and because he had refused to write a chapter for the Republican campaign text book on the government's finances.

OF APPEALS IS OPENED

The September term of the United States circuit court of appeals for the Sinth circuit, convened in the federal ircuit Judge William B. Gilbert of Portland presiding. Judge Gilbert and Circuit Judges Erskine M. Ross of os Angeles and William W. Morrow of San Francisco, and District Judge Charles E. Wolverton of Portland constitute the court.

Arguments were heard this morning the following cases on appeal: The inn & Lame Timber company vs. the inited States of America, and the Unied States of America vs. C. A. Smith t al; and Jessie M. Anderson, now Jes-ie M. Wight, and William Wight vs. the United States of America. The case of Thomas Evans vs. the Southern Pacific company was also argued on error, this being a personal injury case in which Evans sued the railroad company for damages for the loss of a limb, which he sustained by being run over by a train near Oswego.

Eight cases in all are to be argued before the court, which expects to conclude its session on Wednesday.
