Three Denied Citizenship-Robert Wurgaft, 845 Front street, was refused citizenship this morning in the circuit court on the ground that his witnesses were not qualified. W. Margulis, liquor dealer at 375 Fifth street, and J. Margulis, a contractor, were the witnesses. Henry Hazard, naturalization agent, objected to the final papers for Wurgaft on the ground that W. Margulis has been involved in too many cases where the moral question was the issue. The agent read a long list of police court arrests and prosecutions from houses to which Margulis holds a lease. "I don't think citizenship is worth coming back for," said Charles H. Paddison yesterday afternoon, when he was asked to study the government more and report in 30 days. At this statement the court directed that Paddison's application be denied with prejudice, which means that he must wait five years before again asking for citizenship. Wilhelm Rittel was denied final papers on the ground that he was illegally in the United States. It was shown by the government that he deserted an English ship while it was in an American harbor.

Judge Removes Phone-Judge McGinn has had his telephone in court chambers removed. "Too much bother" is the reason given by the judge for discontinuing his service. When the judges moved into the new rooms last fall, Judge Mc-Ginn gave orders that his court room be equipped with only one phone, as two telephones would cause too much annoyance during the course of trials. Soon after entering the new chambers, the judge directed that the bailiff not call him during the progress of a trial, but all calls would be answered during recess or at noon. A few days ago, the telephone was busy during the forenoon session of court. The judge that after-noon ordered that service to his room be discontinued. 
