

PRACTICAL HELP FOR CHILDREN IS GREATEST NEED

State Superintendent Alderman Issues Observation Chart, Laying Emphasis on Character Building.

That a teacher should be concerned with more than the giftness with which a child recites a lesson, should systematically observe industry, neatness, elements of leadership, self control, home industrial work and other qualities that make for character and fitness, is the position taken by L. R. Alderman, state superintendent of public instruction in an observation chart he has just issued.

This observation chart is new in pedagogy, but it is an answer to the felt lack of cooperation between parents and teachers.

"I do not claim for the chart," announces Superintendent Alderman, "that it will solve all school problems, but I do claim that if a teacher has clearly in mind what he ought to expect, he will be more apt to get those qualities. Good posture, good voice quality and clear enunciation should be looked after, and they are by many teachers."

Good Health Is Essential.
"Health is getting to be more and more a matter of concern to the teacher. Yet there are in most schools pupils whose health could be improved by the cooperation of the teacher with the parent and pupil. I have known many cases where good teachers have allowed girls to let their teeth decay, because it was not thought to come within the province of the school to advise them. Pupils have ruined their eyes because the teacher was looking only for book mastery and not for child improvement."

Superintendent Alderman will distribute the observation charts throughout the schools of the state and will keep close record of the results. The teacher is asked to make report on the following qualities in the pupil: Posture, including voice quality, state of health, industry, including neatness; elements of leadership, self control, willingness to cooperate, ability to form true judgment.

ment, altruism, including politeness, home industrial work, scholarship, bent points to what calling.

Seeking Best Occupation.
After explaining the service the teacher can render by systematically observing the occupation-trend of each child, his or her bent of mind and temperament, and laying particular emphasis on the importance of work at home, Professor Alderman adds:
"It is not the intention to burden Oregon teachers with more percentages, and thus make bookkeepers out of them. The idea is: If this will help you, use it; if not, don't. Nor is it the intention that teachers should compare students as a basis for working, but to use as a basis the progress each student has made, and as a basis for conference with parents it might be well to begin with 10 and go toward 100 for improvement."

"Habit plays such a large part in our lives, we ought to insist that the pupil shall do today what he should do tomorrow. Keeping in mind only scholarship does not take in the whole child."

PLAYGROUNDS ATTRACT 300,125 CHILDREN

Attendance of boys and girls at the eight playgrounds in Portland during the summer season of 100 days aggregated 300,125, according to figures in the report of Superintendent, E. M. Minche of the park department to the park board yesterday afternoon. Of this attendance, boys numbered 145,566.

The swimming pools in Sellwood and Peninsula Parks were attractive features, the two pools drawing 26,000 bathers.

So great has been the success of the playgrounds during the season that the superintendent recommends the number be increased for 1913, and he asks that two more swimming pools be installed.

He further recommends the establishment of an all year round recreational center in one of the parks, and the inauguration of a winter course of lectures on physical hygiene, dancing, sociology and various other things.

There were but 20 accidents in the playgrounds last season, and none of these was more serious than a broken bone.

REFORM ASKED BY THE EDITORS

Oregon State Ass'n Holds Interesting Session at Hot Lake.

That the meeting of the Oregon State Editorial association which yesterday concluded a two days' session at Hot Lake, where the delegates were entertained by former State Senator Pierce, was the most representative aggregation of country editors which has met during the life of the association, was the consensus of the opinion expressed by the delegates.

Several important resolutions were passed by the association the enforcement of which will be advocated by the various papers represented.

It was recommended that all state, county, city and school district printing, binding and blank books be manufactured in the state; that the office of state printer be abolished and that all public printing should be done on

open market; and that the railroad companies be compelled to publish their time tables in papers of general circulation.

The association also took occasion to condemn the large alluring cigarette advertisements in newspapers, billboards and magazines, the high-sounding and misleading advertisements of whiskey and other alcoholic liquors and the advertisements of champagne, flavored tobacco, as being detrimental to the youth. Medicine "ads" were also condemned, as it is claimed that the purpose of the "ads" are to encourage race suicide.

Billboards were also made the object of attack, and state regulation of billboards to the end that they be freed from objectionable features was demanded. A franchise tax on all billboards and their abolishment from county and state highways was also demanded.

The Made-in-Oregon campaign of the Oregon Manufacturers' association was commended.

Five of these are being deported by the state to asylums in other states, and 11 are being deported by the government to the foreign countries from which they came. It has been found they were insane when they were admitted to this country.
