

FEDERAL GRAND JURY FINDS 18 TRUE BILLS

The second return of the federal grand jury of the present session was made late Monday afternoon. Twenty-two cases were considered since the last report was made. Of these 18 were passed on to the court. Fourteen true bills and four secret indictments were returned, while five cases were dismissed.

The true bills are as follows: Charles Corvay, white slavery; Ray Harold, white slavery; William Patton, selling liquor to an Indian; R. Walton, for using the mails to defraud; Philip Lewis, for taking liquor on an Indian reservation; Esther Wood, perjury; Frank Bishop, alias Fred Black, impersonation of a secret service officer; Max G. Cohen, subornation of perjury; Nathan Self, white slavery; Preston Ballard, white slavery; Astor A. Anderson, postmaster at Jewell in Clatsop county, for embezzlement of postoffice funds; Ed Gibson, selling liquor to an Indian; Sing, having contraband opium.

After a hearing, the following bills were dismissed: S. B. Reid, charged with selling Indian whiskey; Paul Beal, charged with white slavery; Arthur Robinson, charged with white slavery; Harry Hollister, charged with white slavery; Frank Winshut, charged with selling liquor to an Indian.

All defendants named in the true bills are in custody, either in jail or out on bond.

amount, he said, included \$17,000 paid out in railroad fares by Colonel Roosevelt and former Senator Beveridge.

Hooker declared the Progressives spent \$5000 in Maryland, \$3500 in Maine, \$3200 in Massachusetts, \$15,500 in Illinois, \$17,500 was spent by Senator Joseph M. Dixon of Montana, who had charge of the Roosevelt headquarters in Washington. The above figures, Hooker said, did not cover California and intermountain states. He did not believe that any independent state fund was raised.

The progressive receipts were increased, Hooker said, by four contributions from Frank Munsey, magazine and newspaper publisher, which totaled \$39,000. Other contributions, he said, were from Emile Roosevelt, W. Barbour, Douglas Robinson, G. E. Roosevelt and W. E. Roosevelt, each of whom gave \$5000; H. L. Stoddard with \$4000; Dan Hanna \$25,000. George W. Perkins, he said, contributed \$22,500 besides earlier donations. Hooker declared that Roosevelt's primary campaigns were the most economical ever conducted, considering the number of votes polled.

Crane gave La Follette \$70,000.

Hooker started the committee by announcing that Charles R. Crane of Chicago contributed \$70,000 to Senator La Follette's campaign, adding:

"It probably will interest Senator Pomerene to know that Crane also gave \$7,000 to Governor Wilson's campaign. Crane told me that he gave these amounts."

T. C. Tegethoff, private secretary to the late E. H. Harriman, followed Hooker. He declared that he was unable to find any more letters referring to Crane to Roosevelt's 1904 campaign.

"Have you a telegram or a letter from Harriman to Roosevelt regarding the election of a senator from California?" asked Senator Pomerene.

"No," answered Tegethoff.

"Did you ever hear of a letter?" persisted Pomerene, wherein Roosevelt asked Harriman to be careful about selecting a senator from California?

"I never did," was the reply. Tegethoff was then excused and William Flinn called to the stand.

Flinn presented the statement of his pre-convention expenditures, asserting that he contributed from \$5 to \$5 per cent of all the Roosevelt money used in Pennsylvania.

Flinn said his contributions amounted to \$39,384 to the Pennsylvania campaign and that of this amount \$28,000 was spent in Allegheny county in which Pittsburg is located.

Flinn said that \$29,900 was spent on postal cards during the fight. He said the money was charged to the Roosevelt campaign but it covered a much larger range of interests. The Taft men spent \$90,000 in Allegheny county alone. I think these large expenditures should stop."

Senator Clapp then questioned Flinn regarding Penrose charges that he offered the buy the United States senatorship and Flinn shouted: "If Penrose said I offered him that sum, he lies—that sum or any sum."

CHRISTIAN AND MOSLEM PREPARE FOR BALKAN WAR

With Grecian and Montenegrin levies he is expected to cross the Aegean sea and land near Salonika in the Turkish Mayet of that name at a point where only a thin strip of Ottoman territory connects the Turkish possessions to the west with that region adjacent to Constantinople and north of the Dardanelles. Striking northward from the sea the Greek and Montenegrin forces, it is believed, will make a junction with the Serbian and Bulgarian troops which would strike southward from Roumelian territory. If this junction can be made Turkey's main strength to the east will be cut off and the allies will be able to occupy piecemeal all the three provinces of Salonika, Monastir and Albania.

Whether or not the allies can carry out what is announced as their plan is, however, dubious. Turkey's navy is a negligible quantity and Greek and possibly Italian ships could easily sweep the Aegean and Ionian seas. But on land Turkey is strong. Her army, well organized and in a war of Moslems against Christians there is no doubt that practically the whole male strength of Turkey in Europe would rise to the call of a jihad. The powers fear that the conflict, if it does come, will be one of the bloodiest in all history and that if the Turks are defeated complications over the partition of the Ottoman empire will arise which are likely to embroil the whole of Europe.

Russia Attempting to Avert War.

London, Oct. 1.—Foreign Minister Goshoff of Russia, is here today in conference with the Turkish, Greek, Serbian and Bulgarian ministers in an effort to prevent war in the Balkans. The powers fear that the result of a conflict would be the partition of Turkey.

Montenegro Holding War Council.

Cetinje, Montenegro, Oct. 1.—King Nicholas of Montenegro is engaged in a general council of war with his advisers here today. Mobilization of the Montenegrin forces, and a descent of Albania are expected to be the outcome.
