## JOLLY INLAND TOUR

The Royal Rosarians of Portland returned this morning from their invasion of the Inland Empire. The Rosarians, representing the commercial interests of Portland, visited Spokane, Pendleton, Colfax and Walla Walla. The climax of the journey was the entertainment at Spokane, where the visitors were feasted and entertained in a most lavish way.

In Spokane last night what is said to have been one of the most brilliant dinners in the history of the city was given in honor of the excursionists. The Coueur d'Alene Ad club assisted in the entertainment and the program.

That the interests of Portland, and Spokane as the center of the Inland Empire, are identical, that the completion of the Panama canal and its influence in changing the trade of the country will make friendliness in commercial, industrial and social aspects exceedingly desirable, was the general trend of addresses by President Higelow of the Spokane Ad club and Charles Larkin on behalf of Spokane, and by George L. ## NAVAL REVOLT WORRIES CZAR

## Inquiry Into Mutiny Among Russian Sailors Causing Uneasiness; 500 in Irons.

(United Press Leased Wire.)

Sebastopol, Russia, Via Belgrade, Oct. 1.—Government investigation into the revolutionary movement among the men of the Russian Black sea fleet is said to be causing the greatest uneasiness in St. Petersburg. This city continues to be flooded with secret agents. More than 500 men and petty officers are in iron upon the ships or in prison ashore. So little confidence has the navy department in the loyalty of the men who still enjoy their freedom aboard, that the majority of those arrested have been removed to the shore prison. Mere suspicion is sufficient ground for throwing a man into irons. Even the higher officers are under suspicion.

The breech blocks have been removed from some of the guns on the ships that they may not be used. No dispatch is allowed to be sent by telegraph that makes any reference to the revolt in the navy. The ruthless iron hand of the police and government casts a veil over the situation, as no newspaper dare refer to the developments, much less print details and reports current here. Not only the navy, but some of the troops on land, are said to be in sympathy with the plotters.

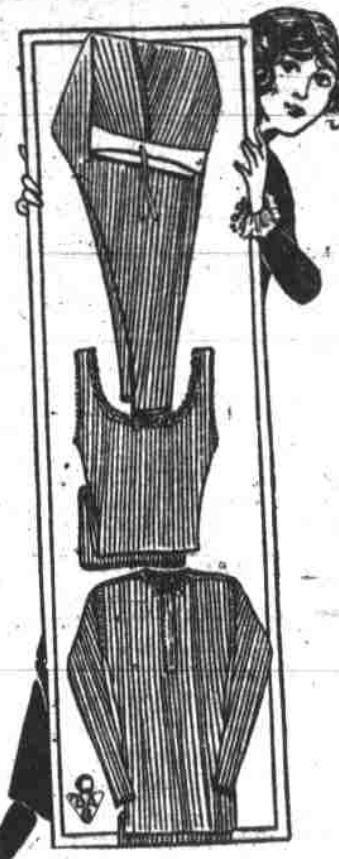
