Suspect Seized by Police—While trying to break into the till of the Glisan hotel, Sixth and Glisan streets, at an early hour this morning, Frank Miller, a Mike Meyers, was seen by Patrolmen Niles and Hutchings, who seized him before he could get out from under the counter. He was arrested on a disorderly conduct charge. This morning when the people living in the hotel learned of his arrest, one of the lodgers came to the police station and reported that his wallet containing several hundreds of dollars had been taken from him, during the night. Detectives Coleman and Snow are now working on the case, to find out if Miller is connected with this theft. The case will be heard in police court tomorrow.

Jewish Order Branch—The United States Grand Lodge, Order Brith Abraham, the largest and oldest Jewish fraternal order in America, has installed a branch of the order in this city. The Order Brith Abraham was instituted in New York City on February 12, 1850. The officers of the local branch order are composed of some of Portland's well known Hebrews—A. Tolson, president; Edward N. Weinbaum, secretary; M. Rosenkrantz, treasurer; J. Goldstein, Ralph Zuzman and David Seltzer, trustees. M. B. Okun, grand deputy of New York, installed the lodge and its officers, he having appointed John Weinbaum a past president of the order of Brith Abraham, R. L. the local president of the lodge.

Lodge Rooms Leased—The A. O. U. W. and Degree of Honor Grand Lodge of Oregon have leased the entire third floor of the building at Fourth and Washington streets, known as the Woodard and Clark annex. This floor is 50 feet wide and is to be fitted up for lodge rooms and offices and the A. O. U. W. Library will also be located on this floor. Both orders have started a campaign for the winter and this is the first step in that direction. The entire arrangement is to be up with kitchen, dining room and all conveniences complete for lodge meetings. Every lodge of the A. O. U. W. and Degree of Honor will move to this building on centrally located.

Bad Checks Cause Trouble—Attempting to purchase a \$240 motorcycle from Ballou & Wright, Seventh and Oak streets, with checks that are alleged to have been forged, brought Charles Geis, 19 years old, of 547 East Twentieth street north, to the police station at 10 o'clock this morning. He was arrested by Detectives Coleman and Snow on a charge of passing worthless checks. Geis had gone to the motorcycle company this morning to purchase a machine. In payment he offered eight checks made out for \$30 each on the Bank of the West, signed with the name Brainin Hysler. One of the clerks of the store became suspicious and telephoned to the detective headquarters.

Sold Liquor on Sunday—Several arrests were made Saturday and yesterday in the crusade against the selling of liquor to minors and drunken men, and selling liquor on Sunday. Charles Looney, bartender for Penny brothers, proprietors of a saloon on Union avenue, was arrested on a charge of selling liquor to John Anderson, who was intoxicated. John Storr, proprietors of the Bungalow bar, at 212 Alder street, was arrested a few hours later for selling liquor to Clyde Super, 19 years old. Mike O'Shea sold liquor to Patrolmen Miller and Sherwood and was arrested charged with selling liquor on Sundays. The cases were continued.

Killed Snipe Out of Season—For shooting two snipe two days before the season opened, Robert G. McPherson, treasurer of the W. G. McPherson company, of this city, stands to pay a heavy fine. Mr. McPherson was hunting with two other men on Baker lake, near the Columbia river east of the city. Game warden E. H. Clarke came along and found a fine shotgun laying on the ground with the snipe laying across it. Yesterday Mr. McPherson claimed the gun and owned up to shooting the snipe. The fine for killing them out of season is a minimum of \$25 each. The season opens Tuesday and a hunter can then kill 50 in a week until March 1.

Admits Blowing Safe—R. T. Hopkins, alias C. A. Johns, a former convict at Salem, pleaded guilty in a hearing before United States Commissioner Cannon yesterday morning to a charge of blowing the safe in the postoffice at Troy, Idaho. In his confession, a Fred Culp was implicated, who has not been apprehended. Hopkins was arrested at The Dalles and 1125 of the \$50 stolen was taken. He will be taken back to Idaho to stand trial.

Want Liquor Problem Settled—A petition signed by 23 voters was received yesterday by County Clerk Fields, asking that the liquor question be submitted to voters in precinct 76 in the Brooklyn district at the general election November 5. The precinct extends from the river to Milwaukee avenue and from East Caruthers to Karl street. At the primaries 244 voters registered in the precinct.

Suicidal Attempt Failure—In an attempt to commit suicide Luigi Vesmaria, an Italian, yesterday jumped from a trestle in the yards of the Portland Lumber company at the foot of Lincoln street, and was injured about the body. He is now in the hospital, where about the number mill, lying on the

ground moaning. When he struck the ground he fell on his stomach. The Red Cross ambulance was summoned and the man was taken to the St. Vincent hospital, where his injuries are said not to be serious.

Thrown From Wagon—Andrew Ingles, 22 years old, was fatally injured yesterday afternoon, by being thrown from a wagon at Sixteenth and Elm streets, Portland Heights, when the horse slipped on the steep incline at that point. Ingles with Glen Belt, was delivering furniture and household goods when the accident happened. He was taken to St. Vincent's hospital in a Red Cross ambulance.

Mrs. Jellison Asks Divorce—Claiming that last Tuesday she was compelled to call the police to stop her husband from choking her, Ida M. Jellison yesterday started suit for divorce from Byron W. Jellison in the circuit court. She says in the complaint that he has persecuted her frequently before and charges him with being unfaithful. They were married in this city October 23, 1903.

Tax Payments Heavy—Receipts of second installments of taxes yesterday amounted to \$17,193.92. The second installment becomes delinquent after next Monday, and property owners are rushing to pay their taxes. The tax collection windows have been moved to the north end of the main floor of the court house and a new window opened to expedite matters.

Peddler Draws Gun—Not satisfied with abusing George M. McDonald, an employee of the Portland Gas company, while McDonald was superintending work at Milford station, a vegetable peddler whose name was not learned, took a revolver from his wagon and began to chase McDonald. Other employees took the gun away from the peddler.

Taxation Before Ad Club—"Taxation" is to be the luncheon subject before the Ad club tomorrow in the Multnomah hotel. Various phases and aspects of proposed tax legislation in the November election will be discussed by Governor West and State Tax Commissioner Charles V. Galloway, Charles H. Lehman will be the subject of the day.

Walkers Face Charge—Frank and Mary Walker, indicted some time ago by the grand jury for keeping a bawdy house, were arrested yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Phillips and were released on \$500 bonds each. The pair fled to British Columbia following indictment, but returned when sent for by their attorney.

Wymen Goes to Rockpile—George Wymen was yesterday sentenced to serve six months on the rockpile by County Judge Cleaton on a charge of non-support. He was ordered to pay his wife \$6 a week in April, 1911, but has not done so. His wife is a chambermaid and is supporting two children.

Teamster Injured—H. Casper, teamster, living at Fourteenth and Salmon streets, was seriously injured yesterday afternoon when he was struck by a heavy timber, which fell from the west approach of the old steel bridge, as he was driving under it. He was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital.

Election Notices Going Out—County Clerk Fields is sending out the 5000 election notices for the general election November 5. Two notices must be sent to each of the 2500 election judges and clerks in the county, and these must be posted in the precincts in which the judges and clerks are to act.

Printy Wants Parole—Frank Printy, well known in police circles, was sentenced to 90 days on the rockpile and fined \$200, August 29, for being drunk. He has written a letter to Chief of Police Slover begging a pardon or a parole. Printy wants the chief to take the matter up with the city council.

Anderson's Case Continued—John Anderson, proprietor of a saloon at 514 North Third street, who was arrested yesterday by Patrolmen Wellock and Collins on a charge of selling liquor to Charles Peterson, who was intoxicated, took a continuance of his case in the police court this morning.

PIONEER INVENTOR PASSES BEYOND



J. H. Robbins.

J. H. Robbins, 73 years old, an Oregon pioneer and inventor of a combined harvester and reaper which is now used extensively in the northwest, died recently at his home near Amity, Oregon, after an illness of several months.

Robbins was a pioneer of the days when ox teams were the only means of transportation across the plains from the far east. He came to Oregon in 1882 after a long, perilous trip. He located at Baker.

Shortly after his arrival there, his wife, Mrs. Hester Minnock Robbins, passed away. In 1884 he married again, his bride being Mary Margaret Harvey. Soon after his marriage he moved to Bethel where his harvester was perfected.

In 1877 he moved to Portland and remained here until 1883. While here he owned and managed a music store. From here he moved to Baker where he became interested in the Robbins-Elkhorne mine near Baker, and he lived there until 1895, going then to his farm near Amity where he spent the balance of his days.

Five children and a widow survive him. The children are Grant Robbins of Baker, Dan C. and Elmer E. Robbins of Amity, W. A. Robbins, and Mrs. F. C. Gillespie of Portland.

The funeral was held at Amity under the auspices of the First Christian church and interment was made at the Bethel cemetery.

Suicidal Attempt Failure

Great Suffrage Advocate Claims Women Crave Power of the Ballot

Dr. Anna Shaw, Who Is Aiding in Suffrage Fight in Oregon, Says Good Women Vote When They Feel the Duty, Just as Men Work.

With characteristic graciousness, Dr. Anna Shaw found time to chat with a Journal reporter last evening while resting in her apartments at the Portland after a very busy day, and, with another address only an hour in the future.

"Do you think women really want to vote or do they simply want the power that lies within the ballot?" was asked. "No, women do not want to vote. What man really wants a hammer? But a hammer is necessary to the house which he does want, and so it is with women—they simply want the things that cannot be gotten except by the ballot. Then another consideration—and to my mind a vastly important one—is the removal of the stigma from our sex. Chinamen are not allowed to become citizens of the United States for the one reason that our country does not want them to vote. They are a close, unmixing nation, and we women, simply because of our sex, are classed with the Chinese. As a matter of fact, our sex has no more to do with our right and ability to vote than the color of our hair and eyes. Woman will never come into her own until she has the right to vote—to demand what is rightfully hers. I rebel at seeing women discriminated against. In the business and professional world more is required of a woman than of a man, and yet the salaries are uniformly lower. Now, where is the justice in such an arrangement?"

"What is there in the argument that only bad women vote?" was asked. "Absolutely nothing," was the positive reply of Dr. Shaw. "The opposition has to say something so they are trying to stuff that down our throats. That the exact opposite is true is evinced by what has been accomplished in states where they have suffrage. In southern California 90 per cent of the women registered and 95 per cent of those registered voted. Are we to suppose that 90 per cent of all the women in southern California are bad? It is largely the forces of evil which are opposing us. If they believed for one moment that the bad women control the vote, we would have suffrage thrust upon us and at once."

"Of course you will admit that there is opposition among thinking men. Do you think they really think women are incapable of voting intelligently or is it a matter of sentiment?"

"Their opposition may be attributed to both. Men have held the reins so long that it seems impossible for them to share power with our sex. They are constantly insulting our intelligence, but they do not mean to. It is such a matter of habit they don't even know when they are doing it, and what is still worse we don't know when we are insulted. Only a few nights ago I was introduced in a Montana city by a man who said he did not doubt but that I was as capable of voting as an Indian."

Just here Miss Anthony, a niece of the late Susan B. Anthony, who is accompanying Miss Shaw on her western tour, joined in the conversation. "I had a similar experience when circulating a petition relative to suffrage in New York," she said. "In response to my argument a man said: 'Yes, I
