

TRIBUTES PAID TO THE EFFICIENCY OF SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Rally Day Program of Association Brings Forth Many Words of Commendation—B. S. Josselyn Presides.

Tributes to the efficiency of the Sunday school in the building of character and the promoting of pure living were paid by business men, educators and religious workers at the concluding session of the Oregon Sunday School association rally day program in the Commercial club last night.

B. S. Josselyn, who presided, made an address dealing with the formative influence over his own life of the first Sunday school he attended. Mr. Josselyn described the work of education and social purification which has been accomplished and which is rapidly developing along broad and desirable lines under the direction of the Social Hygiene society of Portland.

J. B. Werlein said that the value of the Sunday school in arming youth against temptation is incalculable. He added that, in his opinion, sensationalists and noise makers cannot cure vice, but that education commenced early and continued systematically will do greatest good.

Recalls First Attendance. The possibilities of splendid manhood and womanhood that the shabby and careless exterior of the street may conceal were described by G. C. Chapman. Affectionately he told of the life of the war and the help that genuine good people may give to the world. "I would not have missed this meeting for a great deal because it has been an eye-opener to me," said Mr. Chapman.

Edgar B. Piper, president of the Commercial club, recalled the day when he had attended Sunday school. He said that the influence of Sunday school experience had been permanent in his life. Addressing himself to a comparison between religious and business conditions, Mr. Piper said that in the beginning the church was almost supreme in authority. Came rebellion and the people have been extending it in the form of unrest and discontent against almost all forms of civil government.

Build Fine Church. "The people over a radius of four miles attend," they have built a fine church, seating 400. They have kept away saloons and other makers of vice. Energy and purpose could extend the Sunday school influence similarly in any community," was Mr. Knapp's conclusion.

The program was closed with "summing up" address by Rev. C. A. Phipps, general secretary of the Oregon Sunday School association. He said that much work and great patience has succeeded in organizing the Sunday school of the thirty-fourth and last county in Oregon—Harney. He explained, in interdenominational, it is concerned with seven branches—the training of the teachers; the elementary division, including the cradle roll, the beginners and the primary department of children 5 to 9 years old; the home department for those who can't attend Sunday school, namely the "shut-ins and the shut-outs"; the secondary division or "teen" division of youths of both sexes from 16 to 19, who are especially trained in pure living and social hygiene.

Stress Laid on Pledge. It also includes the adult department, whose members are organized in settlement, social and church work; the temperance and citizenship division, where stress is laid on signing pledges to abstain from liquor and cigarettes, and training is provided in the elements of good citizenship; and the division of missions, which is intended to stimulate interest in the missionary enterprise of the denomination under which a given Sunday school works, and to furnish a vision of the great missionary need of the world. In Harney, newly organized, as in all other counties of the state, work in these seven departments is being systematically carried forward," said Mr. Phipps.

Bourne Petition Is Filed. (Salem Bureau of The Journal.) Salem, Oct. 3.—A petition carrying 15,927 names was filed with the secretary of state yesterday afternoon placing Jonathan Bourne Jr. in the race for reelection to the office of United States senator. The petition was filed by A. A. Muck of St. Johns. It designates Bourne as a "Popular Government candidate." Senator Bourne must accept the nomination by Saturday in order to have the nomination become effective.

MOTHER SEIZES CHILD AND RUNS FROM HOUSE WHEN LAMP EXPLODES

The home of F. H. Crowther, at Fifty-second avenue and Fifth street, southeast, was burned to the ground last night. The blaze started from an explosion of an oil lamp, which Mrs. Crowther dropped to the floor when she stumbled and fell as she was going up the stairs of her home. In the house at the time was Mrs. Crowther and her baby daughter, Mr. Crowther being away. As soon as Mrs. Crowther saw that the fire was serious she ran into the room where the baby was sleeping. She carried the child out of the dwelling. The fire department from Woodstock arrived too late to save the house. Mrs. Crowther was only slightly injured by her fall. WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSION SOCIETY TO OPEN TONIGHT

Session Marks Twentieth Anniversary of M. E. Organization; 500 Delegates Expected.

Special significance is attached to the opening tonight of the annual meeting of the Woman's Foreign Mission society of the Methodist Episcopal church, at the First church, Third and Taylor streets, for it marks the beginning of the twentieth anniversary of the organization of the society. More than 500 delegates from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and northern California are expected to attend this session, which will end Sunday night.

The meeting will be representative of societies in the states mentioned, the total membership of which aggregates more than \$500. This organization had its birth on December 7, 1892, in the Taylor street church, and since its establishment, 12 missionaries have been appointed and assigned to duty in India, China, Malaysia, the Philippine Islands and Africa.

Receiving Delegates Today.

In addition to these missionaries, this organization maintains 150 teachers and Bible women, 215 scholarships and four hospital beds.

Dr. Rachel Benn, for many years a missionary to China; Miss Laura Austin, stationed for five and one half years at Baroda, India; Miss Kenworthy, wife of Rev. Dr. Kenworthy, who has recently been assigned to duty in India, will be among the most important delegates present.

Although the first official session of this meeting is tonight, when Rev. Benjamin Young, the pastor, will conduct the Holy Communion service, the ladies of the local church are today receiving the delegates at the church and are providing entertainment for them.

OIL STRIKE IS REPORTED ON OLYMPIC PENINSULA

Montesano, Wash., Oct. 3.—Discovery of oil in the vicinity of Hop river on the Olympic peninsula, and organization of a company with \$50,000,000 capital to work the project was given out here today when 72 applications for filings on as many claims to corral the project were made public.

The oil was discovered by a timber cruiser and reported to J. D. Cray, who sent out experts. A small well scooped out of the ground is said to have seeped five barrels per day. Several barrels were sent to Seattle for examination. E. C. Miller, Bert Middleton and J. D. Cray, who are behind the project, visited the wells several days ago and say they are a wonderful discovery. The strike by Aberdeen parties are for the company and take up 72 square miles in that vicinity.

SHOULD CREECH'S VICTIM HAVE BEEN WATCH'S OWNER?

Bit of Evidence at Montesano Trial Said to Belong to Man Whom Lumberman Really Lay in Wait For.

Montesano, Wash., Oct. 3.—The introduction of the large revolver used by John Creech, wealthy lumberman of Raymond, in murdering Frank Welch, the city detective of Aberdeen, and also a watch found by Deputy Sheriff Bell, reported to belong to a man named Kinoid, whom Creech was perhaps lying in wait for, were important features of the trial today. Creech paid when the gun was brought in and acted nervous, but quickly recovered.

Guy P. Haferty and wife, who stood within 50 feet of Creech when he fired at Welch in the darkness, told of the shooting and the conversation following. They said that a man yelled out "For God's sake don't shoot any more, cut it out."

They made excellent witnesses for the state. Cross examination of the witnesses is long, the defense fighting for every point and objections are frequent.

The jury to try John S. Creech, wealthy lumberman of Raymond, was completed last evening, as follows: Jos. Switzer, business man, Aberdeen; E. W. Johnston, business man, Aberdeen; M. Englebritzen, millowner, Aberdeen; E. R. Spear, painter, Aberdeen; August Wallis, contractor, Aberdeen; A. S. Erch, business man, Aberdeen; A. J. Grant, laborer, Aberdeen; S. D. Simmons, laborer, Aberdeen; J. M. White, traveling man, Elima; L. A. Ecklund, business man, Hoquiam, and C. H. Moss, business man, Montesano.

The opening remarks for the state were made by Deputy Prosecutor A. E. Cross, who said the state would prove that Creech came back from Raymond with the avowed intention of killing some man having the companionship of his wife, and that Welch, answering a call to the Creech home, was told by Creech's son that some one was in the back yard and when he went to the rear of the house, he was shot to death also that Creech, on learning he had killed the wrong man, admitted it to the authorities.

Creech during the review of the case by Cross sat unmoved, a much different demeanor from that when seen in court several months ago, when he entered his plea of not guilty. He has recovered his nerve and is now to make the defense that he thought the officer was an intruder and was justified in the shooting.

POSTPONE ETOR TRIAL UNTIL OCT. 14

(United Press Landed Wire.) Salem, Mass., Oct. 3.—Because of the refusal of scores of talesmen to serve on the jury the trials of Joseph Etor, Arturo Giovannitti and Antonio Caruso, for the alleged murder of Anna Lopizzo, has been postponed until October 14, when a new panel will be summoned. They were leaders of the Lawrence strike.

Only three jurors had been obtained.

PROGRESSIVE PARTY WORKERS WILL MEET
