An increase of fully 15 per cent is shown in the make of cheese at Tillamook. The authority for this statement is Charles Ray, the well known maker of the Tillamook country.

California is getting to be the big cheese buyer in the Tillamook country. Most of our product going to Los Angeles and San Francisco.

There is no cheese to speak of on hand at Tillamook at this time, there are conditions extremely good so far as a market is concerned.

Trade in the grape market is clogged with offerings. Concord are in very liberal supply and sales are being made as low as 10c a basket.

Owing to the very heavy supplies of chickens the market is forward to front street during the last two weeks.

Slight increase in strength is shown in the pear trade today. Receipts are small and demand is increasing.

Market is oversupplied with No. 2 onions and this is hurting the sale of the best stock.

Very heavy supplies of tomatoes are coming forward from local places.

With foreign markets weaker and lower and high world's shipments, there was a disposition to sell short at the opening and liquidation among the long interests followed.
