TRADE IS VERY QUIET BIG CROPS OFFERING

Keen Bidding Among Either Exporters or Millers; Coarse Grains Quiet in Sympathy.

Conditions in the apple trade throughout the United States are today the most unsatisfactory for many years at this period. The crop of apples at eastern points is so heavy that the trade there is not much interested in western apples this season, with the possible exception of extra fancy quality. In no district will there be a heavy crop of the best stock this season, therefore for this one stock quite good prices are Bussian Shipments Heavy. Liverpool, Oct. 7. - Russfan hipments of wheat are again heavier. The volume now coming forward is greater than exno district will there be a heavy crop of the best stock this season, therefore for this one stock quite good prices are expected, although the market will be affected to some extent by the overabundance of medium grade stock.

Reports from the leading apple growing sections of Orgon and Washington indicate that but a small per cent of the crop this season will be of large size. The trees were so heavily ladeneven after being thinned that the fruit did not attain the usual proportion.

Taken as a whole, the quality of the apple crop at Pacific northwest points this season will be far better than usual. Better care is being given the fruit by growers, and this, together with the universal improvement in the packing, will give the market a far greater supply of medium grade stuff than ever before.

There is no doubt at this time that many of the leading districts will store a large per cent of their crop until later in the season, in the hope of obtaining better prices then.

Not only is there a lack of suitable domestic demand for western apples, but Europe is filled with medium grade stuff, and extremely low prices have pected and is exerting a bearish . influence among the trade. Shipments from the Danube were also liberal for the week. The movement was: Russian 3,344,-000 bushels, Danubian 2,480,000 bushels, Entire world's shipments for the week were 14,688,-000 bushels, compared with 13,-968,000 bushels the previous week and 11,024,000 bushels for the same week a year ago.
