Roanoke, Va., Oct. 7.—Although she has taught her beloved pupils in the Sunday school of the little Dunkard church in the wild and mountainous regions here with Oscar S. Straus, the man who was the law and order of the outer world, Miss Maude Iroler, flaxen of Wesley Edwards, said to be the most dangerous of the Allen gang, bravely defends the man Edwards, with whom she was arrested at Des Moines, Iowa, after Edwards and his uncle, Sidna Allen, had successfully eluded in the murderous raid on the Hillsville courthouse last March, Miss Iroler defends him thus: "Do I think he is guilty? Why, I don't see how that can make any difference. Once in a while every man who thinks anything of himself has to draw his gun, and you can't always tell who's right and who's wrong. Anyhow, right or wrong, I belong to him and I'll stick to him."
